When I walk up to any squad leader and ask him, "which squad is the best in the battalion, he will tell me his squad is best. This is the way it should be, but most times just in the way they say it, shows they don't really believe it. When I ask the men in his squad, the same question, I often get evasive answer or a sheepish grin as they say that their squad is best. In most cases, there is little or no feeling of pride.

For a squad to be effective, it must have pride. The squad must feel that it is the best squad in the unit. But how does it gain this pride? This responsibility rest on the shoulders of the squad leader. He must know his men, thoroughly. He must know the capabilities of his men and their shortcomings. He must know the men in his squad think. He must train his men to think along the lines that he desires them too, and he must see that his men are informed of every thing he knows. The better overall picture they have

of the job to be done, the more effectively they can do their part of the work.

You must also, give your jobs to do on their own. But after the job is done, check it. For instance, if you tell one of your men to install some claymores on the perimeter. He has done this in all probability, quite often, you understand he knows how to do it, but you must check the job when he finished it. Why? Because after a time, an American will get careless and try to take short cut or do the job any way he can to get it done quickly and easily. When you check it, if it has been done right, then complement him, but if it has been done haphazardly or incorrectly, then you must make him redo the job under your direct supervision. If he knows you are going to check his work, he will soon learn to do a good job the first time.

From this, your men will begin to realize that they are good, and with that will come a feeling of pride in their squad.

As their pride and confidence increases, their efficiency will increase. They will try to do better all the time. In a short time you will find that you do have a squad that both you and your men can be proud of. Not only will you and your men be proud, but, also everyone in the chain of command will be proud of your accomplishments. Multiply this by the number of squads we have in the Battalion and you will have a Battalion that is the best in the Army. Remember, the Battalion's reputation rests upon the accomplishments of its squads.

Lord!

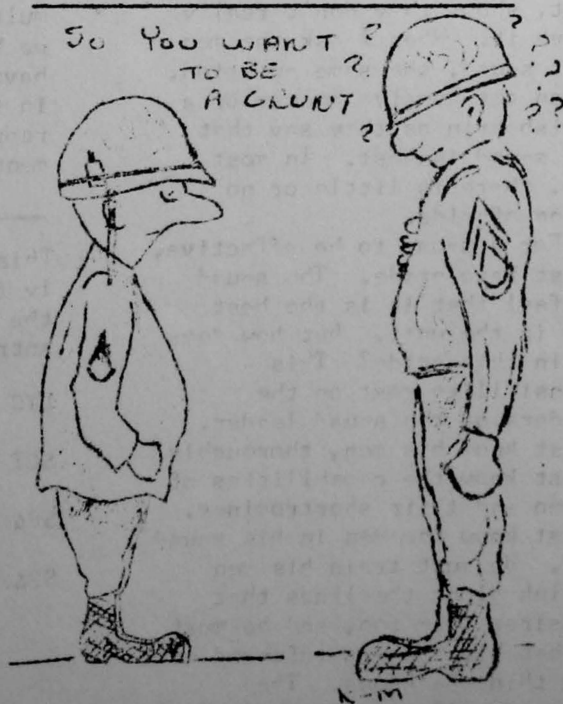
