## BATTALION NEWS

The area west of LZ 4-11 was the scene of the action for the 3d Bn, 1st Infantry during the last week. Because of the rainy weather lately, incidents were few in number. Alfa Company is now on the hill for their ten day tour.

Nov 20

Delta Company discovered about 750 pounds of rice hidden under the false floor of a hootch.

Nov 21

100 pounds of explosives were captured by the "Delta Dogs" as they came upon two hootches.

Nov 22

Recon platoon came across a small basecamp. The camp contained a number of huts and a mess hall.

Delta Co detained 4 VCS and found another 200 pounds of rice. Later in the day, the company spotted 4 to 6 NVA. One NVA was killed. A pistol was captured and numerous documents were discovered.

Nov 23

Co D engaged 6-10 VC/NVA evading resulting in 2 VC/NVA KIA's.

Nov 25

Charlie Company working north of 4-11 found eight expended 75 recoilless rifle rounds and two rocket launching sites.

"Delta Dogs" discovered a large rice cache, estimated to weigh about 400 lbs, was found hidden in large drums under and near hootches.

Nov 26

"Chargin' Charlie came across an 82mm round rigged up as a booby trap and destroyed it.

Co D came across 100 lbs of rice and had 50 Vietnamese people evacuated to Tu My Resettlement Village.

Bravo Company found a hootch that had numerous medical supplies in it. The

hut had been used recently as blood trails were found.

In a delayed report, Delta Co received credit for 5 VC KIA's when working with a different unit on Oct 15.

## BATTALION WELCOMES NEW CHAPLAIN

The new battalion chaplain is Major Verne A. Slighter. The chaplain comes to the battalion from Fort Ord, California, where his last duty assignment was chaplain to the West Coast Language School at the Presidio of Monterey. He has had previous chaplain duty assignments with the 101st Airborne Division at Fort Campbell, Kentucky, the 8th Division in Germany, ARADCOM in Gary, Indiana, Vietnam, and the Career Chaplain's Course at Fort Hamilton, New York.

## CHANGES IN OBJECTIVES THROUGH VIETNAMIZATION PROGRAM

Early in its tenure the Nixon Administration did not believe it could stand pat with the past and went about shaping a new, alternative plan to influence the course of events in Vietnam.

The program that evolved was Vietnamization. And according to Secretary of Defense Melvin Laird it "has put some aces in the Free World's poker hand."

Those who view the Vietnamization program as a mere "continuation" of the plan for modernizing South Vietnam's armed forces are quite mistaken, the secretary of defense told the Eight convention of the AFL-CIO at Atlantic City, N.J.

It is more than that, he said.

He continued, "The Vietnamization program represents a major change not only in emphasis but also objectives. Troop modernization until early this year, had the negative goal of partially de-Americanizing the war.

"Vietnamization has the positive goal of 'Vietnamizing' the war, of increasing Vietnamese responsibility for 'all' aspects of the war and handling of their own affairs. There is an enormous difference between these policies."

He then explained how the previous modernization program was designed to prepare the South Vietnamese to handle only the threat of Viet Cong

insurgency that would remain "after" all North Vietnamese regular force had returned home.

"It made sense, therefore, only in the context of success at Paris. It was a companion piece to the Paris talks, not a complement and alternative."

On the other hand Vietnamization is directed toward preparing the South Vietnamese to handle both Viet Cong insurgency and regular North Vietnamese armed forces regardless of the outcome in Paris, Secretary Laird said.

"In other words," he added, "we felt we could not stand pat with the past. Vietnamization has put some aces in the Free World's poker hand."

Here is what Secretary Laird means by "aces" in the hands of the Free World. "It means, in South Vietnam, building a stronger economy, stronger internal security forces, a stronger government, and stronger military forces."

Secretary Laird believes the military area is where progress in Vietnamization has been most visible.

He said that contingent on one or more of the three criteria expressed by the President—progress in Paris, progress in vietnamization, and reduction in the level of enemy activity—additional numbers of Americans can and will be brought home.
