Upon approaching a small village the tracks cordoned off the area, which was then searched. The bulk of the rice, which was contained in 55-gallon drums, was found in the ground. After being uncovered, the drums were hauled in cargo carriers to a point where they were bagged and later extracted by helicopter.

In recognition of his courageous efforts during this action, in which he was also wounded, Chaplain Norton was awarded the Silver Star. Other decorations he earned during his first tour include the Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry, three Bronze Stars, two Army Commendation Medals (one with "V" device), and six Air Medals.

Chaplain Norton is better described not by what he has done but by what he imparts to others. Wherever he goes, whether among troops in the field or with the Vietnamese people, he establishes an easy rapport, a sense of comradeship based upon compassionate understanding. Through his sense of humor, he helps others realize a sense of proportion. Through his sense of devotion, he helps the individual "to develop a better relationship with Christ and to grow in that relationship." His most commendable ambition is to go where needed and once there, do something to answer that need.

PORTRAIT OF A CHAPLAIN

A quick smile, steady composure and action-oriented dedication characterize Third Battalion's energetic, new chaplain, Captain George K. Norton. Once primarily concerned with discovering breaches of security, he now devotes himself to helping others breach the gap of spiritual insecurity. Before entering the ministry, Chaplain Norton spent five years in the Air Force assigned to the Office of Special Investigations. Eventually, he found what he had been searching for and entered Asbury Theological Seminary in 1962 after having graduated from East Texas State University in 1959. Four years later, he became an Army chaplain and was assigned to a combat infantry battalion with the First Division.

During one particularly fierce engagement in which his unit had been ambushed, Chaplain Norton and his assistant made six trips into the kill zone to rescue casualties.

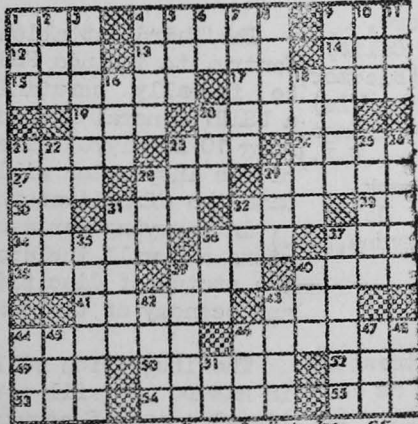

USARV GENERAL INSPECTION

The Third Battalion, First Infantry, to include FSB 4-11, will be formally scrutinized during a USARV General Inspection beginning 10 Aug 1970. The objective of the inspection will be to evaluate the effectiveness of the unit in carrying out assigned missions and will include inquiry into the status of discipline, efficiency and economy of the command.

The inspection will be general in nature and will cover all functional areas of command to include personnel matters, morale and welfare, records and administration; physical and classified security; operations and training, supply and maintenance, messes and funds.

STATE PRIMARY ELECTIONS

(Washington ANF)—Primary elections have been scheduled on the indicated dates in the following states:
Sept. 1—Nevada and North Dakota
Sept. 8—Arizona, Colorado, Florida, New Hampshire, Utah, Vermont, Washington, Virgin Islands
Sept. 9—Georgia
Sept. 15—Maryland, Massachusetts, Minnesota and Rhode Island.

Qualified armed forces members, their spouses and dependents may obtain absentee ballots by completing and mailing the Federal Post Card Application (Standard Form 76 revised 1968). It is distributed by the U.S. Government through the General Services Administration.

The inspection will be conducted in a manner which will not interfere with any tactical operations. Equipment will be inspected on site or in its normal place of storage to the maximum extent practicable. Keys to all locked containers will be immediately available. There will be no inspection of personnel in ranks or display of full field equipment.

There will be a complaint period for battalion personnel at FSB Bronco from 1100-1200 hours on 10 Aug and at the same time on the following day for those at FSB 4-11.
