Enemy Caught With Pants Down

On an Eagle Flight southwest of Quang Ngai, Recon platoon was inserted near a hamlet after gunships from the 174th Aviation Company had engaged an armed VC evading to the south.

During their sweep of the contact area, a squad led by SGT Patrick A. Pickett (Glendale, Ore.) intercepted two enemy personnel carrying packs and weapons. Machine gunner PFC David C. Bridger (Lyons, N.Y.) was the first to open up and it was probably very fortunate for SGT Milton Booty (Zachury, La.) that the engagement was both brief and decisive. Not more than ten meters from him lay one of the VC with a UHICOM clutched in hand.

Meanwhile, SGT Donald E. Bradshaw (Winston, Ore.) was detaining a Vietnamese he had spotted attempting to change clothes. It would soon be revealed that a VC hamlet chief had been "caught with his pants down."

In less than thirty minutes, the platoon's swift and well-coordinated action had cost the enemy 4 VC KIAs and 1 CIA with 2 AK-47s, 2/45 cal. pistols, 6 hand grenades, medical supplies, documents and misc. clothing CIA.

CONVERSION OF MPC No Sacrifice too Great

Beginning early on the morning of 7 October, members of the battalion began turning in their Series 681 Military Payment Certificates. By the following afternoon over \$130,000 would have been converted.

The conversion forms and the inevitable wait in line were considered minor inconveniences. Such a

procedure served an understandable purpose and was accepted by most as a "necessary pain."

Several situations which the two and a half day deprivation produced were rather disconcerting for those in the rear. It was rather a trying experience for everyone to be "flat broke" at the exact same time; something similar, although not nearly as consequential, to an entire company exhausting its supply of rations.

The real crises resulted from the exclusion of the domestic help. Dirty clothes, trash and dust began accumulating while support personnel had to be recruited to police the kitchen. In the end, the conversion process cost more than a few people their shirts...

THE UNITED NATIONS
25th Anniversary

Twenty-five years ago, delegates from 50 nations met in San Francisco to seek a formula that, through international cooperation, would lead to opportunities for a better life in a peaceful world.

From that meeting emerged a charter, ratified Oct. 24, 1945, committing and dedicating the nations to promoting and preserving peace, justice and progress.

In observance of the 25th anniversary of the United Nations, President Richard Nixon has proclaimed Oct. 24 1970 as United Nations Day. In so doing, he said, "If our UN policies are to be effective, they must engage the attention of a concerned and informed citizenry. We must strive for the greatest possible participation of our population, including the youth of the country, in determining our future participation in the UN."

Underlying the President's request for citizen concern and participation in observing the founding of the United Nations is his stated desire to "appraise candidly the ability of the UN to achieve fully the aims of its charter; examine objectively the strengths and weaknesses of the organization; and search intensely for practical and realistic ways to improve the effectiveness of its agencies."
