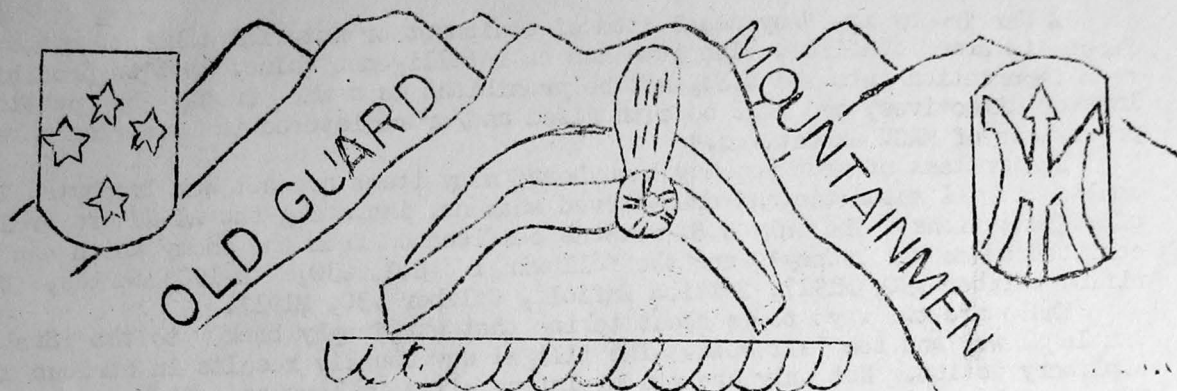

GUNSHIPS ALERT BRAVO

A rapid combat assault into a known VC location after Gunships working the area spotted 12 VC. Helped Infantrymen of the Americal Division's 11th Brigade find three dead VC and capture 5 more while working the rolling hills southeast of the Ban Tuy valley 3 miles from Chu Lai.

Working OPCON (attached) to the 198th Light Infantry Brigade, the members of the 1st and Second Platoon of Bravo Company 4th Battalion 3d Infantry were combat assaulted onto the top of a brush filled knoll after gunships expended their ammunition on 12 VC entering a tunnel.

As the elements hit the ground the 12 was cold so security was quickly set out and the search of the area began. "As we reached the tunnel where the gunships spotted the VC the tunnel entrance was large, so hand grenades were tossed in and a smoke was popped to bring out any remaining VC before the men entered. Inside we found 3 dead VC and one wounded VC, there were also 2 AK-47's, 2 other weapons, Chi Com grenades, and numerous documents", reported Specialist Four Tom Tomkins (Barstow, California).

Near a stream at the bottom of the knoll the men found a hooch, approaching it cautiously the men found 2 VC nurses and one other (Cont. on Pg. 2 Col. 1)

THE RAINS CAN'T
STOP RESUPPLY

Resupply is an important facet of operating a company in the field. When all regular means of resupply fail only imagination can be used to devise a method of transportation to ensure that the men in the field are adequately supplied with the necessities needed to keep the company operating. Such was the case with Bravo Company 4th Battalion, 3d Infantry as resupply had to be carried by sandpan while the company was operating

3 miles southeast of Chu Lai.

After all regular means of resupply was halted because of the heavy rains of the monsoon the members of Recon and the Command Group including the Battalion Commander LTC. Albert Coast embarked down Highway one in a jeep, a duce and a half and a three quarter ton truck to resupply Bravo Company who was in need of food and supplies. "After reaching the village of Vinh An the resupply had to be unloaded from the trucks and carried by hand to the banks of the Song Tra Bong River by the members of the convoy while LTC Coast walked point and Recon pulled security." reported Sergeant Gary Larese (Westfield, Mass.).

600 Meters wide and flowing very swiftly the men found very few volunteers to ferry them across the (Continued on page 4, Column 2)

REGISTRATION OF WAR TROPHIES

A War Trophy is, "Any small-item of equipment or material taken from hostile forces in armed conflict. The item has no intelligence value, not be prohibited from importation into the U.S., not be prohibited as a War Trophy by pertinent laws or directives, and must be authorized and/or registered in accordance with provisions of MACV directives."

Regardless of what you may have heard many items are not War Trophy's. This applies to all automatic and crew-served weapons, including the AK-47 regardless of modifications. The only U.S. weapons confiscated from the enemy which can be confiscated as War Trophy's are the following: U.S. .30, M-1903 Series, U.S. rifle, Caliber .30, M1917, British Enfield, Caliber .30, M1917.

There are two ways to go about taking that War Trophy back to the States. The legal way and the jail road. The illegal way usually results in serious disciplinary action. Not only are you violating military laws and directives, but you are subject to punishment by Federal Courts for breaching custom's laws. The maximum punishment for breaking the Federal Custom's Laws is five years in a Federal Prison and a \$5,000 fine.

You begin your registration of Non-Firearm Trophy's by completing three copies of DD Form 603-1 for each item. Each item must be screened to determine if it is a legal War Trophy. If so, the DD 603-1 will be approved and returned to you. The duplicate copy may be packaged with the article, or carried on your person but must be available to appropriate Government Officials at your port of entry. Once authorized you can have it mailed, shipped, or carried personally to the U.S..

War Trophy Firearms must be screened and authorized in the same manner as non-firearms. In addition, two more forms are required: DD603 and an RVN Export (Continued on page 3 Column 1)

BEWARE OF THE DOGS

A combat patrol by the Medics of 1st Battalion 3d Infantry rear recently wounded up five dogs from the Battalion area which carried Rabies.

Three of the dogs were put to sleep at the kennels and two dogs died in the Battalion area of the disease. Thus far four members of the Battalion have come in contact with these "pets" and are now undergoing the painful Pasture series of 14 shots.

Rabies or Hydrophobia is a fatal disease caused by a virus carried in the saliva of a Rabid Animal. Any human coming in contact with these diseased animals will develop Rabies in 20 to 60 days after exposure. The Pasture treatment consists of 14 very painful shots given one a day. The patient is not hospitalized but is quarantined to the immediate area until all fourteen shots have been administered.

VC. Put into custody the VC offered no resistance. Confiscated from the hooches were numerous medical supplies.

The action was not over yet as the Company Commander of Bravo Company Captain Jack Swaney (Platte City, Mo.) while searching an area came face to face with an AK carrying VC. Raising his M-16 the VC was told to Chieu Hoi and luckily dropping his AK-47 the VC repeated the words back to Captain Swaney. The Chieu Hoi was escorted back to where the other VC were held. A slick was called in and all those held in custody were evacuated to the rear.

In total the members of Bravo Company confiscated five weapons, including 3 AK-47's, 12 Chi Com Grenades, documents and medical supplies.

"The documents came in very handy" reported Captain Felix Ciarlo (Springfield, Pa.) Battalion S-2, "They confirmed that all five taken into custody were in fact VC."

License. After screening you must complete four copies of DD 603. These and the already authenticated duplicate DD 603-1 will be forwarded to the appropriate registration activity. You must retain these forms permanently and have them available for inspection upon request.

Prior to removing a War Trophy firearm from Vietnam you must obtain an Export License. You may obtain an Export License by submitting a request for a license (Annex D, MACV Directive 643-2) along with the other forms. All requests for export licenses should be submitted at the earliest possible date but not later than 90 days prior to your departure from Vietnam. In exceptional cases where the War Trophy is acquired within 60 days of departure, and time is not available to go thru regular channels the Provost Marshall will issue you a temporary license.

This temporary license will be issued only if the time criteria is met and all the procedures have been followed for obtaining an RVN Export License as described before. The authenticated DD Form 603-1, 603 and request for Export License will be forwarded to the Saigon Provost Marshall in the usual manner by the local Provost Marshall a notation will also be added that a temporary export license was issued and will include a forwarding address to which the RVN license may be sent.

War Trophy firearms can not be mailed or shipped to the United States. On aircraft or ships, legal war Trophy firearms must be packed in your accompanied baggage and cannot be carried, into the passenger compartment of the aircraft.

Firearms carried personally aboard a ship must be turned over to the ships armory for safe keeping. In either case, you must have a copy of DD 603 and 603-1 immediately available as verification of your authority to possess the weapon. You are also responsible for insuring that the chamber or magazine is cleared.

MEDICS TO THE RESCUE

A MEDCAP was recently conducted by the Medics of the 4th Battalion 3d Infantry Rear in the village of Van Trong or the Twin Vill, after the rains of the Monsoon left many of the Vietnamese Civilians sick and homeless.

Receiving a call from Brigade S-5 Specialist Six Mark English (Fort Campbell, Ky.), Specialist Four James McMaster (Live Oak, Ak.), PFC Raymond Raatz (Levittown, Pa.), and PFC Joseph Zook (Olathe, Kansas), accompanied by two Vietnamese Medics and an interpreter headed up Highway one to see what could be done.

During their stay in the village the medics treated 88 medical cases, 44 surgical cases and one dental case. Most of the cases treated were colds vitamin deficiencies however, during their stay the village water supply was tested and found to be contaminated. Thus another date was set for the medics to return and inoculate the entire village for Cholera. 500 to 900 people are expected to receive the shots.

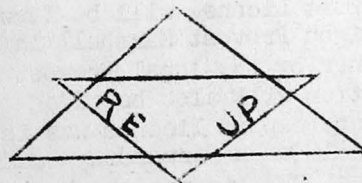
