

THE HISTORY OF THE OLD GUARD

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Older than the Constitution, the 3d Infantry first saw action in 1794 when, under the command of General "Mad Anthony" Wayne, they defeated the Indians at the Battle of Fort Recovery. During the War of 1812 the 3d Infantry fought at Chippewa, Lundy's Lane and Canada. 1840 saw the 3d Infantry engaged in the arduous duty in the Indian Wars.

In 1847 there followed the war with Mexico, in which the 3d Infantry distinguished itself by valiant action not exceeded by any other regiment. The greatest victory of the war was the Regiment's assault and capture of the fort of Monterrey. Because of its gallant and vital part in the campaign resulting in the capture of Mexico City, particularly because of its success in storming the heavily defended heights of Chapultepec with fixed bayonets the 3d Infantry was accorded the honor of marching at the head of the column when the victorious army made its triumphant entry into the city. As the 3d approached, General Winfield Scott removed his hat and turning to the members of his staff, said, "Gentlemen, take off your hats to the Old Guard of the Army." It was the "Old Guard" that the Regiment has been known and honored throughout the army since that time. From Mexico the unit went back to frontier duty.

Back in Texas in 1860, the regiment prepared to return to the North when the clouds of the Civil War lowered in 1861. From Texas the Regiment traveled east to arrive in time to participate in the first battle of

Bull Run. The 3d Infantry took part in many battles of the Army of the Potomac. It fought at Gettysburg, Manassas, Antietam, Fredrickburg and Chancellorsville. Although reduced in strength to about 200 men and officers the Old Guard was present at the surrender of General Lee at Appomattox in April 1865.

In 1898 the years of comparative quiet were ended by the outbreak of the war with Spain. The battle-ready unit was one of the first regiments ordered to Cuba. The "Old Guard" participated in every important engagement until returning to the United States in September 1898. During the next year the 3d Infantry was sent to the Philippines where it saw strenuous service in the "Philippine Insurrection."

After this campaign The Old Guard saw service at various stations from Fort Ontario, New York, to the Texas Border, to Alaska. In 1941 the Old Guard left the states for foreign duty to occupy a strategic outpost - Newfoundland. In March of 1945 the 3d Infantry was attached to the 106th Division and sent to Germany. As part of that Division the Old Guard raced across Germany corraling thousands of prisoners in the final drive to victory against the Axis Power.

From November 1946 the unit was deactivated, until April 1948 when it reactivated at an impressive ceremony on the U. S. Capitol Plaza. It was at this time, in keeping with the "Old Guard's" tradition and glory, that it received the assignment of guarding the heart of our homeland, the Nation's Capitol. During the next decade the 3d Infantry assumed the duties of serving as personal escort to Presidents of the United States; march as lead element in Inaugural, Armed Forces and other parades; guarding the tomb of the Unknown Soldier; planning, coordinating and executing State funerals and participating in arrivals and departures for American and foreign dignitaries.


On 1 July 1957 the 3d Infantry Regiment was organized into the 1
a Battle Group 3d Infantry, based on the Pentomic concept. Six years later, in September 1963, the Army reorganized its structure. The Old Guard along with other units was reorganized into Battalions. Throughout these changes the mission of the 3d Infantry remained the same.

In August of 1966, the 4th Battalion, 3d Infantry was activated at Schofield Barracks, Hawaii, as part of the newly formed 11th Infantry Brigade. The Battalion trained in all the basic skills of infantryman. This training was culminated by an airlift exercise to the volcanic, mountainous terrain of the "Big Island" of Hawaii, a combined amphibious landing with the Navy on the island of Molokai, and finally the most significant exercise of all -- deployment to combat in the Republic of Vietnam.

The Battalion arrived in Vietnam on 15 December 1967. Since that time we have made an enviable record for ourselves. We have participated in exercises with the 198th Infantry Brigade and the 196th Infantry Brigade. Presently, the Battalion holds the Brigade record for finding the largest weapons cache to date, 134 individual and crew-served weapons.

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The Third Infantry is one of the only two United States units that do not wear the usual type of distinctive unit insignia. Instead, it wears the unique knapsack strap, officially described as a black leather strap with bull strap woven in the middle. According to legend the strap originated a century and a half ago when, prior to a battle (probably Lundy's Lane), members of the Regiment wove strips of rawhide into the black leather shoulder straps of their rucksacks as a means of battle identification. After the battle, a British prisoner of war commented that the Americans would not have won that day if it hadn't been for the devils with the distinctive knapsack straps. The Regiment requested and was granted official permission to retain its distinctive marking, now conventionalized to its present form.

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Back in Texas in 1860, the Regiment prepared to return to the North when the clouds of the Civil War lowered in 1861. From Texas, the Regiment traveled east to arrive in time to participate in the first battle of Bull Run. The Third Infantry took part in many battles of the Army of the Potomac. 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

1. 13 March - 4 Officers and 16 Enlisted Men departed Schofield Bks as the Advance Party for Pohakuloa Training Area, Island of Hawaii, and arrived at destination 1400 hours of the same day. Main party of Headquarters and Headquarters Company arrived on the 14th and 16th of March.
2. 19 April - 19 Officers and 192 Enlisted Men return from P.T.A.
3. 25 April - 1SG Richard McNamee is reassigned to HQ 11th Inf Bks. SFC Robert L McDaniel assumes the duties of Acting First Sergeant.
4. 21 July - 1HC Harold J Meyers is reassigned to Washington, D.C.
5. 22 July - 1HC Alvin S Atkins assumes command of the Battalion.
6. 1 August - 18 Officers and 217 Enlisted Men depart Schofield Bks for the Island of Molokai aboard the SS Cavalier and SS Portuga, for training in beach assaults and counter-insurgency operations -- Operation Coral Sands II.
7. 8 August - Return from Operations Coral Sands II.
8. 15 August - CPT Richard E Six assumes command of HQ from CPT William R Dennis, who is reassigned to HQ, 6th Support Battalion.
9. 16 August - 18 August - Brigade re-organisation. Headquarters Company is divided into two separate companies. 3 Officers and 65 EM are reassigned to Co B, 4th Bn 3d Inf.
10. 17 September - 21 September - 16 Officers and 154 Enlisted Men participate in Brigade Field Training Exercise at the Kahuku Training Area on Island of Oahu.
11. 1 November - 1CM Edward L Foster reassigned to Ft Shafter, Hawaii.

12. 6 November - SGM Harry L Dorough assumes the duties as Sergeant Major of the Battalion.

13. 15 November - 1SG Charles O George assigned to HQC 4th Bn 3d Inf.

14. 1 December - SPC McDaniel reenlisted to USMC, Schofield Bks. The company loses all of its non-deployables.

15. 2 December - 7 Officers and 13 Enlisted Men depart Schofield Bks by air transportation for a restricted area.

16. 4 December - Main body of 10 Officers and 130 Enlisted Men depart Schofield Bks, Hawaii aboard USS Gen W H Gordon to a restricted area.

17. 19 December - Permanent Change of Station from Schofield Barracks, Hawaii USARPAC to Duc Pho, South Vietnam USARV.

Company B, 4th Battalion, 3d Infantry (The Old Guard) began the year of 1967 with six (6) Officers and ninety-three (93) enlisted men. This figure climbed steadily upward during February, six (6) Officers and one-hundred and twelve (112) enlisted men, and in March there was a total of six (6) Officers and one hundred and twenty-three (123) enlisted men.

On 16 March 1967, five (5) Officers and one hundred and ten (110) enlisted men departed Schofield Barracks, Hawaii as main party for Operation Moondust VI, at the Pohakuloa Training Area, Kilo Hawaii. Prior to leaving Schofield Barracks, Company B received the Battalion Award for the Best Mess and the Best Supply Room. This was the first time that the Battalion had given these awards.

On 1 April 1967, Co B, had a total to six (6) officers and one hundred and twenty-six (126) enlisted men. The company Mess Hall again received the Battalion best Mess Award for the month of April. On 19 April 1967, Company B, returned

from extensive Jungle Training on the island of Hawaii to Schofield Barracks where they again set up for the usual organizational duties.

May 1, 1967 found the company with an assigned strength of six(6) Officers and one hundred fifty-four (154) enlisted men. This month was spent getting prepared for the Combat Material Maintenance Inspection (CMMI) and training in the M16's. During this month also, on 17 May 1967, we swapped Officers with Co C, 4th Bn, 3d Inf, gaining Lt John D. Heier, 05 331 315, and losing Lt Dan P. Miles, 05 332 321.

1 Jun 1967, found Co B, over strength for the first time since it was organized with six (6) Officers and two hundred and two (202) enlisted men. Company B again won the Battalion Award for the Best Mess Hall for the month of June.

The strength for 1 July 1967, was six (6) Officers and two hundred and thirteen (213) enlisted men. This month was spent in training and preparation for exercise Coral Sands II.

On 1 August 1967, there was five (5) Officers and 210 enlisted men assigned to Company B, of which five Officers and one hundred and ninety-two enlisted men departed Schofield Barracks for the island of Molokai Hawaii for participation in exercise Coral Sands II. LT Robert F. Woodruff was reassigned to HHC 11th Inf Bde as Aide-de-Camp to BG Lipscomb, the Brigade Commander, on 1 August 1967. On 9 August 1967, Company B returned to Schofield Barracks, Hawaii, ending their participation in Operation Coral Sands II. 4 August 1967 Company B lost it's 1SG, 1SG Coff, Wilford D. to A Btry, 6th Bn, 11th Arty due to his recent promotion to E-5 in an Artillery MOS. On 15 August 1967, Company B's Executive Officer was reassigned to HHC, 4th Battalion, 3d Infantry to serve

as assistant Adjutant for the Old Guard. The vacancy left by the departure of 1LT Ludden was filled by 1LT John E. Mundy who is at present the Company Executive Officer.


On 1 September, 1967, Co B, had a total of four (4) Officers and one hundred and sixty-four enlisted men. It was during this month that we became positive that shortly we would be moving to a restricted area.

On 1 October 1967, Co B had five Officers and one hundred twenty-six (126) enlisted men. 5 October 1967 we gained one 2LT, LT Robert L. Ross, a recent graduate from OCS at Fort Benning, Georgia. On 17 October 1967, a second Lieutenant was assigned to the unit, 2LT David S. Carter, another recent graduate of OCS.

1 November 1967, found Co B, with seven Officers and one hundred and seventeen enlisted men. This month was almost solely devoted to preparation for Overseas movement.

1 December 1967, found Co B, with six Officers and one hundred and seventeen enlisted men. On 1 Dec 67, we lost 1LT John D. Maier to HQ, USARHAW, G-1 due to his non-deployability with the Brigade to a restricted area. On 5 Dec 67, Co B, 4th Bn, 3d Inf, departed Hawaii for the Republic of Vietnam aboard the troop carrier USNS Gen W. H. Gordon, arriving in Qui Nhon harbor on 19 Dec 67. From there, Co B traveled by motor convoy to its base camp at Duc Pho RVN.

On 4 December 1967, 1LT John E. Mundy assumed Command of the Company due to the absence of the Commander, CPT Earl R. Michles who left in the advance party for RVN, on the 4th of December. 19 December 1967, CPT Earl R. Michles resumed command of the Company upon its arrival in Vietnam.

S-1 HISTORY FEEDER 1967

1. The Old Guard, 4th Battalion 3d Infantry, began the year 1967 with 40 officers and 502 EM out of an authorized strength of 39 officers and 785 EM. The Battalion was commanded by LTC Harold J. Meyer.
2. During January, the 11th Brigade began to renovate and rebuild the Jungle Warfare Training Center in the East Range Area. This required at least a platoon of detail personnel from each battalion per day.
3. On 21 January, the battalion participated in a Brigade change of command ceremony. Major General Hay turned over the command to Colonel Henderson and left to assume command of the 1st Infantry Division in Vietnam.
4. On 25 January, PFC Lambert, SGT Camacho, and SP4 Chambers represented the 11th Brigade in the Hawaii State AAU Boxing Championships. SGT Camacho went on to compete in Japan for USARPAC.
5. At an awards ceremony on 30 January, SP5 Robert C. Olson was presented with an Air Medal and an Army Commendation Medal, and SP4 Ronald T. Whitenack was presented with an Air Medal. The awards were presented by the Battalion Commander, LTC Meyer.
6. On 31 January, The Old Guard presents instruction and firing demonstrations of 81mm Mortars and 106 Recoilles Rifles for the ROTC Department of Leilehua High School. Commendation letter received from Commanding General, 11th Brigade.
7. February found The Old Guard with 39 officers and 585 EM.
8. Early in February, in response to our request, USARPAC authorized The Old Guard to wear its unit insignia sewn on the left breast pocket of the fatigue jacket.
9. On 6 and 8 February, The Old Guard performed Honor Guard Duty for General Freeman CGUSCONARC, and General Ryan CGPACAF. Letters of praise received from several general officers.
10. Due to its outstanding performances on Honor Guard, the 4th Battalion 3d Infantry, on 13 February, designated Honor Guard Battalion for the 11th Brigade.
11. Four officers and six NCO's selected from The Old Guard to act as umpires for 3d Battalion 1st Infantry during their Company Army Training Tests at Pohakalua Training Area on Hawaii from 27 February to 6 March.
12. The strength on 1 March had again risen to a total of 38 officers and 610 EM.
13. On 13 March, the Battalion's Advance Party departed for Pohakalua Training Area on the island of Hawaii to prepare the area for the Main Body's arrival several days later. During the following five weeks, all the companies took their Army Training Tests and completed them satisfactorily.

14. April found The Old Guard still on Hawaii, the strength remaining fairly constant at 38 officers and 605 EM.

15. In late April, a large influx of enlisted personnel direct from basic training arrived in the Brigade to take Advanced Individual Training.

16. The strength figures on 1 May of 37 officers and 823 EM reflect the influx of AIT personnel.

17. On 19 May, The Old Guard held an awards ceremony in Quad C. Bronze Star Medals were presented to PSG Velligas and SGT Bridges, and the Army Commendation Medal (1st OLC) was presented to SPC White. The awards were presented by LTC Meyer, the Battalion Commander.

18. The first of June reflected a further increase in enlisted personnel due to the AIT personnel. Strength was 37 officers and 896 EM.

19. From 11 June to 17 June The Old Guard provided 4 officers and 6 NCO's as umpires for 1st Battalion 20th Infantry Army Training Tests. Several letters of commendation were received praising their performance of duty.

20. July's strength figures reflected 38 officers and 903 EM. The battalion was still considerably over its TO&E strength.

21. On 7 July, The Old Guard conducted a farewell review on Lightning Field for its departing battalion commander, LTC Meyer who was being reassigned to Washington, D. C. The Brigade Commander Brigadier General Andy A. Lipscomb attended.

22. On 17 July, Brigade sent POR/POM teams to the battalion. This was an early indication of possible future deployment overseas.

23. On 21 July, CPT Earl R. Michles of Company B received the CINCUSARPAC Leadership Award for outstanding leadership. He was chosen for this distinction from all the company commanders in the USARPAC Area.

24. On 22 July, LTC Alvin E. Adkins assumes command of the 4th Battalion 3d Infantry, The Old Guard. LTC Adkins came to The Old Guard from THE ARMY WAR COLLEGE.

25. On 28 July, USARPAC suspended all PCS processing (except for ETS) in the 11th Brigade. This was yet another concrete indication of impending deployment.

26. On 1 August, the battalion's strength was 36 officers and 900 EM.

27. From 1-10 August, The Old Guard participated in the 11th Brigade's Amphibious Exercise Coral Sands II, an assault on the island of Molokai. The battalion traveled aboard two ships, the USS Cavalier and the USS Tortuga. The Old Guard and the 11th Brigade received much praise for a job well done.

28. On 15 August IAW USARPAC GO #147, the 11th Infantry Brigade was reorganized into a Light Infantry Structure. This consisted of adding one line company (Delta) and creating a combat support company (Echo) from the 4.2" Mortar Platoon, Recon Platoon and Ground Surveillance Section from Headquarters Company. Our new strength authorization was 44 Officers, one warrant officer, and 886 EM. In order to form Company D, one rifle platoon was taken from each of the existing line companies and selected personnel were chosen from the weapons platoons.

29. September 1 found The Old Guard understrength with 39 officers and 873 enlisted personnel assigned.

30. From 1 September to 15 September LTC Adkins and the other battalion commanders accompanied Colonel Henderson, the Deputy Brigade Commander, on a reconnaissance tour of our probable area of operations in Vietnam.

31. On 29 September, The Old Guard celebrated its Organization Day with athletic events and a non-commissioned officers' review. Company C won the battalion trophy for best company of the day.

32. October found The Old Guard further understrength with the clearing of non-deployable personnel. The assigned strength on 1 October was 40 officers and 712 EM. Most of our non-deployable personnel were reassigned to Korea and Thailand.

33. On 31 October we were officially notified that the 11th Brigade would deploy soon to a "classified location."

34. On 1 November, the assigned strength of The Old Guard was 50 officers and 700 EM.

35. Throughout the month of November, packing, POR/PGM processing, clearing post, and general preparation for overseas deployment were accomplished.

36. On 26 November, Major Roy A. V. Holck departed with the Advance Planning Group for out destination still undisclosed.

37. December's strength figures revealed that we were up to strength with 45 officers assigned but very short enlisted men, with only 700 assigned.

38. On 2 December, the Advance Party of 25 personnel left via aircraft for Vietnam. LTC Adkins and all the company commanders departed in the Advance Party.

39. The Main Body of the battalion departed Honolulu on 6 December aboard the USMS General Gordon.

40. The Main Body arrived in Vietnam on 19 December at Qui Nhon, RVN. After a 50 mile convoy, they were reunited with the Advance Party at Duc Pho, RVN. The battalion set up its base camp there and began training and combat operations.

SUBJECT: Unit History (1967)

Company A, 4th Battalion, 3d Infantry started off 1967 with an assigned strength of 7 officers and 96 EM.

2LT Jan F. Miles was reassigned to B 4/3 on 1 January 1967.

On 15 March 1967, 4 officers and 106 EM departed from Schofield Barracks for training at Pohokuloa Training Area, they were joined the following day by 1 officer and 9 EM. Training at Pohokuloa lasted approximately 5 weeks. At the Brigade ATT, A 4/3 received the highest score of any unit in the 11th Brigade, this score was attained by A 4/3 while considerably under-strength (6 officers - 131 EM).

On 31 March 1967, SSG Kramarewicz retired after serving 20 years in the United States Armed Forces.

On 10 April 1967, this unit had its largest personnel gain of the year, 27 EM were assigned for Advanced Infantry Training.

At the end of the training period at Pohokuloa, on 20 April 1967, the company returned to Schofield Barracks for further training.

1LT William H. Lance was assigned to A 4/3 from C 4/3 on 17 May 1967.

On 30 June 1967, PSG Frank Velligas and SSG Lawrence Minojosa retired from the Army after serving with the Armed Forces for over 20 years. 2LT Rollin Rockett was reassigned to Vietnam on 3 July 1967.

On 10 July 1967, 1LT Vernon A. Campbell was assigned and took over command of the company from MAJ Dale E. Johnson who had been promoted from CPT on 27 April 1967. MAJ Johnson had commanded A 4/3 during the Pohokuloa Training. MAJ Johnson was reassigned to HHC, 11th Inf Bde on 12 July 1967.

A 4/3 joined the rest of the 11th Bde for an assault on the island of Molokai (Operation Coral Sands II) in August 1967. The company arrived off Molokai's coast on 4 August 1967 and watched a demonstration put on by the U.S. Navy and Air Force to show their firepower and accuracy on 5 August 1967.

On 6 August 1967, A 4/3 participated in the tactical assault on Molokai. The intent of the assault was the simulated destruction of SAM sites.

The company performed a tactical withdrawal from Molokai on 8 August 1967 and returned to Schofield Barracks on the S.S. Cavalier. The company arrived at Schofield Barracks on 9 August 1967.

Just after the unit's return from Molokai, Company A was put in charge of organizing and presenting a Weapons Demonstration for the Honolulu VFW. The demonstration was both amusing (Caveman chasing Cavegirl, etc.) and informative and thoroughly enjoyed by those present.

On 15 August 1967, A 4/3 lost 42 EM to D 4/3 as a result of the changed TO&E for a Light Infantry Brigade, ^{3L and 3R respectively} and that ~~date~~ C. Perkins were reassigned to D B

2LT Alva E. Barr was assigned from 11th Bde Replacement Detachment on 9 September 1967 and 2LT Robert C. Anderson and 2LT Timothy D. Carroll were assigned from 11th Bde Replacement Detachment on the 11th and 22nd of October.

In October and November 1967 A 4/3 lost many personnel as a result of the cut-off date set by Department of the Army for personnel to be deployed to Vietnam. The Company's strength was replenished by new personnel from CONUS who had just completed AIT there.

On 1 December 1967, 1LT John M. Taylor was reassigned to USARHAW G-1 awaiting orders for Officer's Flight School.

On 2 December 1967, CPT Vernon A. Campbell and SSG James Spangler departed with the advance party for South Vietnam. The company followed on board the USS General Gordon on 5 December 1967. The unit arrived at Qui Nhon on 19 December 1967 and proceeded to Due Pho to set up operations at LZ Carentan.

The remainder of 1967 was spent in Carentan. A 4/3 served as part of the perimeter guard and became accustomed to administrative policies and field tactics used in Vietnam.

Company B, 4th Battalion, 3d Infantry (The Old Guard) began the year of 1967 with six (6) Officers and ninety-three (93) enlisted men. This figure climbed steadily upward during February, six (6) Officers and one-hundred and twelve (112) enlisted men, and in March there was a total of six (6) Officers and one hundred and twenty-three (123) enlisted men.

On 26 March 1967, five (5) Officers and one hundred and ten (110) enlisted men departed Schofield Barracks, Hawaii as main party for Operation Hoondust VI, at the Pohakuloa Training Area, Kilo Hawaii. Prior to leaving Schofield Barracks, Company B received the Battalion Award for the Best Mess and the Best Supply Room. This was the first time that the Battalion had given these awards.

On 1 April 1967, Co B, had a total to six (6) Officers and one hundred and twenty-six (126) enlisted men. The company Mess Hall again received the Battalion best Mess Award for the month of April. On 19 April 1967, Company B, returned

from extensive Jungle Training on the island of Hawaii to Schofield Barracks where they again set up for the usual organizational duties.

May 1, 1967 found the company with an assigned strength of six(6) Officers and one hundred fifty-four (154) enlisted men. This month was spent getting prepared for the Combat Material Maintenance Inspection (CMMI) and training in the Kubikus. During this month also, on 17 May 1967, we swapped Officers with Co C, 4th Bn, 3d Inf, gaining Lt John D. Maier, 05 331 315, and losing Lt Jan P. Milles, 05 331 321.

1 Jun 1967, found Co B, over strength for the first time since it was organized with six (6) Officers and two hundred and two (202) enlisted men. Company B again won the Battalion Award for the Best Mess Hall for the month of June.

The strength for 1 July 1967, was six (6) Officers and two hundred and thirteen (213) enlisted men. This month was spent in training and preparation for exercise Coral Sands II.

On 1 August 1967, there was five (5) Officers and 210 enlisted men assigned to Company B, of which five Officers and one hundred and ninety-two enlisted men departed Schofield Barracks for the island of Molokai Hawaii for participation in exercise Coral Sands II. 1LT Robert P. Woodruff was reassigned to HHC 11th Inf Bde as Aide-de-Camp to BG Lipscomb, the Brigade Commander, on 1 August 1967. On 9 August 1967, Company B returned to Schofield Barracks, Hawaii, ending their participation in Operation Coral Sands II. 4 August 1967 Company B lost it's 1SG, 1SG Coff, Wilford D. to a Btry, 6th Bn, 11th Arty due to his recent promotion to E-6 in an Artillery MOS. On 15 August 1967, Company B's Executive Officer was reassigned to HHC, 4th Battalion, 3d Infantry to serve

as assistant Adjutant for the Old Guard. The vacancy left by the departure of 1LT Ludden was filled by 1LT John E. Mundy who is at present the Company Executive Officer.


On 1 September, 1967, Co B, had a total of four (4) Officers and one hundred and sixty-four enlisted men. It was during this month that we became positive that shortly we would be moving to a restricted area.

On 1 October 1967, Co B had five Officers and one hundred twenty-six (126) enlisted men. 5 October 1967 we gained one 2LT, LT Robert L. Ross, a recent graduate from OCS at Fort Benning, Georgia. On 17 October 1967, a second Lieutenant was assigned to the unit, 2LT David S. Carter, another recent graduate of OCS.

1 November 1967, found Co B, with seven Officers and one hundred and seventeen enlisted men. This month was almost solely devoted to preparation for Overseas movement.

1 December 1967, found Co B, with six Officers and one hundred and seventeen enlisted men. On 1 Dec 67, we lost 1LT John D. Maier to HQ, USAIDIAW, C-1 due to his non-deployability with the Brigade to a restricted area. On 5 Dec 67, Co B, 14th Bn, 3d Inf, departed Hawaii for the Republic of Vietnam aboard the troop carrier USNS Gen W. H. Gordon, arriving in Qui Nhon harbor on 19 Dec 67. From there, Co B traveled by motor convoy to its base camp at Duc Pho RVN.

On 4 December 1967, 1LT John E. Mundy assumed Command of the Company due to the absence of the Commander, CPT Carl R. Michles who left in the advance party for RVN, on the 4th of December. 19 December 1967, CPT Carl R. Michles resumed command of the Company upon its arrival in Vietnam.

UNIT HISTORY

Company C, 4th Battalion 3d Infantry, 11th Infantry Brigade since 1 January 1967 to date has undergone training and reorganization in preparation for the mission it is now committed to.

Company C, 4th Battalion 3d Infantry, had a total strength of 105 EM and 5 OFF in January 1967. The Commanding Officer was CPT John P. McAnaw and the Executive Officer was 2LT John D. Maier. During the time between January and March Training was limited and consisted mainly small group training, but future training was to be more flexible and geared to possible deployment to any part of the Pacific. In March and April, Company C was involved in Operation Moondust IV. The name was taken from the moon like terrain of the Pohakuloa Training Area. Operation Moondust IV was a resounding success and emphasized the the need for more useful training of this type. Since the mission of the 11th Brigade was to be ready for possible deployment to any place in the Pacific by land, sea or air more training of a wider scope was soon to follow.

During May of 1967, Company C lost, due to reorganization, a few key personnel to other companies in the battalion. Among a few EM we also lost our Executive Officer, 2LT John D. Maier, 1st Platoon Leader, 2LT William Lance and 2nd Platoon Sergeant Cleveland McBee. At this time Company C gained competent leaders, such as 2LT Grady Middleton, the new Executive Officer and 2LT Jan F. Miles who became the 2nd Platoon Leader.

Company strength during the months of April and May was bolstered from 5 OFF and 128 EM to 6 OFF and 209 EM. These new personnel, the majority of them coming from stateside AIT companies, became familiar with the M16A1, the rifle that was making a name for itself in Southeast Asia. During June and July, the AIT personnel, who were trained in Hawaii, were divided among the companies. These personnel were familiar with the terrain and weather and proved themselves to be well trained and disciplined soldiers.

During August the training was stepped up to emphasize the need for well trained troops, since the situation in Southeast Asia wasn't improving and troop commitments were on the rise. More training was soon in coming. Thru a combined effort of the Army, Navy, Air Force and the Hawaiian Reserves Operation Coral Sands II was planned. Company C's part in Operation Coral Sands II was to be the Brigade reserve. One hour after the exercise began Company C got the word to move. The performance of the men and officers of Company C was outstanding to say the least and the operation was deemed a success in every way.

After Operation Coral Sands II, the 11th Brigade was destined for future deployment because of the high degree of its leaders and its well trained troops. During the months of September and October jungle training was emphasized and a jungle school was established. Company C was the school host and the training was excellent. After the completion of this, Company C underwent training geared to test the flexibility of newly organized Light Weapons Infantry structure. These exercises could only show what the men and officers of Company C and the 11th Brigade had learned over the long hard months behind them. They proved the point, we were ready.

Company C, during August, as well as others lost several officers and men to the newly formed Companies Delta and Echo, but our lost was the Battalions gain. We also lost our Commanding Officer, CPT John P. Mcanaw. At this time 1LT Grady Middleton took command. 1LT Alfred J. Lopresti was assigned as the new Executive Officer.

During October there was another change of command. CPT John R. Sam was assigned. CPT Sam is a West Point graduate and a combat veteran of Vietnam. His presence in Company C is an asset in itself. 1LT Middleton was once again the Executive Officer and 1LT Lopresti departed for flight school. The assignment of three Officer Candidate graduates added greatly to the training and leadership of the company. 2LT Dennis Fedder took command of the second platoon, 2LT John Scully took command of the first platoon and 2LT Sean P. Maloney took command of the third platoon. Our Weapons Platoon Leader 1LT Floyd W. McLean is another asset to the company.

Also during this period our unit gained a badly needed first sergeant. First Sergeant Edward E. Burkett was assigned the 8th of November 1967.

On the 2nd of December 1967, our advance party departed for Vietnam. It consisted of CPT John R. Sam and SGT Russell Hague. On the 5th of December 1967, the remainder of the unit boarded the USNS GORDON TAP 117. The voyage was two weeks in length. This unit arrived in Quin Nhon on the 19th of December 1967.

Company C was the first unit of this Battalion to make enemy contact. This was accomplished while the Battalion was based at Carentan South Vietnam. Company C, was also first in receiving its Combat Infantrymans' Badges.

During the short history of Company C, 4th Battalion 3d Infantry, 11th Infantry Brigade we have been fortunate in the leadership and character of the men we have had serve. The training has been excellent and the awards have been numerous. This Company is an outstanding example of the units that serve under the name of the Old Guard.

SUBJECT: History of Company E (15 August 1967 to 31 December 1967)

Echo Company owes its young history to the expansion of the 4th Battalion 3d Infantry (The Old Guard). The Battalion added Echo Company to its command on 15 August 1967. CPT Kenneth N. Hendrix assumed command (Unit Orders Number 1) and was given the challenging task of forming a fighting unit from scratch. 1LT William H. LaMontagne, a former Recon Platoon Leader from Headquarters Company, took over as Executive Officer. SFC Harold D. Burchett, a former 4.2 Mortar Platoon Sergeant from Headquarters Company, was assigned Echo Company 1st Sergeant. Echo Company was given a TOE authorization of 4 Officers and 96 EN.

Immediately after the Company was activated, the Officers and Men were informed by CPT Hendrix that the 11th Light Infantry Brigade had been put on alert for future deployment to a restricted area. This meant the Company had between 90 and 180 days to prepare itself, for what was almost for certain, near-future combat in Vietnam.

The Recon Platoon, led by 2LT Christopher Lane, began stepped-up training in the Kahukas near Schofield Barracks. This training consisted of both night and day recon patrols. Vietnam SOP's were practiced over

and over until everything and every move became automatic. Spirit and morale was high and training was serious and meaningful. Recon was aware of their future assignment; they were going to be ready.

The 4.2 Mortar Platoon also knew they needed much training to develope themselves into a polished 4.2 team. The Platoon Leader, 1LT Paul C. Perkins, coordinated with the various line companies within the Battalion, therefore increasing their proficiency in supporting the line companies with fire missions.

The Ground Surveillance Section, under the supervision of SSG Adolphus E. Powell, began intensive training with the PPS 4 Radar Set. The section began studying various types of terrain similar to that found in Vietnam. They learned the advantages and disadvantages of different types of terrains. They became very proficient in distinguishing between the various types of targets; they were able to distinguish between individual personnel and squad-size personnel, between a $\frac{1}{2}$ -ton vehicle and a 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ -ton vehicle. They were to be the night eyes and ears of the Battalion in Vietnam. By the end of August, Radar had a full TOE with each individual proficient in operating the sets.

Echo Company had grown in strength, by the end of August, to a total of 4 Officers and 77 EM.

5 September 1967 marked a shocking and sad experience for the Company. SP4 Lewis E. Gentry, one of the dependable member of the Recon Platoon, drowned during a river-crossing exercise. The entire Company joined in the bereavement at Memorial Services held the Sunday following the tragedy.

Many of the personnel, due to their short time left in the Army, were declared non-deployable and were assigned to a non-deployable unit; consequently, the strength of the Company dropped sore what to 4 Officers and 75 EM by the end of September.

On 19 October 1967, 2LT Lane was reassigned to another unit within the Brigade. Taking his place was 2LT Bruce A. Kendrick, a former Rifle Platoon Leader from "The Old Guard's" Charley Company.

On 27 October 1967, due to his non-deployable status, 1LT Perkins was replaced by 2LT Thomas J. Sarasin. 2LT Sarasin, a recent graduate of Officer Candidate School, attended FDC School prior to coming to Schofield Barracks.

The end of October showed a slight increase in personnel strength with 79 EM and 4 Officers.

On 8 November 1967 SFC Dorchett, a non-deployable, was replaced as 1st Sergeant by 1SG E-S Argen L. Dodds Jr. 1SG Dodds was a veteran of World War II and the Korean Conflict.

Just as in October, November showed but a slight increase in personnel strength with 4 Officers and 80 EM.

December was the month of reckoning as Echo Company, "The Old Guard" and the 11th Light Infantry Brigade deployed to a restricted area overseas. That restricted area of course was to be The Republic of Vietnam.

On 3 December 1967, CPT K. M. Hendrix and SSG "J" "D" Hickman departed Hawaii on the advanced party. The advanced party was to prepare the new location for the arrival of the Brigade in Vietnam. In CPT Hendrix's absence, 1LT LaMontagne assumed command (Unit Orders Number 17).

The Brigade boarded the USNS General Gordon on 4 December 1967 and the following morning began its 14 day voyage across the Pacific. For the majority of the men, this was the first experience on an ocean voyage; and also for the majority of the men it was a most uncomfortable experience. Almost everyone experienced sea-sickness, not to mention the boredom which increased day by day. There was one bright note, however, 2LT Kendrick was promoted to 1LT Kendrick.

On 19 December the USNS General Gordon docked at Qui Nhon RVN. The Brigade traveled by truck convoy to its permanent headquarters at Duc Pho. CPT Hendrix once again assumed command of the Company (Unit Orders Number 20).

It was not long before Echo Company got its first taste of war. On 23 December 1967, SGT Paul R. Maddox, a 4.2 Forward Observer attached to Delta Company, was out on a night patrol when he decided to move ahead of the patrol to get better observation to call in 4.2 fire. SGT Maddox walked into a VC ambush and was killed by small-arms fire. His death came just one day after his 25th birthday. SGT Maddox was posthumously awarded the Bronze Star with "V" Device.

Echo Company's personnel strength remained fairly constant during December. The assigned strength showed 4 Officers and 81 EN ending the month of December and the year 1967.

November Activities

December Activities

The majority of the S-1 Section worked for CPT Menist who performed the duties of Ship's Adjutant for the officers and men aboard the USMS General Gordon. Among the duties of the Adjutant were the following:

1. Responsible for issuing orders, memoranda, and bulletins as directed by the Senior Unit Commander.
2. Published daily bulletins and assisted in publishing daily newspaper.
3. Prepared and maintained troop, duty, and compartment rosters.
4. Responsible for conducting daily eight ID Card musters.
5. Kept troops informed concerning drills, regulations, etc.
6. Maintained organizational records.
7. Insured that specified duties were performed by detail personnel.
8. Prepared and reviewed Ship's Article 15's.
9. Performed normal administrative duties for all units aboard.
10. Handled all mail.
11. Coordinated Chaplain's activities and shipboard training. (Area availability)
12. Processed nine (9) emergency leaves.
13. Prepared debarkation rosters.

The S-1 Section of the Advance Party worked with LT Ludden and accomplished the following:





SEQUENCE OF EVENTS

1. All participants and colors in position NLT ~~1345~~ hours.
2. When Col Henderson, LTC Adkins and LTC Barker have assumed their positions, COT commands "present arms" and reports "Sir, the Command is formed." LTC ~~Barker~~ returns the salute.
ADKINS
3. COT gives troops "order arms" and "parade rest."
4. COL Henderson, LTC Adkins and LTC Barker move forward and halt six steps in front of the COT and salutes are exchanged. COT guides the reviewing party around the formation, beginning with the unit on the right of the line, passing between the front rank of troops and company commanders and then around the rear of the formation.
5. As the reviewing party approaches, each company commander gives "attention" and "eyes right." The guidon bearer executes present guidon, the company commanders execute eyes right and hand salute. Each soldier turns his eyes and head to the right. As soon as the reviewing party comes into their line of vision, they follow with their eyes, turning their heads, until it reaches their front. The company commander commands "order arms," so that he and the guidon bearer terminate the salute together. Troops remain at attention during remainder of inspection.
6. COT halts and salutes after passing around the line and arriving at the right front of the 1st company. The reviewing party and COT exchange salutes and return to their posts.
7. When each have resumed their post, COT commands "colors, center" (pause). Staff executes right face. COT then commands "march." Staff moves to the right far enough to provide clearance for the colors to pass. The Staff then halts and executes left face. COT proceeds forward with the colors halting 10 steps in front of reviewing party. COT salutes and reports "Sir, the colors are present." LTC Adkins returns the salute and directs the COT to return to his post. COT commands "parade rest." (If award is presented, step 8 is carried out, otherwise delete).
8. The reviewing party moves to a position 5 steps in front of the colors. LTC Adkins faces to the front and LTC Barker assumes a position to the left of Col Henderson. Citation is read and award is presented.
9. After presentation of award LTC Adkins faces about and Col Henderson and LTC Barker assume a position on his left. The battalion Sergeant Major (1SG Moats) moves by most direct route to position in front of the battalion colors. Assumption of Command orders are read. Sergeant Major takes battalion colors from color bearer, faces about and moves to a position in front of LTC Adkins. Colors are presented to LTC Adkins who faces to the left and passes colors to Col Henderson. LTC Barker faces to the right and receives the colors from Col Henderson. LTC Barker faces to the left and returns colors to Sergeant Major who in turn returns colors to color bearer. Reviewing party and Sergeant Major resume their post. COT commands "battalion, attention."

10. When all parties have returned to their posts, senior color bearer commands "colors, post, march." Colors reverse march and return to their post. COT moves staff to their original position after colors have passed.

c. All battalion vehicles received scheduled or ahead of schedule lubrication and adjustment during February. Prescribed service frequency is inadequate for vehicles operated under prevailing conditions.

d. 12 automotive and 16 small items including sights, weapons, and binoculars were evacuated to support maintenance. All but a wrecked 3/4 ton were repaired and returned to service.

3. Transportation:

a. Daily convoys of 2 trucks were dispatched in support of Fire Base Dotty.

b. Six (6) convoys were used on round trips to Brance. These varied from 2 to 6 trucks in size and accompanied daily MP escort.

c. 126 CH 47 sorties and over 320 UH 1-3 sorties were flown from Battalion Helipad in resupply role. February marked first time helicopter resupply of fire bases at night by CH 47 was employed by 4/3 Inf. Artillery smoke was lifted to Fire Base Uptight from 2130 to 2345 hours.

d. Turn around time for CH 47 at \$1800 per hour results in water cost of \$1.34 per gallon at Fire Base Sue and \$1.60 per gallon at Uptight as opposed to Dotty's cost of under 2¢ per gallon via road.

1. Summary of Enemy Situation.

a. Current Intsums, Americal Div and 3 Bde, 4th Inf Div

b. Enemy Forces:

(1) Approximately 2,600 enemy troops are known to be operating in the Mo Duc/Duc Pho districts. This figure does not include part time village and hamlet guerrillas and supporters. The following locations are of the units operating generally around the 11th Bde defensive area (Carentan).

(2) 97th VC Main Force Bn

The 97th Bn infiltrated SVN from Feb - Jul 1964 as the 703d Infiltration Group with a total strength of 600. The battalion was trained by the 338th NVA Brigade and cadre from the 308th NVA Division prior to each infiltration. Each company of the battalion infiltrated separately leaving at three day intervals; each group taking the designation of 703, 703A, etc. The battalion was designated the 97th upon its arrival in SVN and was assigned to the 2d VC regiment. The current strength of the battalion is estimated at 350-400. A summary of its engagement is contained in Appendix 1 to Annex B (Intelligence).

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(3) 83d Local Force Bn

The 83d (also known as the 38th) was formed in Tu NGHIA, Quang Ngai in 1964. One-third of the strength of the battalion consisted of North Vietnamese including cadre and soldiers and the remainder were South Vietnamese. The battalion is well-trained and has received many awards and promotions. The 83d is trained in raid, ambush and attack tactics. The battalion has received training in various night tactics involving raiding, harrassing and sabotage of bridges and friendly installations. Members of the battalion have attended various training courses conducted by the Quang NGAI province Politico - Military Training School headed by Tran Mat, former commander of the 48th LF Infantry Battalion, located north of Duc Pho. Squad and platoon level courses at the school consists of teaching fire and maneuver and basic combat tactics. The battalion will normally deploy its companies to operate independently to harrass friendly outposts and installations. At times the battalion will assemble the units to conduct a coordinated attack using indirect fire to cover their approach and then attack from two to three sides at once. Companies of the battalion will at times coordinate with supporting units and local force elements in the area to conduct attacks on villages, outposts, and friendly installations. Its estimated strength is now 350. A summary of its engagements is contained in Appendix 1 to Annex B (Intelligence).

a. Training and tactics

(1) The C-19 LF Sapper Company of MO DUC (D) has received basic infantry military training including training in raids, ambushes, attacks on outposts and installations and attacks on bridges. The unit has recently received sapper training and is expected to employ sapper tactics rather than the basic infantry tactics.

b. Logistics

(1) Supplies for the C-19 Sapper Company are obtained through district channels. This is for ammo and medical supplies. The unit depends on the local villages and its organic production unit for good supplies. Replacements for the unit are provided by the indoctrination of local guerrillas and up-grading them to the local force level. Some replacements may come from the Politico-Military Training School of QUANG NGAI Province.

c. History

The C-19 LF Sapper Company of MO DUC (D) was activated in 1964 as the C-19 LF Infantry Company and has operated almost exclusively within the boundaries of the district. Some of the previous combat experiences of the company include:

- (1) 7 Jan 1967 Counter-sweep operations
- (2) 3 Mar 1967 Attack on MO DUC District
- (3) 14 Mar 1967 Attack and counter-ambush at MO CAY
- (4) 9 April 1967 Attack at NUI DAT 9 KIA
- (5) 14 April 1967 Attack at DONG CAC 2 KIA
- (6) May 1967 Received 37 replacements
- (7) Jun 1967 Engaged in MO DUC 7 KIA, 3 CIA

(8) Aug 1967 Statements of PW's and low level agent reports indicate C-19 Company split to form C-19B LF Sapper Company and possibly C-19A Infantry unit.

4. 93d Main Force En vic BS 6629 (Suspected)

a. Unit History:

The 93d En infiltrated SVN in mid 1964 and recruited 1/3 of its strength from QUANG NAM, QUANG NGAI and BINH DINH provinces during infiltration. Captured documents indicate that the battalion personnel from NVN infiltrated as the 707 group. These documents have linked the 707A and 707B infiltration groups to the 93d battalion. The Battalion was assigned to the 2d VC Regiment upon its arrival in SVN. A summary of combat experience of the battalion includes:

(1) Early in 1967 The bn operated mainly in BA TO (D), QUANG NGAI (P) and by April of 67 had an estimated strength of 350-400. Bn contacted heavily during operations MALHEUR I and II during April-July 1967. And an additional 24 KIA (BC) and numerous WIA during period Apr-Jul 67. Aug 67, Bn moved into BINH DINH (P).

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Captured documents indicate strength of 300.

5. 48th LF Bn (Suspected movement from vic 7479 South to 11th Ede AO)

a. Training and Tactics:

(1) The 48th LF Infantry Bn has received raid training at squad, platoon, company and battalion level. It has conducted night raid training, ambush and coordinated attack training. Members of the battalion have attended various training courses conducted by the QUANG NGAI Province POLITICO-MILITARY TRAINING SCHOOL, headed by NHUYEN MAT, former commander of the 48th LF Bn. Squad and platoon level courses at the school consists of teaching fire and maneuver and basic combat tactics. The battalion will attack RF and PF outposts, allied operations, and will conduct sabotage of installations. The battalion will combine with other local force and sapper units to carry out an attack. While operational the battalion will make a tactical move every 3-7 days whenever possible to avoid detection or major contact with allied units.

b. Logistics

(1) The battalion received replacements from villages within the province. It also can receive replacements from local force companies operating in the area or may have members assigned after their completion of the training course conducted by the Provincial Training School. The battalion depends on the Provincial Headquarters for ordnance and medical supplies. Food substances are obtained from Villages within the battalion's present area of operation and many time the acquirement of food substances is in the way of tax levy placed on the villagers. The battalion has its own production section for growing food but friendly operations have reduced the effectiveness of the unit to provide food for the entire battalion.

c. History

The 401st Provincial Independent Company became the 1st Co/48th Bn, the 802d Provincial Independent Company became the 2nd Co/48th Bn, the 3d Company/48th Bn was composed of personnel reassigned from various district units, the 4th Company drew personnel from the district forces and the 1st, 2d, 3d companies /48th Bn. The 48th LF Bn of QUANG NGAI (P) was activated on 1 Aug 1965 at BINH DUC (V), SON TINH (D), QUANG NGAI (P) with a strength of 500-550 men. The Cadre, from company to Bn level, were returnees from regroupment cadre, while the remaining strength was either guerrillas from Villages and districts or young draftees from the QUANG NGAI and QUANG TIN areas. Some of the activities of the battalion include:

1. SITUATION:

a. Enemy Forces. Annex B (Intelligence)

b. Friendly Forces. OPORD 21-67

c. Attachments and detachments. None

d. Area intelligence:

(1) The population of the 11th Bde AO is approximately 123,000.

(2) There are 22,000 refugees residing within the (RD) Revolutionary Development areas. See OPORD overlay.

e. Assumptions:

(1) The VC infrastructure in the Duc Pho district is strong enough to levy and collect taxes from all people not residing within the RD areas.

(2) The population outside of the RD areas is generally sympathetic to the enemy cause.

(3) The (GVN) Government of Vietnam is capable of providing normal governmental services within the RD areas of Duc Pho district.

2. MISSION:

The 4th Bn 3d Inf will provide support for revolutionary development projects, deny the enemy needed foodstuffs which he often collects in taxes, protect nationals against reprisals, and increase US/GVN influence over the Bn area of operations.

3. EXECUTION:

a. Concept of operations:

(1) All companies will participate in civic action projects concurrently with other operations as directed.

(2) The Medical Section will participate in MEDCAP activities for indigenous personnel as directed.

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(3) Operations within the AO are not expected to generate many refugees, however, all units are responsible for the humanitarian treatment and care of any found until they can be turned over to GVN control. It is not anticipated that such persons will remain in the hands of the 4th Bn 3d Inf longer than 24 hours.

(4) Curfew in the AO is from BMNT to EENT with the exception of RD areas, which is from BMCT to 2100 hours.

(5) All Commanders are responsible for proper conduct of their troops towards civilians.

(6) Request for psyops support (leaflet and loudspeaker) will be coordinated through S-5 channels.

(7) If U.S. Military operations cause civilian loss of property, injury or death report the incident immediately to the S-5.

4. ADMINISTRATION AND LOGISTICS:

a. Provisions for care and feeding of refugees generated by operations will be procured through S-5 channels.

b. Request transportation for the evacuation of refugees through the S-5.

c. Hire of indigenous personnel is authorized on a daily basis. Payment will be made in the local currency at a rate commensurate with salaries paid on the local economy.

d. Money for the salaries of the indigenous laborers is provided by the S-5 11th Inf Bde on a weekly basis Monday through Sunday inclusive.

e. Contact with civilians will be reported to the S-5. Reports should contain a short narrative description of circumstances, names, location by coordinates, dates and times.

5. COMMAND AND SIGNAL:

(2) Class II & IV

(a) Units maintain 30-day level of expendables and PLL. Request from S-4.

(b) Barrier Materiel. Requested as required from S-4.

(3) Class III

(a) Vehicles refuel from 6th Spt Bn supply point. Coord 845369 (Carentan Airstrip) 1400 to 1600 hours daily.

(b) Bulk Diesel and gas for ranges, generators and latrines will be picked up as needed in 5 gallon cans from Bde Class III supply point.

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(c) PLL available at Bn S-4 for non-automotive. Bn Motor Pool
for vehicles.

(4) Class V

(a) Units report all expended ammunition by 0800 hours daily to
Bn Ammo NCO at S-4.

(b) Units report all 81mm and 4.2 in ammo on hand by 1400 hours
daily.

(c) Unit resupply by Bn Ammo Section NLT 1600 hours daily.

(d) Emergency ammo request to S-4 or Svc Platoon Leader as required.

b. Helicopter sling load pickup zone is LZ Living End via Coord 851367.

c. Transportation: Troop movement requests thru S-3. Supplies requested
from S-4.

d. Laundry: Company X01's coordinate with S-4 NLT 0830 hours daily.

3. MEDICAL EVACUATION AND HOSPITALIZATION:

a. Evacuation:

(1) Primary means of evacuation is by air.

(2) Med-Evac helicopters are located at 3d Bde, 4th Div. Requests for
Med-Evac will be sent by radio to Doctor Control on frequency 46.90. Appendix
1 is format for Med-Evac request.

(3) All casualties within Brigade base area will be evacuated thru the
Bn Aid Station. Any casualty which is felt by the medic should be medi-evaced,
should be sent to the Bn Aid Station. The Aid Station should be notified prior
to his arrival in order that arrangements be made with 6th Spt for evacuation.

b. Hospitalization:

(1) Short-term medical, short-term surgical, and patients pending
medical diagnosis will be hospitalized at Brigade Clearing Station.

(2) Major casualties will be evacuated to Qui Nhon for hospitalization.

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c. Sick Call:

(1) Line units will be seen by their senior aid man. If necessary, individuals will be sent to the Bn Aid Station.

(2) Headquarters personnel and other individuals located in Bn Base area will be seen in the Bn Aid Station from 0730 - 0830 hours daily. Emergencies will be seen anytime.

4. PERSONNEL:

9 Combat Infantry Badge. Recommendation submitted in letter form to Battalion.

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

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

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

406th Sapper Battalion:

Weapons: 1-81mm mortar, 3-60mm mortar, 2-57mm RR, 4-B40 RL, machine guns, individual weapons.

Personnel: CO- Luyen, XO- Dan, PO- Tran Tan Doc, APO- Luc.

The 406th Sapper Bn was formed in April 1967 from a newly infiltrated unit from NVN and elements of the 409th Sapper Bn. The unit is well trained in sapper and infantry tactics. Members have been taught techniques of crossing various types of terrain and obstacles while advancing on an objective, use of explosive charges, bangalore, and hand grenades. The unit will normally carefully recon its objective and hold sandtable exercises before an attack. In attacking a target, penetration cells will move forward and effect an opening in any barbed wire obstacles. A mortar attack will be initiated simultaneously to the opening of an entrance to the objective area to deny friendly forces observation of the penetration cells. Upon completion of an attack, the individuals will exfiltrate the area and regroup at a predesignated point from there to a rest area. The Bn is now believed to be subordinate to the 401st Sapper Regt which allegedly participated in the 31 January attack on Quang Ngai City.

120th Montagnard Battalion:

Strength: 400

Weapons: unk

Personnel: CO- Dinh Quyen (aka Lam), XO- Dinh Doi, PO- Nguyen Dau.

The 120th Bn had been in existence since 1953. The majority of the cadre are veterans of the Viet Minh/French War and have fought in Laos. The unit has been trained in raid, ambush, and on installations tactics. The 1st, 2d, 3d companies are specifically trained to act as attacking forces against strongholds. The 4th and 5th companies are trained to act as a blocking force, and the 6th (support company) is well trained to support the other companies with indirect and HMG fire. In September 1967, the Bn attacked Tam Ky along with the 70 Bn and V16 Co. Over 200 VC were killed from these units. The Bn participated in the 31 January attack on Quang Ngai City.

81st Battalion:

Strength: 360

Weapons: 1-82mm mortar, 2-57mm RR, 4-B40 RL, individual weapons

Personnel: CO- Vo An, XO- Hien, PO- Le Van Hanh

The 81st Bn has been in existence since at least June 1967 when its designation was changed from 85 to 81. The unit participated in attacks in Oct and Nov 1967 and recently participated in the attack on Quang Ngai City.

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506B Sapper Company:



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

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REPORTS OF ENEMY LOCATIONS WITHIN AREA OF CONCERN

1. 23 Feb 68: 81st VC Bn was deployed at AN HOA hamlet. Commander NGUYEN DUC HOANG. Estimated strength: 450 personnel, including 30 women. Armaments included: an undetermined number of mortars and a variety of individual weapons. Personnel wore green khaki uniforms with parachute scarves. Attached to the unit were approx 100 laborers. At time of observation, personnel were repairing and building combat positions at the above location. Their mission: To attack Quang Ngai City at an undetermined time.
2. 21 Feb 68: Two companies of the 81st Bn with an estimated strength of 200 men including 20 N Vietnamese, were deployed at SUOI TO Stream. The units were armed with an undetermined number of 60mm mortars, B-40 RL, automatic rifles and individual weapons. They carried food and dry rice. At time of observation they were building combat positions at the above location. Their mission is to reinforce other undetermined units.
3. 23 Feb 68: 107th "Mountain Gun" Bn was deployed in the vic of PHUOC TRUNG. Estimated strength of 400 men. Weapons include one (1) 82mm mort, 3-57mm RR, 1-75mm RR, 1-12,5mm AA machine gun, and an undetermined quantity of light machine guns, automatic rifles and individual weapons. Personnel wore green, tan khaki, and grey uniforms. Each person carried with him enough food for five (5) days. Accompanying the units were approx 40 montagnard laborers. Their mission: to give artillery support to other units during the second offensive.
4. 24 Feb 68: 409th Sapper Bn was deployed at AN MY 545753. Commander: Maj THANH. Estimated strength of 450 men. Armaments include three 82mm mortar, two AA guns, and an undetermined number of 75 and 57mm RR, Flame throwers, and individual weapons. Personnel wore black and grey uniforms. Each person carried enough food for five days. Their present location is TRUNG PHUOC. Their mission: to shell and attack Quang Ngai Airstrip, Hill 10 outpost and 4th Regt ARVN Hqs.
5. 21 Feb 68: An unidentified VC Bn with an estimated strength of 360 men was deployed in the vicinity of SONG GIANG River. The unit was armed with an undetermined number and variety of weapons. The personnel wore black and grey uniforms., Each person carried with him enough food for 5 days. Accompanying the unit were approx 80 laborers. Mission: to attack SON TINH District Hqs.

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6. 21 Feb 68: Approx 200 Mantagnard laborers were located in the vic of HUNG NHUONG. They were in the process of preparing mortar shells for movement. Every four shells were tied together and put into baskets. Total number of mortar shells is undetermined. Security for the group was provided by a district forces unit commanded by LAM TEN. This unit consisted of 150 men who are armed with one 60mm mortar, one 57mm RR, one light machinegun, and an unknown number of automatic rifles. Commo equipment consisted of PRC-10 Radio.

7. 22 Feb 68: VC Bn TD/401 was located vic GO CAO (TAM AN). This unit participated in the last attack on QUANG NGAI. No other information is available at this time.

8. 20 Feb 68: 150 laborers from TU PHUOC, TU MY, & TU THINH villages; they were mobilized to cut down bamboo to build rafts which are scattered along the border of the TRA KHUC River. Their plan is unknown.

9. 22 Feb 68: A VC Regiment commanded by KHANH had been moved from QUANG TIN (p) to station at SON NAM (v). No other information available at this time.

10. 14 Feb 68: Approx 500 VC soldiers including regular and main forces, commanded by Maj Gen VO THU and PHAM KIET. They were to disguise as ARVN. Wpns included many kinds of crew served guns. They plan to utilize boats to move troops to land at THI PHO DONG, THU LO, THACH BICH. No new information is available.

11. 22 Feb 68: A VC District Force company stationed at PHUOC LOC. This unit brought with them 600 laborers and they plan to launch some attacks on SON TINH District Hqs, Bo De Bridge, SON TRUNG Post, and also to shell into QUANG NGAI sector, 2d ARVN Div Hqs and the QUANG NGAI Airfield.

12. 19 Feb 68: NVA Regt NR 19, commanded by GIAP, having lost approx 400 men during the TET offensive, was located vic TU MY village and TU PHUOC village. Their intention at that time was to convalesce in this area.

13. 24 Feb 68: A VC Regular regt, name and commander unknown, dressed in yellow khaki clothes with forest caps. Wpns: one B-120 rkt, 5 B-40 RL, many mortars and IMGs. This unit moved from BINH DINH Province to the western TU NGHIA District, then they crossed the TRA KHUC river by bamboo float on 23 Feb to relocate at SON DONG (v) (BS455772). Also outside the PHU SON area (BS485808) beside BA GIA mountain was located a VC Bn belonging to VC ("THAI NGUYEN") Regt 299.

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

2. MISSION: Provide fire support to 4-3 Inf TF during OPERATION SHOW LOW in the area bounded by the SONG TRA KHUC, east-west grid line BS61, north-south grid line BS56, and north-south grid line BS40.

3. EXECUTION:

a. Concept of operation.

(1) General: This will be a search and destroy operation during which artillery will be required to have a capability to fire 6400 mils.

(2) Maneuver: Artillery will move into positions on D-2 and D-1 and be prepared to cover movement of maneuver elements on D-1 and fire preparations on designated landing zones on D-Day.

(3) Fire Support:

(a) Artillery will be prepared to fire west of north-south grid line BS39 and north of the SONG TRA KHUC in addition to the normal zone of action.

(b) Phase 1 and 2 normal on call fire support.

(c) Phase 3 air preparation at H-40 minutes; artillery preparation at H-8 minutes on LZ KOA. See 3c(3).

(1) 7th Air Force operates MSQ-77 "Combat Sky Spot" radar controlled bombing system at Pleiku (AR7850) and at Dong Ha (YB2461) in support of all weather air operations. 7th Air Force provides overall tactical air support for immediate and planned targets.

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(2) 1st Marine Air Wing (MAW) provides air support as requested, to include TPQ-10 radar bombing systems from Quang Ngai (BS6172) and Chu Lai (BT5211) in support of all weather operations.

(1) General: The artillery will complete its coordination of positions and the forward fire support coordination center will displace to the vicinity of Quang Ngai during Phase I.

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

1. AREA OF OPERATIONS.

A. WEATHER.

The area from KHAM DUC east to ZC 1210 is presently in the rainy season. At night and early morning hours there will be low cloud ceilings below 1000 ft. For and occasional drizzle will prevail throughout the area and visibility will be limited to 1-3 miles. East of the mountains (ZC1210) skies will be generally good from 0700H to midafternoon with scattered clouds at 1500 to 2500 feet with visibility up to 7 miles. Afternoon thunderstorms and rainshowers can be expected. The rivers in the objective area are fairly high and will not cause flooding or damage unless heavy rainfall occurs.

B. TERRAIN.

(1) EXISTING SITUATION.

(a) The major portion of the objective area is made up of rugged mountains which are covered mainly by dense undergrowth and multicanopied forest. This vegetation necessarily limits foot and vehicular movement primarily to known trails and roads.

(b) Routes of communication are primarily limited to the rivers, valleys, and stream beds. Vehicluar traffic is limited to the existing roads. Foot traffic throughout the objective area will be severely restricted. With the exception of known trails, roads, and the valley floors, foot traffic will be poor.

The canopy and dense undergrowth affords the enemy a measure of protection from aerial surveillance and tactical air and arty. The terrain lends itself to an extensive enemy ambush capability. In addition, well concealed anti-aircraft positions may be abundant. In the jungle area the enemy is capable of moving virtually free from detection.

(3) EFFECTS ON OUR COURSE OF ACTION.

(a) The terrain generally denies the friendly forces airmobile operations except at prepared LZ's. Aerial reconnaissance will be restricted in the canopied areas, but good along established trails, roads, and rivers. The nature of the terrain will make infantry movement slow and difficult.

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3. ENEMY SITUATION

1. GENERAL: The area of operation must be regarded as an enemy sanctuary. The terrain throughout the area of concern provides the enemy with natural cover and concealment. The general lack of friendly operations in the area, combined with the natural protection of the terrain, has afforded the enemy the opportunity to establish logistical and headquarters complexes free from friendly interference.

2. HIEP DUC. Friendly combat sweeps southeast of Hiep Duc (AT9024) have resulted in the discovery of battalion size base camps and various sized hospitals/aid stations. Caches of moderate size have been found along the Song Chang River. Due south of Hiep Duc there have been no previous combat sweep operations. The recent development of an improved trail leading southeast from highway 534 at AT8119 to AT9306 points towards this area as the possible heart of the enemy's forward logistical base. The 3rd NVA Regiment, 2nd NVA division has been identified in the AT9318 area.

3. Easter highway 534/North from Kham Duc to Hiep Duc has been the subject of considerable development and use by the enemy in the past 30 days. Air-strikes have done considerable damage to the bridges and culverts but by-passes have been established and movement continues along this route. Aerial photography, aerial reconnaissance, and secondary explosions resulting from air strikes indicate the area vicinity ZC1512 as a principal logistical area. The terrain and the total lack of friendly activity lends credence to such a possibility.



2. Mission:

a. Defend assigned sector and critical installations therein.

b. Assume OPCON of all forces assigned to the sector for defense.

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- c. Construct, maintain and occupy fortified fighting positions and observation towers along the perimeter within assigned sector during specified hours.
- d. Coordinate and supervise the defense and local security measures of all forces assigned to the sector.
- e. Coordinate defensive measures with adjacent sectors.
- f. Insure availability of protective bunkers for all personnel billeted in assigned sector and/or unit area.
- g. Establish and maintain radio and wire communication between all bunkers in sector and with the Base Defense Control Center.
- h. Provide a RRF consisting of not less than one officer and 40 EM to reinforce/relieve/counterattack any part of the Bronco Base perimeter within 15 minutes as directed by the Base Defense Officer.
- i. Be prepared to assume command and control of Bde reaction forces as designated by the Base Defense Officer to conduct and counter attack as directed.
- j. Be prepared to release RRF to Bde Control on order.
- k. Be prepared to execute counterattack plans as directed. (Annex C, D, and E, Counterattack plans Boston, Newark and Portland, to be in OPORD 15-67, Base Defense Plan Defiance)

3. Execution:

a. Concept of Operations Annex A Operation Overlay

(1) Maneuver: Bn (Rear) defends Sector D of Bronco Base perimeter, occupies perimeter bunkers 34, 36 thru 42 utilizing three men in each, with one M-60 MG in each 4th bunker, during the hours of darkness (1800 - 0030). Posts one OP in the watchtower, vicinity bunker 35, during daylight hours (0630 - 1830), mans two interior guard posts, one stationary in motor pool and one roving through trains area as directed in HHC guard instructions. Command bunker located inside the trains area will monitor all bunker operations between the hours of 1830 - 0600 daily and maintain contact with 11th Bde Security Officer utilizing radio and wire communications as appropriate. HHC monitor operations of OP from 0630 - 1800 hours.

(2) Supporting fires: Annex B, (Fire Support) to 11th Bde OPORD 5-68 (Base Defense Plan Defiance).

(3) Interior Protective Bunkers: Annex F, (Trains Area Overlay)

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b. Co A (Rear)

(1) Provide personnel for bunker guard as required.

(2) Provide not less than 5 fully equipped personnel to Bn Ready Reaction Force. All personnel to include personnel assigned to RRF will assemble in personnel protective bunker A during alert condition RED. RRF personnel will be designated and briefed each evening.

c. Co B (Rear)

(1) Provide personnel for bunker guard as required.

(2) Provide not less than 5 fully equipped personnel to Bn Ready Reaction Force. All personnel to include personnel assigned to RRF will assemble in personnel protective bunker A during alert condition RED. RRF personnel will be designated and briefed each evening.

d. Co C (Rear)

(1) Provide personnel for bunker guard as required.

(2) Provide not less than 5 fully equipped personnel to Bn Ready Reaction Force. All personnel to include personnel assigned to RRF will assemble in personnel protective bunker C during alert condition RED. RRF personnel will be designated and briefed each evening.

e. Co D (Rear)

(1) Provide personnel for bunker guard as required.

(2) Provide not less than 5 fully equipped personnel to Bn Ready Reaction Force. All personnel to include personnel assigned to RRF will assemble in personnel protective bunker C during alert condition RED. RRF personnel will be designated and briefed each evening.

f. Co E

(1) Provide personnel for bunker guard as required.

(2) Provide not less than 4 fully equipped personnel as security for guards for Command Bunker during alert condition RED. All personnel except shell rep team will assemble in protective bunker A.

(2) Train and maintain one shell rep team for trains area and locate in Command Bunker during DEFCON RED alert conditions.

g. HHC

- (1) Provide not less than twenty (20) fully equipped personnel to Bn Reserve Force to protective bunker B. All others assemble in protective bunkers A and C during condition RED. Reserve Force personnel will be appointed and informed each evening.
- (2) Establish and maintain guard rosters as appropriate for bunker and interior guards.
- (3) Establish detailed guard SOP Regulations to comply with provisions listed herein.
- (4) Provide personnel for bunker and interior guard as required.
- (5) Insure that all bunkers are maintained in a high state of repair at all times.
- (6) Insure that the required basic load of ammunition is kept on hand at all times and in a high state of maintenance.
- (7) Insure that expended ammunition is replaced in the basic load each morning.
- (8) Insure that the Officer and SGT of the Guard receives daily briefing.
- (9) Provide and control interior guard as directed.
- (10) Insure that each bunker has a permanent range card and an azimuth determination device and firing stakes to align principal direction and sectors of fire.
- (11) Insure that all guards test fire their weapons once per week at the 11th Bde Test Fire area, vicinity of bunker 49. Clearance must be obtained from 11th Bde TOC. Firing will be under supervision of a noncommissioned officer.
- (12) Insure that a sweep is made once weekly in coordination with Bde TOC to the front sector D not to exceed 300 meters distant from the perimeter wire.
- (13) All perimeter guards will have protective masks in their possession while on guard. All other personnel will have protective masks readily available at all times.

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(14) Insure that the perimeter guard is inspected twice before midnight and twice after (once prior to darkness and once after daylight).

(15) Establish and maintain a sector CP located to the rear of perimeter bunkers.

(16) Insure that all transient personnel remaining overnight at LZ Bronco are briefed on alert procedures and location of protective bunkers.

h. Coordinating instructions:

(1) Perimeter bunkers will be occupied between 1830 and 0630.

(2) Observation tower, vicinity of Shower Point, will be manned daily from 0630 to 1830.

(3) Bunkers A and C are the designated assembly areas for the RRF. S1, S2 and FBO are commanders of bunkers A, C, and B respectively. Bunker commanders will insure accountability of all RRF personnel and insure that they are properly equipped.

(4) RRF will move by vehicle or foot to relieve or reinforce the perimeter or counterattack to restore the perimeter on order.

(5) In the event of penetration in sector, personnel will remain in assigned bunkers and provide maximum fire support into the penetrated area. The RRF will assemble and react as directed.

(6) Black Out conditions will prevail during DEFCON RED alert.

(7) Trip flares and M18A1 (claymore) mines and anti-personnel devices will be employed to the full extent possible near perimeter bunkers. M18A1 mines will be recovered daily.

(8) Fire coordination lines are sector boundaries. Fires outside Sector D must be coordinated with Ease Defense TCC.

(9) Test fire will not be conducted from bunkers. Test fire for all guard personnel will be conducted at 11th Bde Test Fire Area, vicinity of bunker 49, under supervision of a noncommissioned officer. Coordination will be made with 11th Bde TOC.

(10) RRF personnel will be fully equipped to include protective masks and basic load of ammunition. Four (4) each fragmentation hand grenades for each RRF individual will be maintained and controlled by bunker commanders and issued only if RRF is called out.

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(11) Bunker commanders will draw and control twenty (20) each additional fragmentation hand grenades to be issued and used only for defense of bunkers in event of penetration by hostile forces.

(12) Personnel will remain confined to protective bunkers during alert condition RED, except RIF personnel if alerted. Local defenses will be set up around protective bunkers if the sector is penetrated by hostile forces.

(13) Magazines will not be inserted into weapons until bunkers are physically occupied. Rounds will not be chambered until the individual has reason to fire the weapon.

(14) Curfew for all personnel on or visiting LZ Bronco is from 1830 to 0630, except for personnel participating in tactical operations.

(15) Commanders will brief all personnel on contents of this order.

(16) The senior man in perimeter bunkers will be designated senior commander.

(17) One man will remain outside perimeter bunker at all times and will periodically change locations.

(18) SGT of the Guard will personally clear each man's weapon prior to being released from guard or departing assigned bunkers.

(19) Effect to for planning on receipt, execution on order.

4. Administration and Logistics:

a. Administration:

(1) Guard roster will be kept by HHC for interior and bunker guard.

(2) Officer of Guard roster will be maintained by S-1.

b. Logistics:

(1) Expendited ammunition will be replenished each morning by HHC to insure that the prescribed basic load will be available for guard at the beginning of each night.

(2) SGT/Officer of the Guard will be provided a 2 1/4 ton or 3 1/2 ton vehicle for guard use each night. Vehicle will be designated from battalion resources.

c. Medical:

(1) One fully equipped medic will be placed in each personnel protective and command bunker during RED alert conditions.

(2) Two fully equipped medics will be on standby with 4 stretchers and 2 bearers at the Control Bunker during RED alert conditions.

(3) The Bn (Rear) Aid Station will be located in Bunker D during RED alert conditions.

(4) Insure an immediate medical coverage and evacuation capability is maintained for personnel occupying perimeter bunkers.

5. Command and Signal:

a. Signal:

Current SOI in effect.

b. Command:

(1) CP (Rear) located in Command Bunker directly behind maintenance shop.

(2) CO, HHC is designated Sector D commander.

(3) S4 is designated PRF commander.

(4) Bn XO is designated trains area commander and will supervise all activities relevant to sector defense.

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
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ANNEX A (Operation Overlay) to OPORD 11-68 (Sector Defense Plan Round Up)



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ANNEX B (Alert/Reference Conditions) to OPORD 11-68 (Sector Defense Order Round Up)

1. The purpose of this Annex is to provide guidelines for conduct of trains units during alert conditions. The sector commander (CO, HHC) is responsible for informing all personnel and bunkers of alert conditions, and for the execution of required actions during RED, YELLOW, or GREEN alert. Alert conditions will be announced in the following manner:
 - a. RED - Continuous Siren emission for two minutes.
 - b. YELLOW .. Telephonic/radio
 - c. GREEN - Telephonic/radio
2. Alert conditions will normally be announced by the 11th Bde Base Defense Control Center (BDCC). The senior commander may announce a higher alert condition than that announced by BDCC if desired.
3. During daylight hours (0630 - 1830) normal security precautions will be taken unless an alert condition higher than GREEN has been announced. Surveillance tower, vicinity Shower Point, will be manned by one individual who will remain constantly alert observing the perimeter at all times especially during periods of limited visibility. Suspicious actions of indigenous personnel will be reported to the sector commander who will contact the 11th Bde Provost Marshal's Office for investigation or appropriate action.
4. Alert conditions and actions to be taken are defined as:
 - a. Alert Condition GREEN:
 - (1) This is the normal alert condition during the hours of darkness. This is a condition where security precautions other than normal are appropriate, such as manning perimeter bunkers. This condition may be implemented during daylight hours if warranted.
 - (2) Actions:
 - (a) During daylight hours personnel conduct normal activities. Off post activities will be in accordance with 11th Bde Regulations and Directives concerning "off limits" areas.
 - (b) Occupy all perimeter defensive positions. Emplace trip flares, claymore mines, and initiate all required defensive measures.
 - (c) Establish communications.

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(d) All personnel manning perimeter bunkers will be equipped as required.

(e) Implement all other defensive measures deemed appropriate.

b. Alert Condition YELLOW:

(1) This condition will be declared when intelligence indicates a need for active defensive measures to prepare the base area against imminent enemy attack, enemy attack within a few hours time period, or less, or when a subordinate unit fire base is under ground, rocket or mortar attack.

(2) Actions:

(a) Execute all actions required for condition GREEN.

(b) Hamlets and villages are off limits except for executing tactical operations.

(c) All movement within the sector/base area will be held to a minimum.

(d) Maximum effort will be applied to the preparation of defensive positions and all activities will be suspended except those required to support combat operations.

(e) Perimeter personnel will remain 100% alert.

c. Alert Condition RED:

(1) This condition will be declared when LZ Bronco is receiving hostile fire or when a ground attack has been initiated against the base.

(2) Actions:

(a) Execute all actions required for GREEN and YELLOW alert conditions

(b) Movement of any nature will be only in case of emergency.

(c) All personnel secure equipment and ammunition as required and report to assigned bunkers.

(d) Command bunker conduct communications check with BDCC immediately and one additional check each hour thereafter.

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(e) RRF will assemble in designated bunkers prepared to conduct combat operations within fifteen minutes of initial notification.

(f) Personnel will engage targets inside the sector area only in self defense or for protection of property. Every effort will be made to positively identify a target before engagement.

(g) Prepare to destroy documents and equipment. Execute plans only if capture is imminent.


d. Sector will receive changes to RED alert condition by radio or land line.

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ANNEX C (Rules of Engagement) to OPORD 11-68 (Sector Defense Order Round Up)

1. General:

Rules of Engagement, as set forth herein, are prescribed to minimize non-combat personnel and property losses which may occur during military action against hostile forces. Commanders will ensure that all personnel assigned to defensive positions within the base area are instructed on and comply with the cited rules.

2. Rules of Engagement:

a. During the hours of darkness the following procedures are prescribed:

(1) Challenge in English and Vietnamese (Dung Lai).

(2) If the person challenged makes an overt attempt to avoid apprehension, opens fire, or commits any hostile act endangering life, the challenger may engage the target.

(3) Illumination prior to firing is authorized.

b. During daylight hours the sequence of engagement is the same as paragraph (1) and (2) above. However, suspicious personnel loitering or working inside or near the perimeter barrier will be investigated by the Provost Marshal. Warning shots will not be fired at individuals under these circumstances except for self defense or when the person observed has unquestionably committed an overt hostile act.

c. Personnel occupying defensive positions may insert loaded magazines in their weapons. Rounds will not be chambered nor grenades loaded in launchers until contact with the enemy is imminent.

d. The Sector commander will order chambering and firing of ammunition.

e. Firing of Fougassers and E3 CS dispensers will be cleared with BTOC (except as a last means of self defense).

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3. Weapons Employment: Weapons will be fired in the following priority by personnel occupying perimeter positions.

- a. Rifles
- b. M79 grenade launchers
- c. Light Machine Gun (M-60)
- d. E8 CS dispensers
- e. Fougasse

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ANNEX D (Ammunition Basic Load) to OPORD 11-68 (Sector Defense Order Round Up)

1. The following basic load of ammunition will be issued to personnel manning perimeter bunkers and RRF personnel.

- a. Per individual - Two fragmentation hand grenades
- b. Per rifleman ~ 600 rounds
- c. Per automatic rifleman ~ 600 rounds
- d. Per machine gun .. 2000 rounds
- e. Per weapon ~ 30 M-79 rounds
- f. Per bunker:
 - (1) Five trip flares
 - (2) Five hand flares
 - (3) Two WP grenades
 - (4) Three CS grenades
 - (5) Four each M8A1 Claymore mines
 - (6) One each E8 CS dispensers

2. Ammunition basic loads will be inventoried daily and replenished as required by the SGT or the Guard.

3. Ammunition will be stored in protective containers and secured at a centrally located area. Ammunition will be inspected daily for serviceability and required maintenance. Unserviceable ammunition will be disposed of in accordance with appropriate directives. The Headquarters Commandant will insure that this is accomplished.

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ANNEX E (Signal) to OPORD 11-68 (Sector Defense Plan Round Up)

1. Situation: OPORD _____

2. Mission: Install and maintain positive wire and radio communications in sector to expedite transmission of matters concerning sector defense.

3. Execution:

a. Concept of operation: The Sector Command Bunker will be provided wire and radio communications to each perimeter bunker. Perimeter bunkers will be provided land line communications with each adjacent bunker for coordination of mutual support. Command Bunker will establish a subordinate radio station on the Base Defense each night from 1800 ~ 0600 daily.

b. Signal Platoon:

(1) Provide AN/PRC-25 radios for Command Bunker and PRR.

(2) Provide PRR-9 squad radios for each perimeter bunker and the Command Bunker.

(3) Install and maintain all communications wire and equipment to insure that reliable communications means are available at all times.

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




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APPENDIX 2 (Communications Diagram ~ Radio Net) to ANNEX E (Signal) to OPORD
