NEW TITLES

The following new titles are available:

- #6. WHY STUDENTS WANT THEIR CONSTITUTIONAL RIGHTS. Nat Hentoff. Reprint from the Saturday Review. A national survey of how the rights of students are violated in public schools. A series of guidelines are proposed to secure for young people the same rights as others in society. 1971. 6pp. 20 cents.
- #15. BLACK LAWYERS PUSH RIGHTS DRIVE IN SOUTH. Reprint from the New York Times. as young black lawyers replace white volunteer lawyers from the North, the Southern civil rights movement faces mounting problems at a time when it is attempting systematically to expand its struggle against racial injustice in the Deep South. 1970. 2pp. 5 cents.
- #16. PREVENTIVE DETENTION. A summary of the major arguments against revising the basic legal concept of "innocent until proven guilty." Emphasizes the unconstitutionality of preventive detention and explains why the practice won't decrease our crime rate. 1971. 8pp. 5 cents.
- #17. KIND AND USUAL PUNISHMENT IN CALIFORNIA. Jessica Mitford. Reprint from Atlantic Monthly. There is pressing need for basic reforms in our penal system to assure due process and other rights for prisoners. Closer scrutiny must be given to the progressive steps being instituted in California prisons, which may prove more a hindrance than help in the rehabilitation process. 1971. 8pp. 25 cents.
- #37. THE THEORY AND PRACTICE OF AMERICAN POLITICAL INTELLIGENCE. Frank Donner. Reprint from the New York Review of Books. A disturbing look at the increased surveillance and pressures imposed upon individuals and groups by increasingly uncontrolled politically oriented police and other governmental agencies. The accumulation of secret files and dossiers on citizens is a wholesale threat to civil liberties. 1971. 12 pp. 25 cents.
- #54. TO ESTABLISH JUSTICE -- TO INSURE DOMESTIC TRANQUILITY. Introduction and summary of Recommendations from the Final Report to the National Commission on Causes and Prevention of Violence. 1970. 30 pp. 25 cents, \$15 per hundred.
- #55. WHY END THE DRAFT? A summary statement of civil liberties opposition to the draft, including a description of how a volunteer army can be a substitute for compulsory military service. 1971. 13 questions and answers. 5 cents.
- #56. THE WAR - AGAINST THE LAW. A summary analysis of the illegality of the U.S. involvement in Indochina, showing the President's unilateral exercise of the war power and how continuation of the war further jeopardizes free speech and civil liberties. 1971. 5 cents.

A comprehensive review of the increased use of stores, insurance companies and banks as repositories and vendors of personal information about citizens. The uses and abuses of this private information are described along with corrective steps to halt the invasion of privacy. 1971. 6pp. 25 cents.

#58. THE GEOGRAPHY OF INEQUALITY. Reprint from McCall's Magazine. An analysis of women's legal rights as they vary in the 50 states, pointing up discriminatory practices. A series of graphs shows what the state laws are in such areas as marriage, abortion and employment. 1971. 7 pp. 20 cents.
