*** PARTIAL LIST OF MAY 4th MORATORIUM ACTIVITIES ***

The following are examples of the different types of planning underway around the country for May 4th. At present, there are 400 local and regional coordinators helping to build Moratorium activities in 1000 cities and towns. Hopefully you will be able to work yourself and your networks into the planning. If none exists, we hope that you will be able to quickly organize a Moratorium day in your community. Please call us right away if you need assistance, advice, or materials.

Washington, D.C.: 36 hour vigil at capitol by Congressional staff and hill employees with continuous reading of the war dead; Wed. eve air war liturgy on capitol steps; midnite Memorial service May 3rd conducted by area ministers and rabbis; Thursday rally at capitol with traditional and direct-action lobbying in hill offices.

Los Angeles: feeder marches to a 1PM rally at the Federal Building; demos in 25 Congressional offices demanding support of anti-war legislation.

Madison, Wisconsin: noon rally at Fedl. Building; students petitioning Gov. Lucey to proclaim May 4th as Moratorium Day for the whole state.

Milwaukee, Wisc.: one hour rally at Fedl. Bldg. followed by a march to the War Memorial at which there will be a mock bombing; this will be followed by a march to the Welfare Dept. to bring the effects of the war home.

Chicago, ILL: march symbolic of the Highway 13 march of refugees into Saigon to seek shelter from the air bombing; to begin Wed. afternoon to end Thursday at noon at Fedl. Bldg.

Wilmington, Del.: daily death toll die-in downtown

Minneapolis, Minn: bell tolling by local churches during noon hour; 2 downtown rallies

Denver, Col.: all-day rally at Customs Bldg and recruiting station followed by leafletting at the Lowery Air Force Base.

Lawrence, Kansas: all-day fast on the KU campus with monies ordinarily spent to go to the Medical Aid for Indochina Committee; rally downtown with marches from campus and downtown.

Missoula, Mont: rally at Missoula County Court House; Chamber of Commerce asked to request of affiliate businesses to close down for business during the noon hour.

Portland, Oregon: as part of full day of activities, NARMIC air war slides show to be shown at Armed Forces recruiting offices

Grand Rapids, Mich.: Rally at Calder Plaza to be preceded by actions at Honeywell and at office of Minority Leader Gerrold Ford's district office.

Kent, Ohio: Memorial service and mass rally at Kent State in remembrance of the 4 students murdered by the Natl Guard 2 years ago; actions by midwest states VVAW.

Newark, NJ: noon rally at Newark State called by area labor leaders; endorsement secured by Board of Trustees and Faculty Senate; evening rice dinner with proceeds to go to a Vietnamese Hospital.

East Meadow, NY: High school meeting called for students and parents to discuss the war.

New York City; 12:30 rally at Fed'l Bldg. in Foley Square; speakers will be former Sen Charles Goodell, Dave Dillinger and Fr. Dan Berrigan; endorsed by Bourough Presidents Abrams and Sutton.

Buffalo, New York:: noon rally at Honeywell Corp. followed by march downtown focusing on the air war; evening workshops on future anti-war, anti-corp. activities and projects.

Rochester, New York:: Fedl. Bldg. rally downtown called by area clergy and union reps; main streets downtown to be blocked to traffic in late afternoon.

Syracuse, New York: 11-1 downtown, 200 people to distribute 70,000 brochures on the "Crisis in Indochina" to area households.

Amherst, Mass:: noon rallies at 5 area colleges feeding into a larger rally at Westover Air Force Base.

Boston, Mass:: full day of activities called for and being planned by a new coalition of union reps, blacks, and peace groups.

Philadephia, Penn::: 8 AM gatherings in area churches; literature to be passed out and then distributed during the day at work places encouraging people to attend the 4:30 PM Mass rally at the JFK Plaza.

Montpelier, Vt:: area towns to hold individual rallies and then march to the house of Senator Aiken to protest his recent wavering on Vietnam.

Albuquerque, N.M.: evening workshops at large downtown church oriented towards the war effects on the various participating groups---blacks, chicanos, indians and student consumers.

Charlottesville, Virginia:: noon rally at Army Intelligence Headquarters.

Miami, Florida:: noon rally at Honeywell Corp.
