According to the Trilateral Commission, there are two kinds of intellectuals. First, "technocratic and policy-oriented intellectuals" who are described as responsible, serious, and constructive. They are the expert witnesses to the events of our times, who move easily from the university to government to management, and back again. Their opinions, based on the shared assumption of the validity of maximizing national interest, are found in the mainstream journals.

And there are "value-oriented intellectuals," challengers of authority and established institutions, who feel that it is important to question present policy directions and, where necessary, unmask and delegitimize conventional wisdom. We at ALTERNATIVES recognize these categories and place ourselves, with some pride, among the value-oriented.
