### LUDWIG VON MISES (1881-1973)

This essay contest is named in honor of one of the 20th Century's most brilliant and outspoken free market economists. Born and educated in Austria, Dr. Mises taught at the University of Vienna and the University of Geneva before emigrating to the United States in 1940. He was a Visiting Professor at the New York University Graduate School of Business Administration from 1945-69 and was an honored guest lecturer at universities in Mexico and Europe. He received three honorary doctorates in law and in 1969 was cited as a Distinguished Fellow of the American Economic Association.

Among Dr. Mises' most important works are SOCIALISM (1922), THEORY OF MONEY AND CREDIT (1924), HUMAN ACTION (1949) and THE ULTIMATE FOUNDATION OF ECONOMIC SCIENCE (1962). His other works include a treatise on BUREAUCRACY (1944), THE ANTICAPITALISTIC MENTALITY (1956) and THE FREE AND PROSPEROUS COMMONWEALTH (1962).
