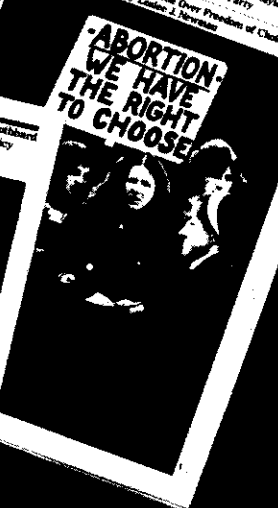

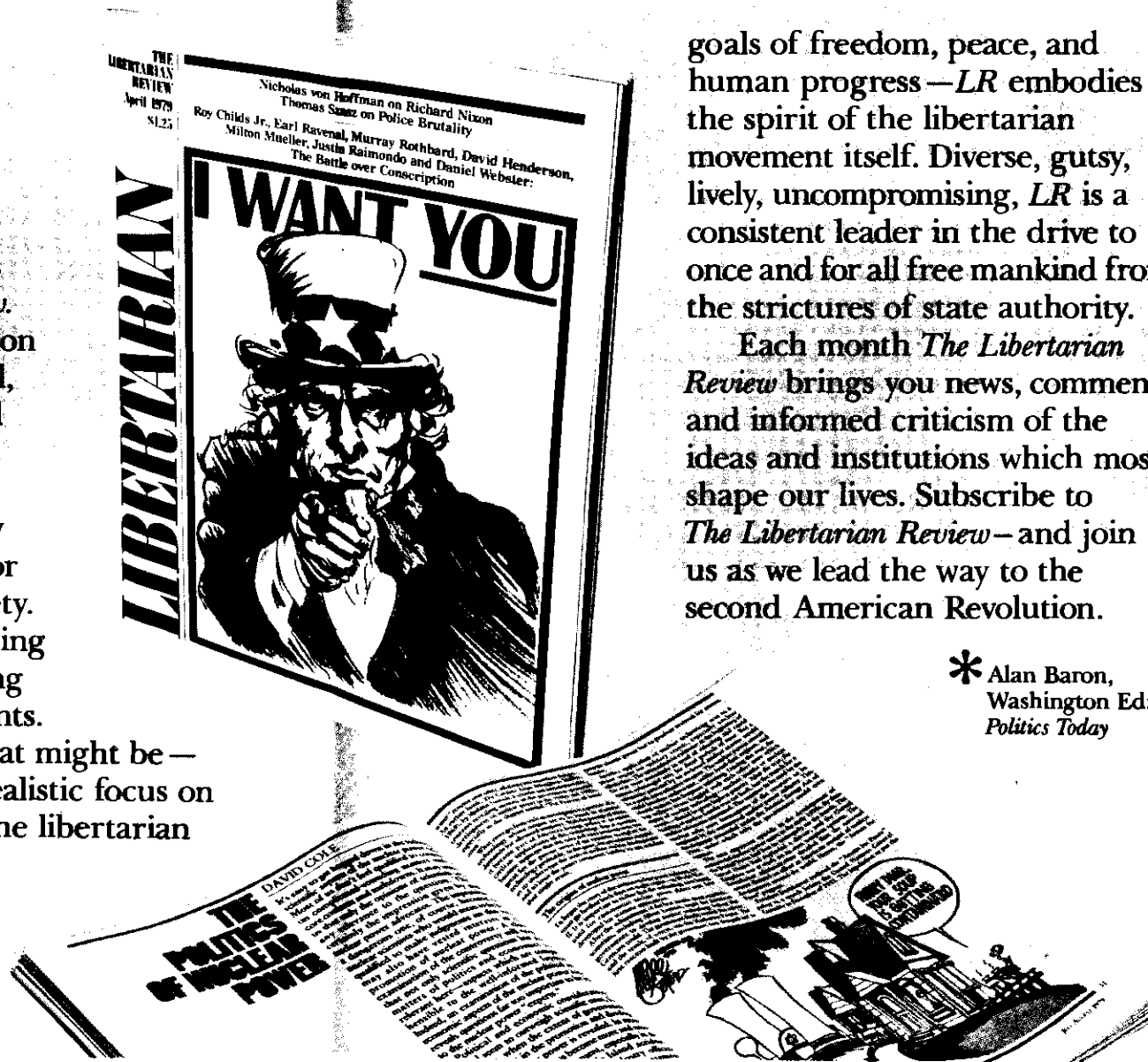

In Praise of Decadence, by Jeff Rigenbach — Why the '70s is best understood as a continuation of the '60s; what the counterculture and the new left were really all about; why California is so important culturally speaking; and why we all ought to be glad that authority is in decay and society is "falling apart."

The Battle over Conscription: A Symposium — Recent efforts to reimpose a system of compulsory national service on American youth have been endorsed by both the left and the right. Libertarians Murray N. Rothbard, Milton Mueller, David Henderson and Justin Raimondo detail the moral, economic, and foreign policy reasons behind their vigorous opposition to any form of the draft.

Playing the China Card, by Roy A. Childs, Jr. — The U.S. is moving toward a military alliance with Communist China against the Soviet Union. *LR* Editor Childs shows why this is "balance of power" politics played with a vengeance: with neither "national security" nor crusading anti-communism any longer cloaking the reality of American meddling in the international arena.

"Reading, Writing and Reefer": Ignorance, Innuendo and Intolerance, by Henry Louis — A veteran broadcast journalist scrutinizes NBC's widely acclaimed documentary on marijuana use among school children, and finds sloppy research, misrepresentation and prejudice behind the program's surface objectivity.

Nuclear Power: A Foreword on Three Mile Island, by Jeff Rigenbach — *LR*'s Executive Editor examines the near meltdown last Spring at Three Mile Island: the facts, the media coverage and the history behind it. He concludes that it isn't businessmen in pursuit of profits who are to blame for the nuclear energy debacle, but politicians in pursuit of power.

Jones as Jesus: Madness as a Posthumous Diagnosis, by Thomas S. Szasz — The dean of radical psychiatrists speculates on why it wasn't "discovered" that the late Reverend Jim Jones was "mentally ill" until after it was too late.

Abortion: The Battle Over Freedom of Choice, by Leslee J. Newman — A bigoted and determined minority is being rallied by the pundits of the New Right and financed by the Catholic Church in an effort to deprive American women of their freedom of choice in regard to abortion. Yet polls indicate that up to 81 percent of the people of this country want that freedom protected.

The Middle East after Camp David: Walking on Water, by Earl C. Ravenal — A noted foreign policy analyst argues that while "most people say the Middle East will never be stable without the United States, on the contrary: peace will never be stable there *unless* it is without the United States."

Carter's Energy Fascism: Prescription for Power, by Murray N. Rothbard — President Carter has tried to fasten a new energy despotism on the American people; Rothbard dissects the motives and the arguments behind this new threat to our liberties.

Dracula Leaves His Castle, by Nicholas von Hoffman — Richard Nixon has been venturing forth from San Clemente so often that the rumor mongers have been talking openly about a political comeback for America's favorite embodiment of pure evil. A nationally syndicated columnist explains why any such comeback is unlikely.
