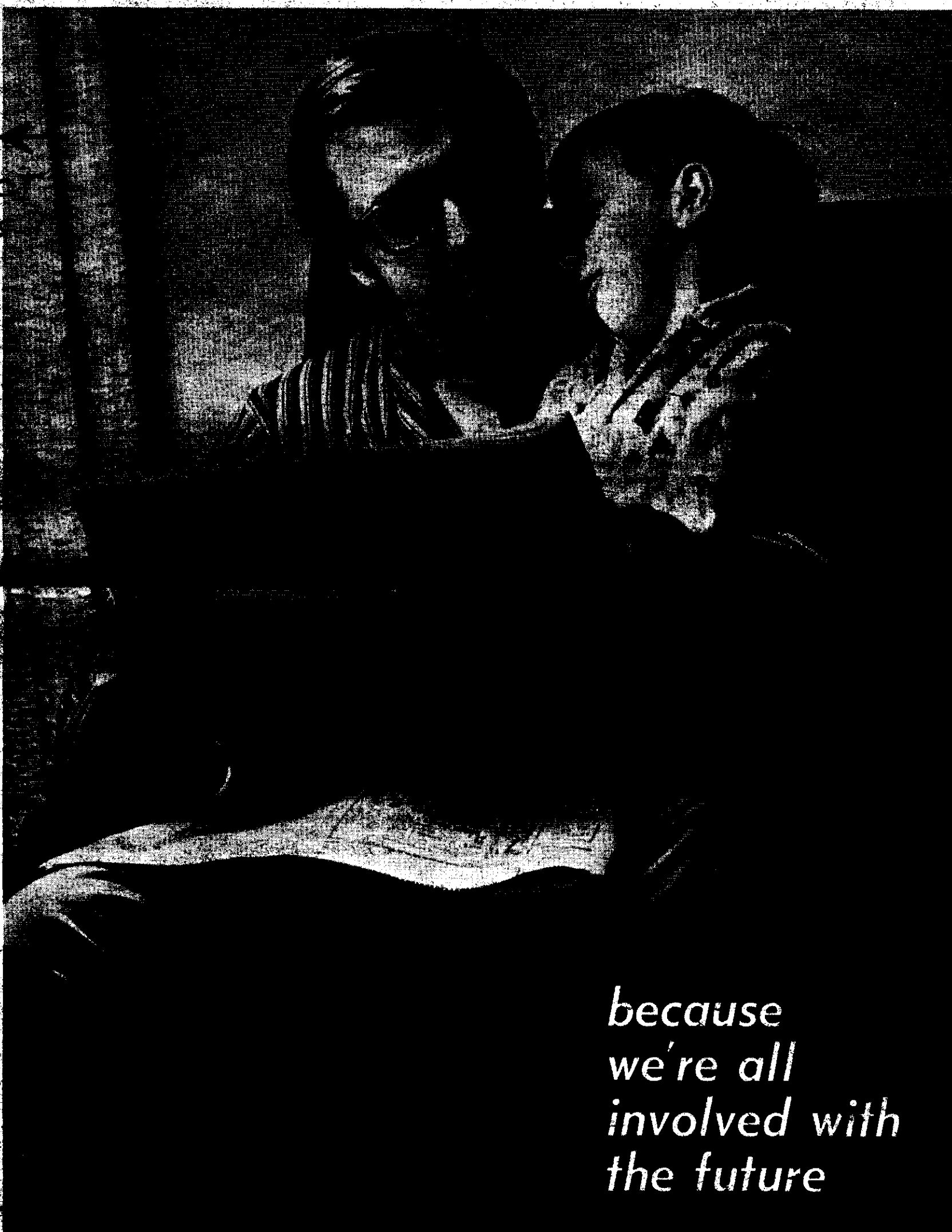

A Constituent's Honest Question Gets A Straight Miller Answer

WHETHER he's answering a senior citizen's questions about tax relief or joining college students for a lunchtime rap session, Miller's talking straight. Maybe he's turned off some voters because they don't like a particular answer, but when Harold O. Miller says it, Miller means it.

And Harold O. Miller's doing more than answering questions in this campaign. He's asking them, too. He wants to know, for example, what policemen personally think must be done to help keep teenagers from experimenting with narcotics. Miller's concerned with the specific problems policemen face because of his experience as chairman of the Fairfax County Criminal Justice Advisory Council.

He's asking Metro construction workers whether they think the project is being safely built. Harold O. Miller wants to make sure no construction shortcuts are being taken which may make the system unsafe in future years. As a chairman of the Metropolitan Area Transportation Planning Board, Miller became totally committed to the concept of mass transportation. He knows that if we are to unclutter the highway rush hour mess and clear the air of deadly pollutants we have to start moving people instead of vehicles.

College voters want to know whether Miller's

concerns environmental problems confronting us. And Harold O. Miller can reply that he was concerned before "ecology" became a popular issue. He's a member of the Northern Virginia Conservation Council, and as a legislator he's led the fight for clean streams, open space and sound land use planning.

When Miller talks with a Tenth District voter, he talks from experience. He can draw on knowledge he's acquired as a member of the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors. And he's also served on the Northern Virginia Transportation Commission and the Northern Virginia Planning District Commission. Because of this experience, Harold O. Miller can speak to the wide range of problems confronting the citizens of the Tenth District of Virginia.

Miller was born July 29, 1937. He has a B. A. degree from Lebanon Valley College in Pennsylvania and a law degree from George Washington University. He has dedicated his professional life working for a better Northern Virginia. And now, he wants to continue that job in the U. S. Congress.



"Together, We Can Do Something Now"

"PEOPLE throughout Northern Virginia continue to be confronted with spiraling costs for health care, hospital services, prescription medicines, and health insurance policies. Just recently, many federal employees were told that their insurance rates were being increased 22 percent, and they wonder, why does it have to be that way?"

"Our senior citizens, our mothers and fathers, our grandparents, who are facing retirement, wonder how they can continue on fixed incomes, as prices and taxes go steadily up. And many of our senior citizens feel rejected and left out by a society they helped build. And they wonder, why does it have to be that way?"

"Our highways continue to be clogged, our subway system embroiled in Congressional debate, our bus service faces extinction, while efforts concentrate on building yet another bridge and highway into the city without proper consideration for the system as a whole. People in desperate need of both private and public transportation see proposals which fail to meet their needs. And people ask me, why does it have to be that way?"

"Many of us, homeowners and tenants alike, have found that the cost of housing is getting almost beyond our reach. Others of us see young couples, often our own children, unable to afford a home of their own. And we ask ourselves, does it have to be that way in Northern Virginia?"

"And while we continue to see little progress being made in these areas, we are forced to witness renewed bombing in North Vietnam, and a further increase in the number of American prisoners held in Communist prisons. And we all can't help but wonder, how much longer will it be this way?"

"I run for Congress in the firm conviction that it does not have to be that way. I am fully mindful of the complexity of the job that needs to be done. For those concerned about working together, we can do something about these problems. And the time is now."



The Future Starts Now With Harold O. Miller



IT'S a simple proposition. We want to see things change. Like dirty air and jammed highways. The war in Vietnam. Concern over costs and fear of crime. And we all care enough about our future to face up to the tasks at hand and refuse to tolerate old answers which don't work anymore.

We've realized the future doesn't take care of itself. We have to raise our voice a little, roll up our sleeves and get to work to make tomorrow right.

That's why Harold O. Miller is running for Congress. To make tomorrow right.

"We can no longer tolerate the expedient answers of the past," Miller says. And his professional life has been dedicated to finding the right answers to the tasks at hand.

Harold O. Miller requested an investigation of the Fairfax Hospital which revealed prices going up regardless of costs. He wants to see efficient health care provided at reasonable rates. He wants it now.

Harold O. Miller is concerned about senior citizens. And he's doing something about that concern. He sponsored successful legislation for Fairfax County providing tax exemptions for senior citizens owning homes. Too many taxes have been ruining the lives of our parents just when they should be looking forward to a retirement free from financial hardships. Miller's also proposed similar exemptions for senior citizens who are renters. But there's more to do for our senior citizens. Harold O. Miller helped make the start. And he wants to see our commitment completed with a comprehensive program for those who are retired and burdened with financial worries. And he wants it now.

Harold O. Miller is concerned about transportation, and wants to see our transportation system work. That's why as chairman of the Metropolitan Washington Area Transportation Planning Board he helped establish the express

commuter buses on Shirley Highway. But Miller sees this as only a beginning. "We must finally face up to the task of moving people and not vehicles," Miller says. "And the time to do that is now."

Harold O. Miller was responsible for modernizing outdated building codes in Fairfax County. His solution saves \$3,500 in construction costs for the average new home. But this too he sees only as a beginning. "I am confident that we can build housing that all families in Northern Virginia can afford," Miller says. And he wants to start now to fulfill that promise. To make sure tomorrow is right.

Harold O. Miller wants to be in Congress to make sure the challenges we face are not swept under the carpet. He doesn't want to see the future postponed anymore. He's concerned about the inequities women face in employment opportunities. And, to meet that concern, he led the efforts to establish the Commission on the Status of Women in Fairfax County. To make sure women enjoy full human rights. Now.

As a legislator, Harold O. Miller has fought to protect the interests of the consumer, and he's proposed a Consumer Protection Commission for Fairfax County. For County renters, Miller initiated efforts leading to the creation of a Tenant-Landlord Commission. He's helped to make the start to face up to the tasks at hand. And now he wants to continue the job in Congress.

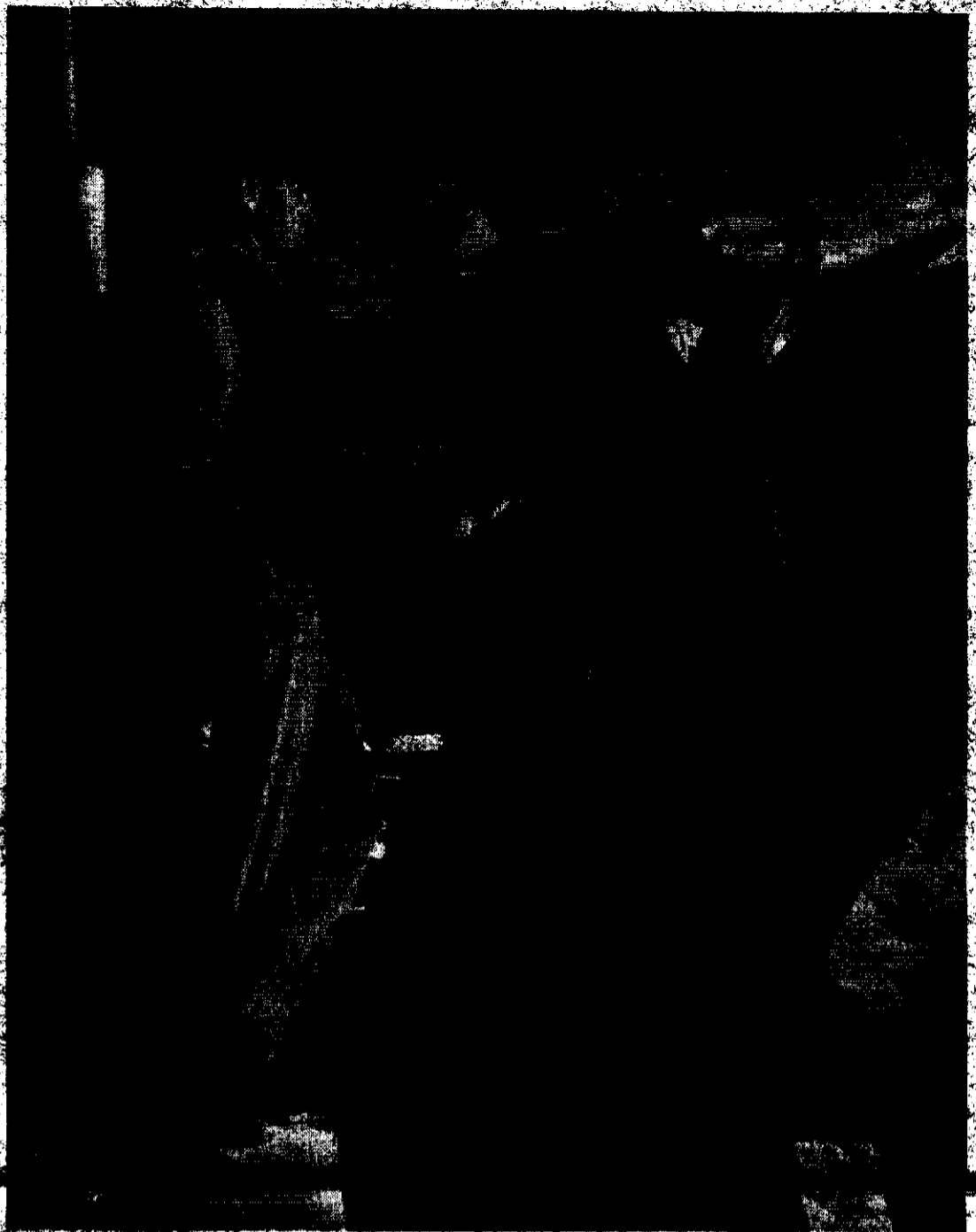
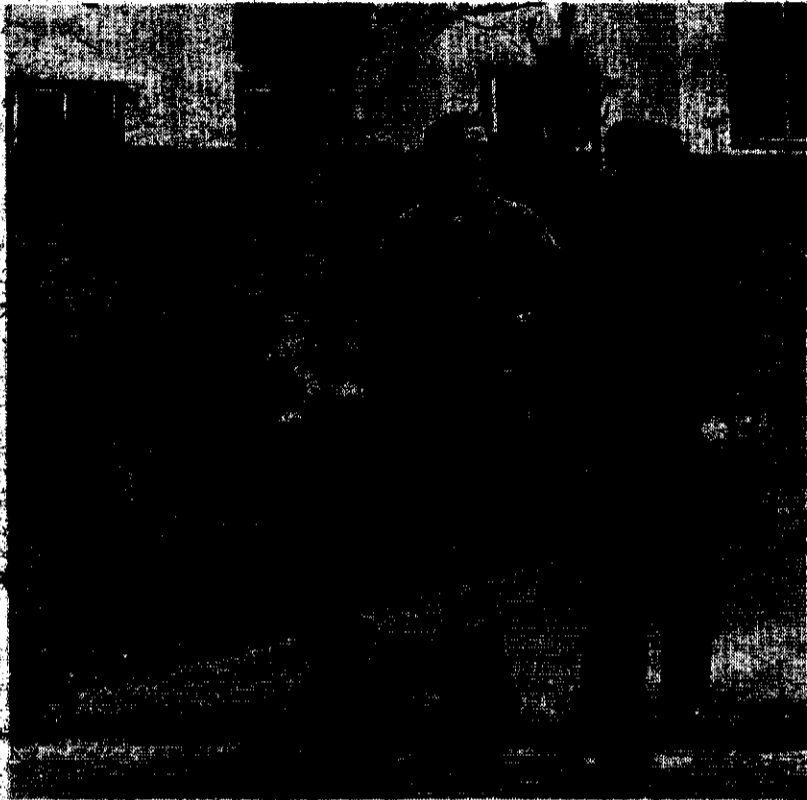
