NOT EVERYONE IS AGREED on how world security can be assured.

But there is wide agreement that piling up nuclear arms has actually made the world less secure.

The U.S. and Russia can now destroy each other many times over within a few hours.

And nuclear weapons are beginning to spread to other countries as well.

While we disagree with the Communist nations in many ways,

WE ALSO HAVE COMMON INTERESTS

- In avoiding nuclear war.
- In ending radioactive fallout.
- In reducing money spent on arms which is needed to combat poverty, illiteracy, disease and deprivation both at home and abroad.
- In slowing and then ending the suicidal arms race.

World security can be based on these common interests, but more is required: controlled disarmament, an effective United Nations, greater understanding among nations, world law.

While there is wide agreement on these goals, there is much to do before they are achieved. We cannot determine the actions of other nations; we can only seek to persuade. But we can determine our own actions both as individuals and as a nation.

PEACE IS NOT AUTOMATIC

WE INVITE YOU TO WORK WITH SANE FOR PEACE

In 1957, SANE was organized and called for the end of nuclear weapons tests.

In 1958, a treaty ending tests became United States policy, and in 1963, a treaty ending tests in the atmosphere, in space and under water was signed.

In 1958, SANE called for general and complete disarmament.

In 1961, the U.S. Arms Control and Disarmament Agency was established. World disarmament became the policy of the U.S. government.

In 1960, SANE called for planning to convert our economy to a peace-time emphasis.

In late 1963, President Johnson created a Committee on the Economic Impact of Defense and Disarmament and proposed to cut the defense budget by \$1 billion.

In 1961, SANE emphasized the futility of civil defense.

In 1963, civil defense was eliminated or drastically reduced in the state of Oregon and in several major cities.

SANE'S NEXT STEPS have become actual government policy. But the task has just begun.

President Lyndon B. Johnson, in a letter to Premier Khrushchev, wrote: "'Peace on earth, goodwill toward men' need not be an illusion; we can make it a reality. The time for simply talking about peace, however, has passed."

SANE'S POLICY

(A full policy statement for 1964 is available for 15¢)

■ GENERAL AND COMPLETE DISARMAMENT:

GENERAL to include all types of weapons.
COMPLETE down to police levels.
PHASED in stages of arms control that are fair to each nation.
INSPECTED to deter violations.
UNIVERSAL to include all nations.

■ STRENGTHENED UNITED NATIONS:

PERMANENT PEACE FORCE to discourage aggression.
STRONGER WORLD COURT to arbitrate conflicts and encourage justice.
MASSIVE U.N. ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM using substantial savings from disarmament.

■ BEFORE DISARMAMENT IS ACHIEVED

AN END TO UNDERGROUND NUCLEAR TESTS. A comprehensive test-ban treaty, under appropriate international inspection.
AMERICAN INITIATIVES TO THAW THE COLD WAR. Steps to slow the arms race, such as selective cuts in the military budget and new approaches to political settlements in tension areas.

PARTIAL ARMS CONTROL MEASURES. Agreements to lessen the risks of unintended nuclear war, to slow the spread of nuclear weapons, and to pull back armed forces in tension areas.

ECONOMIC PLANNING FOR PEACE. Legislation to provide for conversion of the arms industry and full employment.

ECONOMIC AID to underprivileged nations and expansion of U.N. economic programs.

WHAT SANE DOES

EDUCATES by distributing millions of pieces of literature; by telling the SANE story through advertisements and releases in the press, and through national magazines, radio and television. SANE also publishes a semi-monthly newsletter, **SANE WORLD**.

MOBILIZES POLITICAL EFFECTIVENESS by maintaining contact with Congressmen and the Executive department, advising citizens on key issues through its Washington office, and stimulating political action in local communities.

WORKS CLOSELY with U.N. officials and U.N. delegations from all countries.

COOPERATES with more than 100 national organizations and provides them with educational materials and speakers.

ESTABLISHES local SANE committees throughout the U.S. SANE has about 150 committees and 25,000 members. Local groups conduct public meetings, provide speakers, write letters, visit policy makers, and support selected political candidates.

IT TAKES MONEY to develop a national movement for peace and disarmament.

SANE MUST RAISE \$250,000 this year to carry this program forward.

The national committee needs and welcomes all persons whose support is not qualified by adherence to communist or other totalitarian doctrine.
