Dear Friend:

The choice of Barry Goldwater as the Republican presidential nominee presents a critical challenge to all who are concerned about peace. The extremists who denounced the test ban agreement as a "treason treaty" are now in power in the Republican Party. Further tension lessening steps toward disarmament will come under increasing attack. The Johnson administration will be under pressure to adopt a hard line and to step up the cruel civil war in Vietnam.

Redoubled effort by the peace forces is vital if policies of belligerence and militarism are to be turned back. Both in the elections and in foreign policy effective steps are needed now.

SANE is active on both fronts, giving voice to the cause of peace. On the issue of Vietnam, SANE secured coast-to-coast coverage two days running with its appeal for the neutralization of North and South Vietnam under international supervision. The appeal, first effective demonstration of public feeling, was signed by 5,000 college and university educators.

SANE chapters have been active in primary races in both parties. In the Pennsylvania Democratic primary for the Senate, local chapters supported Genevieve Blatt against Judge Michael Musmanno. Miss Blatt won the primary fight by a narrow margin. SANE support made the difference. In Maryland, members of Washington Area SANE worked for Republican Congressman Charles (Mac) Mathias during his primary fight against Brent Bozell, a Goldwater adviser and former editor of the extremist magazine, National Review. Mathias won the primary by a 3-1 margin.

In the November elections, as in the primaries, SANE will encourage members to work as volunteers wherever a clear choice presents itself. SANE's Washington Office will continue to backstop their efforts in key races throughout the nation.

SANE is making a maximum effort in this critical year, when the cause of peace will be tested at the ballot box as never before. But your help is needed. A special contribution now to SANE's political action program will enable us to strengthen candidates who favor steps toward peace in Vietnam and steps beyond the test ban toward a disarmed world.
