that got let for me.

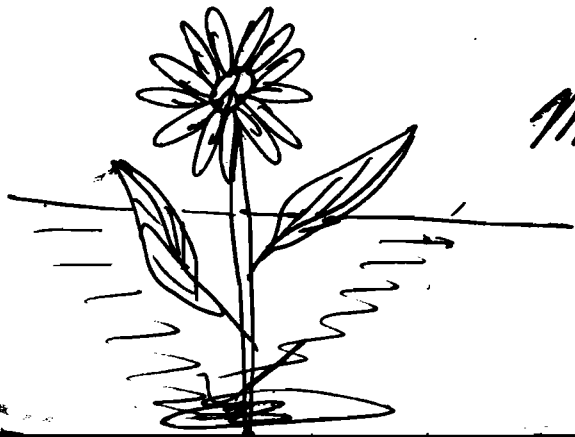
I don't know how my
