BETHESDA, Md. (UPI)—The National Institute of Health announced Wednesday development of a vaccine that effectively prevents German Measles, the primary cause of birth defects in the United States.

It was announced that the widest field trial yet of a vaccine against Rubella (German Measles) has shown the vaccine to be 90% effective. The field trial was held on the Nationalist Chinese Island of Taiwan.

As a result, NIH's National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases said children in nine U.S. communities will soon take part in further field trials.

The effort is an attempt to avert a recurrence of the 1964-65 German Measles epidemic which produced an estimated 30,000 abnormal pregnancies in the United States. The disease strikes approximately every seven to 10 years in epidemic proportions.

In children, the virus-born disease usually causes only mild symptoms. But to a woman exposed to it in early pregnancy--especially if she has not had the disease before--the ailment could result in a miscarriage, death for the child soon after birth, or a child with crippling defects.

BOSTON, MASS. (UPI)—Jackie Kennedy will marry Greek shipping magnate Aristotle Onassis soon, the Boston Herald-Traveler said Thursday in a copyrighted story.

The newspaper said it learned of the impending marriage of President John F. Kennedy's widow of five years from "a completely knowledgeable source" which it did not identify further.

Onassis, 64 and a long-time friend of Mrs. Kennedy, has visited the Kennedy family compound at Hyannis Port, Massachusetts, frequently and has taken Mrs. Kennedy sailing in the Mediterranean.

The Herald-Traveler said details of the wedding were secret, although New York, somewhere in the state of Maryland or "a European city" were under consideration for the ceremony.
