Major General Frederick J. Kroesen, who led the Americal Division in Vietnam has just been rewarded with command of one of the Army's top units. General Kroesen, now Deputy Commander of XXIV corps in Vietnam, is on orders for the 82d Abn Div. at Fort Bragg, N.C. with a June 30 reporting date.

A United States flag, believed to have been made in the late 1790's is among more than 8000 artifacts in the newly remodeled Fort Carson Museum and Visitors Center. The flag is now priceless because in addition to the 15 stars (representing the 13 colonies and two states, Vermont & Kentucky) it also has 15 stripes.



The original Americal Division was created under similar circumstances in New Caledonia on 27 May 1942, when the 132d, 164th and the 182d Infantry Regiments were combined into a division under Major General Alexander M. Patch, USA. The Americal participated in subsequent campaigns in the Pacific.

The Americal Division was the first U.S. Army Division to bear a name instead of a number. The name, chosen from a list submitted by men of General Patch's command, was suggested by the then PFC David Fonesca, of Roxbury, Massachusetts, a member of the 26th Signal Company, who derived the name from the general phrase "American troops in New Caledonia."





One day I hope to be near enough to Boston to participate in the activities of our Americal Association.





RECAPPING THE AMERICAL

The Americal Infantry Division is a division of distinction. It was the only combat division in World War II with a name instead of a number, the first U.S. Army division to take offensive action against the Japanese in the Pacific theatre and the only army division to receive the Navy Presidential Unit Citation for gallantry in action. The jungle fighters of the AMERICAL were rushed into combat so quickly they got a name instead of a number but at the conclusion of the war it was a name to be proud of. The AMERICAL was born on May 27, 1942 on the Island of New Caledonia in the South Pacific from a composite force known as Task Force 6814. Let us go back a few months and see how the seed was sown that gave birth to this gallant fighting force, THE AMERICAL INFANTRY DIVISION. January 1942, Brig. Gen. Alexander M. Patch, Jr., summoned to Washington, D. C. by the War Dept. and there informed that he was to take command of the forces being formed for movement to the South Pacific under the code designation 6814.

Army units stationed throughout the United States were alerted and assigned to what was to become known as Task Force 6814.

Many of the key units of this task force were taken from the 26th Inf. Div. (Yankee Division) of the Massachusetts National Guard stationed at Camp Edwards, Mass. Another key unit was the 132d Inf. regiment, Illinois Nat'l. Guard, which was relieved from the 33d Inf. Div. and assigned to Task Force 6814 on Jan. 14, 1942.

Task Force 6814 sailed out of New York on January 23, 1942 aboard seven troop transports under Command of Brig. Gen. William T. Rose, (C.G. 51st. Inf. Brig.) while Gen. Patch remained in Wash., D. C.

Task Force 6814 sailed south along the Atlantic Coast to the Panama canal. The convoy cleared the Pacific end of the canal on Jan. 31, 1942 and headed for Australia. On Feb. 26, 1942 the convoy reached Melbourne where the troops of Task Force 6814 disembarked. On March 6, 1942 Task Force 6814 departed Melbourne and moved on to Noumea, New Caledonia, arriving March 12, 1942. On April 9, 1942, another key unit of the unborn division arrived in New Caledonia, the 164th. Inf. Regt. which was relieved from assignment to the 34th Inf. Div. N.D.N.G. on Dec. 8, 1941. On May 27, 1942, General Orders No. 10, Hqs. U.S. Forces in New Caledonia, activated the AMERICAL INFANTRY DIVISION, with Major General Alexander M. Patch, Jr. becoming the Americal's first Commanding General. Then activity increased and on Oct. 7, 1942 the 164th. Inf. received alert orders and two days later began loading on transports at the Noumea docks. Other Americal units started loading a few days later as unit after unit was alerted and moved down to the docks to be loaded on troop transports. The war was getting closer. Then on Oct. 13, 1942, the 164th Inf. Regt. began debarking in Sealark Channel, off Lunga Point, Guadalcanal. The spearhead of the Americal had landed and was soon placed under control of the C.G. 1st Marine Div. The Americal's first combat casualty was Cpl. Ken-

neth S. Foubert, Co. N, who was KIA around noon on the 13th.

On Nov. 12th. the 2d echelon landed on Guadalcanal, consisting of the 182d Inf. Regt., 245th F.A., Cos. A&C, 57th Engrs, 1st. Bn, 101st. Medics, and other small units.

On Dec. 8th. additional units landed consisting of, 2d and 3d Bns. 132d Inf., 247th F.A., (less Bty. A), 26th Sig. Co., and Div. Hqs. On 13-14 Dec. the Americal's strength was increased with the arrival of the 3d Bn, 182d Inf. 1st. Bn, 132d Inf. 21st Recon. Troop and Bty. A, 247th F.A. Bn.

The AMERICAL under Gen. Patch assumed control of all combat operations on Guadalcanal on Dec. 9th. relieving Maj. Gen. Vandegrift and his 1st Marine Div.

The end of the campaign on Guadalcanal came on Feb. 9, 1943 and on March 1st. the 1st. echelon of the Americal sailed from the steaming jungles and stench of death which was Guadalcanal enroute to the Fiji Islands.

On April 5th. of 1943 the last elements departed, clearing Guadalcanal of all physical traces of the AMERICAL Div. The AMERICAL spent the following months on Viti Levu in the Fiji Islands, reorganizing, receiving replacements, and training for further combat with the yellow men from Nippon. This peaceful but busy time lasted from May 6th. until Dec. 10th., 1943 when movement orders were issued for a forward combat zone. Troop ships were loaded and moved out of the harbor and by January 3, 1944 the last elements of the Americal had left the Fiji Islands behind. On Christmas morning, Dec. 25, 1943, the 164th Inf. again the spearhead regiment began landing on Bougainville from transports at anchor in Empress Augusta Bay. These troops were under the command of Col. Crump Garvin. Unknowingly to the Americal, they would be on this jungle island for the next year, holding a perimeter against the Japanese advance and guarding several airfields being used for strikes further north. The AMERICAL relieved US Marine units on the line and took over half the perimeter next to the 37th. Inf. Div. (Ohio N. G.). The AMERICAL remained on Bougainville until Jan. 8, 1945 when the first ships bearing units of the AMERICAL departed enroute to the Philippines. On January 21, 1945, the first echelon of the AMERICAL, again the 164th. Infantry reached the Philippines, and went into action on the 27th. Leading the AMERICAL into the Battle for the Philippines was Maj. Gen. William H. Arnold, one of the youngest division commanders in WW II.

Gen. Arnold had taken over command of the division from Maj. Gen. Robert B. McClure on Nov. 4, 1944. Gen. McClure moved up to Corps. The AMERICAL remained in the Philippines (going into action on Leyte, Cebu, Samar, Bohol, Negros Oriental and Mindanao) until the Japanese surrender on Aug. 14, 1945. On the morning of September 1st. the AMERICAL took a last look at the green and brown hills of the Philippines and their last scene of combat and sailed over the horizon towards the homeland of the Japanese empire. On Sept. 8th. the 132d Inf. and 164th Inf. regiments debarked at Yokohama and were assigned to their assembly areas. Thus began the



AMERICALS occupation of the enemy homeland, Japan. By the end of Nov. '45, the last units of the AMERICAL had moved out of Tokyo Bay enroute to Seattle, Wash. Only a handful of the original members of Task Force 6814 remained, all volunteers to the very end. On December 12, 1945 the AMERICAL INFANTRY DIVISION retired to the list of inactive U.S. Army units. It is all history now, it was only a name, but what a name, its life was short but the traditions it made were second to none in all the annals of American Military History. Well Done — AMERICAL.



New Look For WO, CWO



WASHINGTON (ANF)—Warrant officers and chief warrant officers grades W01 through CW4 will be required to wear new insignia beginning Dec. 1, 1972.

The purpose of the new design is to make warrant and chief warrant officers more readily identifiable.

The new insignia will be made of a silver-colored metal with black enamel rank designations.

Present insignia for warrant officers in grades W01 and CW2 are gold colored metal with brown enamel designations. Present formats for CW3 and CW4 insignia is silver-colored metal with brown enamel.

The new insignia will be available at installation post exchanges in August and at quartermaster clothing stores in October. Shoulder boards for the Army blue uniform will also be available in post exchanges in August.
