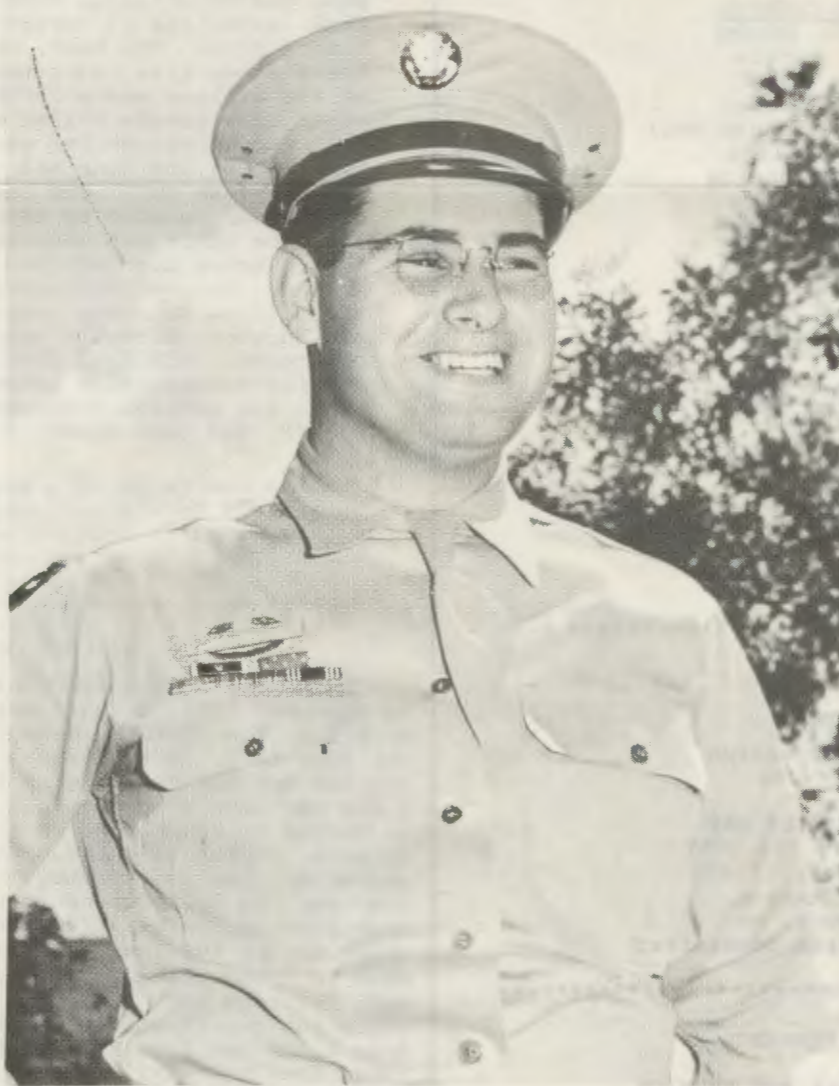

MEDAL OF HONOR CITATION

STAFF SERGEANT JESSE R. DROWLEY [ARMY SERIAL NO. 36.108,403], Company B, 132d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty in action with the enemy at Bougainville, Solomon Islands, 30 January 1944. SERGEANT DROWLEY, a squad leader in a platoon whose mission during an attack was to remain under cover while holding the perimeter defense and acting as a reserve for assaulting echelons, saw three members of the assault company fall badly wounded. When intense hostile fire prevented aid from reaching the casualties he fearlessly rushed forward to carry the wounded to cover. After rescuing two men SERGEANT DROWLEY discovered an enemy pillbox, undetected by assault tanks, that was inflicting heavy casualties upon the attacking force and was the chief obstacle to the success of the advance. Delegating the rescue of the third man to an assistant, he ran across open terrain to one of the tanks. Signalling to the crew, he climbed to the turret, exchanged his weapon for a submachine gun, and voluntarily rode the deck of the tank, directing it toward the pillbox by tracer fire. The tank, continually under heavy enemy fire, continued to within 20 feet of the pillbox where SERGEANT DROWLEY received a severe bullet wound in the chest. Refusing to return for medical treatment he remained on the tank and continued to direct its progress until the enemy position was definitely located by the crew. At this point he again was wounded by small-arms fire, losing his left eye, and falling to the ground. He remained alongside the tank until the pillbox had been completely demolished and another, directly behind the first, destroyed. SERGEANT DROWLEY, his voluntary mission successfully accomplished, returned alone for medical treatment. [General Orders No. 73, War Department, 6 September 1944.]

This is the tenth in a series of Medal of Honor recipients in the Americal Division. S/Sgt. Jesse R. Drowley was the first member of the AMERICAL to be awarded the Medal of Honor.

Did You Know?

The colors of the Americal Division were folded in November 1971, thus disbanding the 11th and 198th Brigades. The 196th Brigade remained in Vietnam until June 1972. In four years in Vietnam, about 100,000 men had served with the division; more than 3,400 had been killed and 22,500 wounded. They won 11 Medals of Honor. The last battalion of the last brigade, 3/21st Infantry, remained on the Da Nang perimeter. Six years after its first operation in Vietnam, the 3/21st conducted the last U.S. Infantry operation of the war. Two men were wounded by booby traps during the four-day patrol; then Hueys landed ARVN in their place in the bush and flew the GIs out. Thirteen days later, on August 23 1972, the battalion deactivated as increment IX of the U.S. Army withdrawal from the Republic of Vietnam. It was noted that the last ground combat units, 3/21st Infantry, and G Battery (Provisional), 29th Field Artillery, "...departed from Da Nang without ceremony."

VIETNAM VETERANS NETWORKMEMORIAL DAY IN HOUSTON, TEXAS

Im sure that all veterans who were fortunate enough to attend the festivities in Houston over the Memorial Day weekend left that town with a smile on their faces as big as mine was. The event was a well attended huge success. The highlights of the four day long party took place mostly on Saturday. We began the day with a parade through the town, led by our old commander, General Westmoreland. I'd estimate the marchers numbered at least 100,000 but I've heard larger figures mentioned which like mine are unofficial. The Americal contingent took our assigned place in the march with the Americal colors held high for the thousands of well-wishers lining the sidewalks to cheer. We were behind a contingent of Canadians who had volunteered and fought in our forces and our rear was brought up by our old rivals in I Corps, the 1st Marine Division. Along the route we were treated to fly-overs by Hueys, Cobra gunships and Phantom jets. The cheers were so loud that I think perhaps the pilots may have heard us. I met a few men later in the day that had lost their voices as a result. General Westmoreland took up a position on the reviewing stand and shook hands with many of the men as they passed. I dont want to leave out the ladies, they were well represented by a good sized group of Nurses and Donut-Dollies. Upon arrival at the citys park, a huge amphitheatre had been prepared for an old time rock n' roll concert. The ladies were placed on the stage and introduced by the still beautiful Armed Forces Radio personality, Chris Noel. Westy gave a short speech congratulating us on our ability to handle the monsoon storm that was currently engulfing us and then the music began. Top name groups included Johnny Rivers, Buffalo Springfield, Richie Havens, and the Guess Who. The music went on into the evening and it would have been impossible not to enjoy yourself. Our Americal hospitality room at the Astro Village Hotel was packed for most of the three days we operated. Quite a few of the other Divisions had hospitality rooms in building and many vets spent the evenings hoisting Budweisers at each one. Tradition has always been that the Americal throws one of the best parties and we didnt let anyone down this time. We recieved nothing but complements on the welcome we extended to all vets who visited us, even the Marines. My thanks to all the men who helped in hauling beer and ice and to everyone that pitched in financially to pay for it.

If you do not pay your membership yearly, no newsletter. Jim Crum (2/1 196th 68-69') decided to assemble a mailing locator list. So far we have over 750 recent names and addresses. Of these names, only 200 are 196th paying members. Jim and I decided to provide a no-charge locator service. Some of the original 196'ers got wind of this and wonder if we're trying to organize some type of rival organization. Silver Star

SP/5 Thomas H. Chase, a medical aidman with D Co. 23rd Medical Bn., Americal Division, recently recieved a Silver Star for his action while serving with B Co 1/52nd Infantry. The company was conducting search and clear operations near LZ Young when it came under intense enemy automatic weapons fire. Chase immediately rushed into the exposed area to assist several casualties. At this time, hostile mortar rounds began falling throughout the area. With complete disregard for his personal safety, SP/5 Chase remained in a rice paddy and adjusted friendly artillery fire on the enemy positions. During the fire mission, a wounded soldier who was in shock began walking about the area. SP/5 Chase ran to the man, pulled him down behind a dike and administered first aid. His courageous actions were directly responsible for saving the lives of his fellow soldiers.

The above citation appeared in the "Southern Cross" newsletter in late 69'. It was submitted to us by ADVA member Jim Talley.

ADVA member Bill Laurie from Mesa, Arizona wants us to know that Australian soldiers who served in Vietnam are planning a "Welcome Home Parade" in Oct. of this year. Did You Know?

A bulletin I recieved from the DAV raised some interesting points about the number of Vietnam-era veterans who serve in Congress. More than 15 million war veterans came back from WWII and Korea and for a couple of decades afterward, it seemed that every other lawmaker must be a veteran. In contrast, more than 9 million served in the Vietnam-era, yet our representation in Congress seems remarkably small. Only 52 Senators or Congressional Representatives with military service between 1964 thru 1975 are currently in office. Thats less than 10% of the total 535 members. Id be willing to bet that the non-veteran legislators who were deferred from service during the Vietnam War, could come up with egg on their faces nowadays trying to explain why they stayed at home. In my home state of Missouri, we have no Nam vets on Capitol Hill but how about yours? If anyone possibly knows of one of those politicians with Americal service, Id like to hear from you.

The Viet Cong also included the hard core political cadre, main force local troops, part time guerrilla and men and women and children terrorized into helping.

☆ GUADALCANAL ☆ SOLOMON ISLANDS WAR MEMORIAL FOUNDATION



It's about time someone took action to memorialize the single greatest military action in World War II, the Battle for Guadalcanal. It will remain in military history as an action as significant as the battles of Gettysburg and Waterloo. Moreover the Guadalcanal Campaign was a six month intense bloody land struggle, vicious air battles and a series of the most deadly Naval actions in modern time. Guadalcanal not only brought the invading forces to an abrupt halt but it initiated their destruction.

To memorialize the Marines, Navy, Army, Air Force, and our Allies, plans are being made for a showcase tour of such battle sights as Henderson Field, Red Beach, Ilu River Delta, Bloody Ridge, Mt. Austen, Matanikau River, Cape Esperance, and other key areas. For Example the Pagoda will be rebuilt as a Snack - Bar at the Honiara Hotel's beach.

A brass plaque will be placed at Henderson Field, the rebuilt Pagoda, and aboard the aircraft carrier Guadalcanal honoring all Medal of Honor awardees for valor on Guadalcanal. All ships sunk in Iron Bottom Bay will also be honored in a similar manner. A very impressive monument will be placed at Blood Ridge. A memorial of such beauty and grace that it will attract world attention. Private funds will be used to build these memorials. Congress has approved but not funded our plans.

A United States Memorial will be built in Honiara near Point Cruz.

World WAR II Veterans of the 132nd Infantry Regiment will hold their 46th Anniversary Reunion Celebration on Labor Day Weekend, Friday September 4, 1987 through Sunday September 6, 1987. Headquarters, Hospitality Room, Motel facilities, the "Ice Breaker" and the Dinner Dance will all be localized at the Chicago Marriott Hotel in Oak Brook, Illinois. Wives and friends of the men of the 132nd Infantry Regiment are invited to attend.

The 132nd Infantry regiment, with more than 1300 members, originally a part of the Illinois National Guard, 33rd Division, was inducted into Federal Service in March of 1941 and with the Inductees of the then new Selective Service, trained at Camp Forrest, near Tullahoma, Tennessee. In January of 1942 the Regiment, with re-enforcements from the Central and Southern units of the Division, left New York City by ship convoy through the Panama Canal to the south Pacific as a deterrent force for New Caledonia where it was joined by units from Massachusetts and North Dakota to become a fighting component of the newly formed, and uniquely un-numbered Americal Division, the Army's first amphibious force in the Pacific conflict. Combat awards were received for action in the Solomon Islands--Guadalcanal and Bougainville, and the Phillipine Islands.

NEW CALEDONIA TROUBLE

The Melanesian Kanaks do represent about 43% of the population of New Caledonia, but some reports give the impression that all 43% want independence from France. This is not true.

NEW CALEDONIA TROUBLE Continues

The legislative body consists of 46 members. At the last vote, 34 voted to remain with France. Of those, about half were Kanaks; and the Assembly president, Dick Ukeise, is a Kanak.

I think readers also have a right to know that the Kanak independence faction has been supported by Colonel Moammar Gadhafi. Eighteen persons were sent to Libya for "training" just before the last National elections in 1984. Colonel Gadhafi contributed about \$5 million for the support of the independence faction.

LIBYA'S MOVE INCITES FEAR

NOUMEA, New Caledonia -- Libyan overtures to the South Pacific are provoking fears of a new front of Libyan sponsored terrorism, in a region unaccustomed to anything more violent than a free falling coconut.

Here in New Caledonia, where a large Melanesian minority apparently favors independence from France, there is apprehension that Libya will encourage violence and rebellion. Already several dozen Melanesians separatists have gone to Libya for training.

The president of the Melanesian independence colation, Jean-Marie Tjibaou, suggested in an interview that within the next few weeks his organization might express its willingness to accept arms from Libya. But Mr. Tjibaou noted that it would be difficult or impossible to transport weapons to this closely guarded island,

"There is good reason that Libyans fill people with fear," Australia's Foreign Minister, William G. Hayden, said after returning from a trip to New Zealand to discuss the situation with that country's Prime Minister, David Lange. "It is a real problem for the region."

The chief American representative at the United Nations, Vernon A. Walters, said on a visit to Fiji in April that the United States was concerned by any attempt by Libya to destabilize the Pacific.

"To be blunt, Libyans have a considerable potential for mischief-making," Mr. Walters said.

Thank you Colonel Holcombe.

There is trouble in Paradise! As you all know New Caledonia is about the richest island in the Pacific because of it's natural resources. A lot of people would like it but I think France will fight for that island.

Quite a few other islands in the Pacific are at odds with the U.S. over fishing rights. Fishing boats from the West Coast violate their waters and our government does nothing about it.

Guess who is being the champion for their rights and paying for fishing rights?

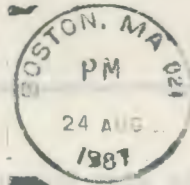
