VIETNAM NEWS NETWORK

This is the eleventh in a series of Americal Medal of Honor recipients.

LESTER R. STONE JR. K.I.A.

Rank and Organization; Sergeant, U.S. Army, 1st Platoon, Company B, 1st Battalion, 20th Infantry, 11th Infantry Brigade, 23rd Infantry Division (Americal). Place and Date: West of Landing Zone Liz, Republic of Vietnam, 3 March 1969. Entered Service: Syracuse, NY. Born: 4 June 1947 Binghamton, NY. Citation: For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty. Sgt. Stone, distinguished himself while serving as a squad leader of the 1st Platoon. The 1st Platoon was on a combat patrol mission just west of Landing Zone Liz when it came under intense automatic weapons and grenade fire from a well concealed company-size force of North Vietnamese regulars. Observing the platoon machinegunner fall critically wounded, Sgt. Stone remained in the exposed area to provide cover fire for the wounded soldier who was being pulled to safety by another member of the platoon. With enemy fire impacting all around him, Sgt. Stone had a malfunction in the machinegun, preventing him from firing the weapon automatically. Displaying extraordinary courage under the most adverse conditions, Sgt. Stone repaired the weapon and continued to place on the enemy positions effective suppressive fire which enabled the rescue to be completed. In a desperate attempt to overrun his position, an enemy force left its cover and charged Sgt. Stone. Disregarding the danger involved, Sgt. Stone rose to his knees and began placing intense fire on the enemy at pointblank range, killing 6 of the enemy before falling mortally wounded. His actions of unsurpassed valor were a source of inspiration to his entire unit, and he was responsible for saving the lives of a number of his fellow soldiers. His actions were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military profession and reflect great credit on him, his unit, and the U.S. Army.

These maps were a big hit with everyone and we need to thank ADVA member Dave Grieger for donating them to the Association. Dave was't able to attend Houston because "LZ Friendly" was under way in his home state at the same time. Dave sent them to me instructions to make them available in Houston and then place them permanently in the Americal museum at Fort Devens. So, Dave this Bud's for you.

Dear Ron;

An addition to the Weymouth, Ma., Vietnam Memorial Park is being planned to honor nurses who served in Vietnam, as well as those who served in all other wars.

Inspired by Col. Mary Quinn, (Ret.) of Weymouth, an Army nurse who served in Vietnam and Korea, the memorial will be an addition to two already at the park. One honors those killed in Vietnam that are from Weymouth. The other is dedicated to POW-MIA's of all wars. The addition is believed to be one of few if not the first to be established at a Vietnam memorial in any town in the U.S.

The date for the dedication has been set for Veterans Day, 1987

Mary was inspired regarding the idea of a memorial because of the death of Sharon Ann Lane. Sharon was the first nurse to be killed in Vietnam. She was KIA on June 9, 1969 in Chu-Lai when an NVA mortar round struck the 91st Evac Hospital. Mary has felt for a long time, as have the majority of Vietnam vets that little or no recognition has been given to the nurses who served in Vietnam. Also those who served in Korea and World War 2.

The memorial will consist of a stone of black African granite, the same as that of the "Wall" in Washington, D.C., along with a weeping cherry tree, (the tree of life). The inscription on the stone will consist of an inspirational poem that will touch the hearts of all nurses and veterans. The exact poem will not be definite until she can seek out more nurses and vets regarding the wording.

An amount of \$2500 has been set to achieve the goal of erecting the memorial. Contributions are welcome. The address is;

Last Year Labor Day Festival 86' raised \$9,000 for the Illinois Vietnam Veterans Memorial which, according to IVVMF Chairman Mike Ferguson, will be built and dedicated by this Veterans Day in Springfield, Illinois.

This year, Labor Day Festival 87' will be bigger and better than last year! The festival is expected to include a carnival, games, live music and entertainment, a circus, pony rides, clowns, magicians, food, beer and soft drinks, and highlighted by a half scale replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall of Washington, DC.

The festival will be held August 28, 29, and 30 on the 10 acres of the Gurnee American Legion grounds on Route 21 and 132 about 40 miles north of Chicago. "The festival hours are 10:00am to 10:00pm each day with a ribbon cutting ceremony at 2:00pm on Friday August 28th", according to Festival Chairman Rich Mosher.

"We'd like to invite everyone to come to the festival, not just some veterans", Mosher said. "Last year there was apparently some confusion in that regard. This year we have maps and motel listings for out of town visitors."

DID YOU KNOW?

I am typing this on August 10, 1987. According to a World War II Alamanac on this date in 1945--42 years ago--Tokyo announced the Japanese were willing to surrender but only if the status of the emperor remained unchanged.

Do you remember where you were? Most of the Americal units were on Cebu.

The Allies stuck to unconditional surrender and August 15, 1954 was declared V-J Day.

The local papers have been giving large coverage to memorial services in Japan and in various places in the United States. In Westport, CT a service there was given many columns of type. All the stories seem to point a shameful finger at The United States because we had dropped nuclear bombs on Japan. Nothing is said about the causes of the conflict or the vicious attack on Pearl Harbor that catapulted us into the War.

I searched the Boston Globe yesterday and today for stories about American soldiers and how glad they were to hear that the war was about finished. I guess everything centers around the good old dollar. Here is a story taken out of today's Boston Globe :

Embarrassing situation

Rhode Island is the only state in the nation that continues to observe Victory Day. Yesterday, as citizens in the state commemorated Japan's surrender to the United States during World War II, talk abounded about renaming the 39-year-old holiday, perhaps to Peace Day or World Peace Day. Adding fuel to this idea is something residents probably hadn't considered when the holiday was initiated: the Japanese are coming. Next summer, Toray Industries, a Japanese firm, is investing \$68 million to open a facility in North Kingston. It's unlikely the company will be pleased to learn its workers get time off to celebrate victory over Japan. (I say T.S.)

I say that it is time that the veterans in our country stop thinking about building memorials to themselves and start thinking about what has happened to the Victory that we achieved. It seems that our deeds are rapidly being forgotten. The Japanese school system teaches very little about World War II and the causes, the treachery, the treatment of prisoners, and the final defeat that they suffered.

According to a recent story in the Readers Digest, the so called Peace groups in United States have infiltrated the educational system in this country. Many of our young children are not being taught history as it happened. They are teaching a slanted version and WE are being made to look like the bad guys. The Japanese and the Russians are wearing the white hats. Our country may have many faults and we may have done a lot of things wrong but we have certainly helped a lot of people and there isn't a better place to live in the entire world!

It is my belief that all the veteran organizations in the country should band together and see that more "AMERICANISM" is taught in our school systems or otherwise we will be asked in the near future "What have you done for your country". What is wrong in saying "MY country, right or wrong it is MY country"?

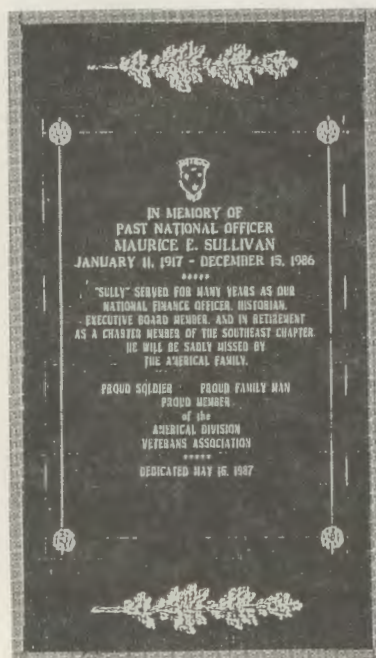
