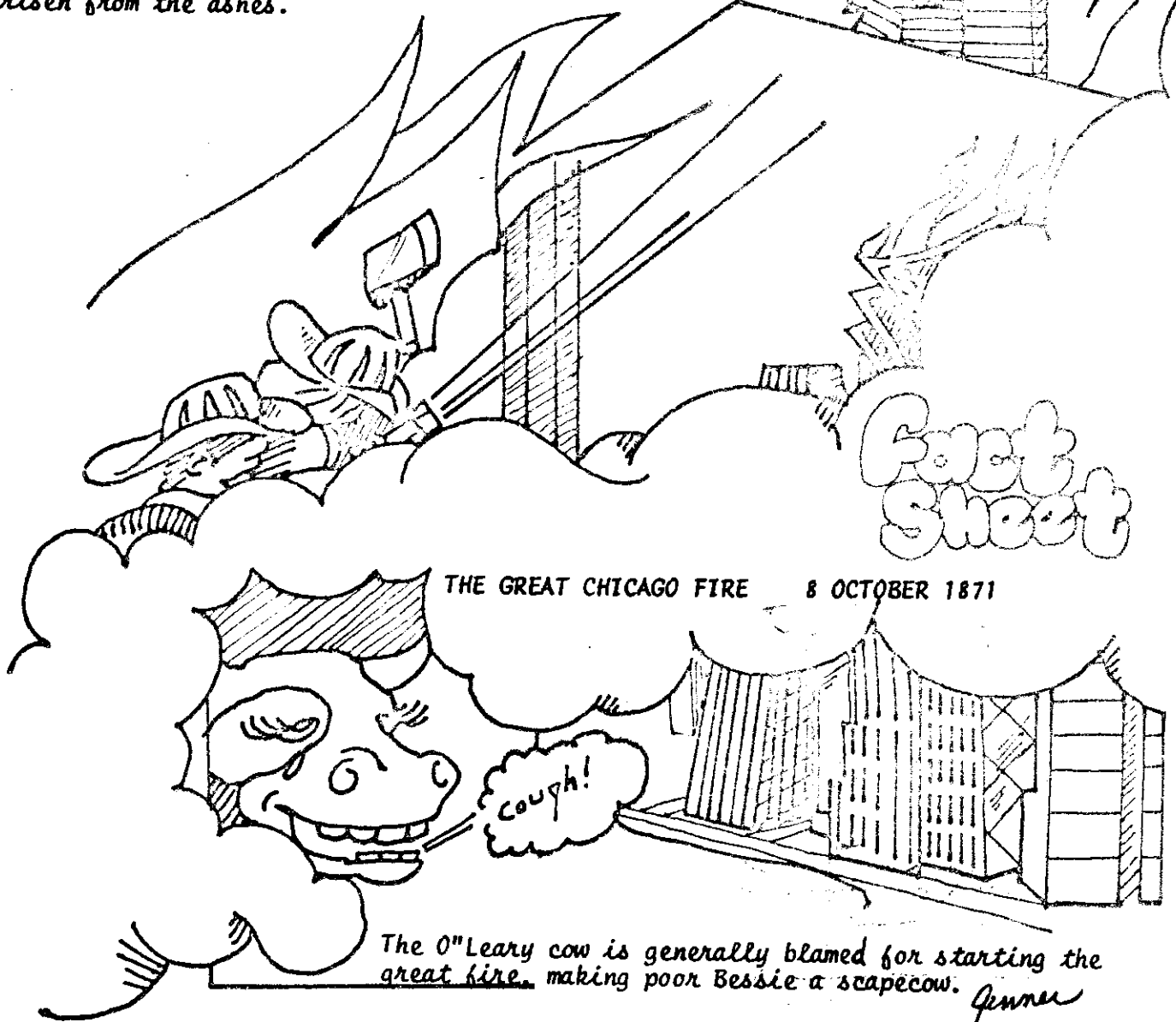
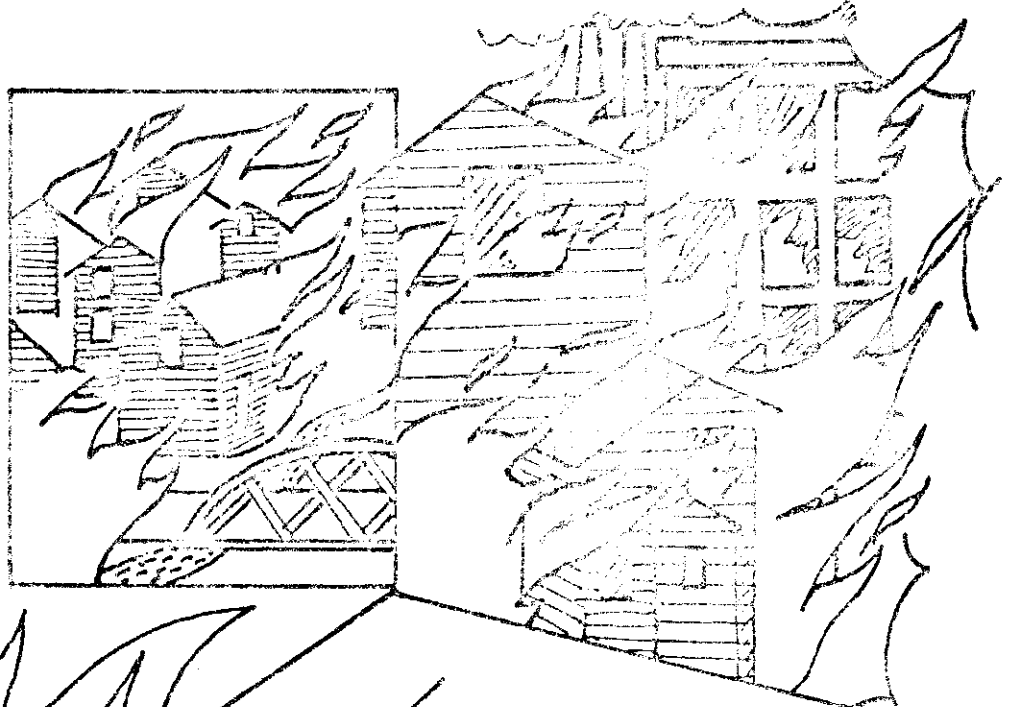


In the O'Leary's barn on DeKoven Street a blaze started on the morning of October 8, 1871. The prior months had been excessively dry, making fine tinder of all the wooden buildings in Chicago, and a strong wind quickly swept the flames eastward and northward across the river and into the heart of the business district.



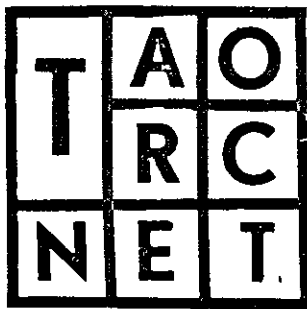
Despite heroic efforts, the fire soon raged out of control, finally burning itself out with help from a slight drizzle of rain on October 9th.

The fire had raged 27 hours, consuming 17,450 buildings in over a 3 square mile area, resulting in 250 deaths and \$200 million in damages. Two years later a new city of brick and stone had arisen from the ashes.

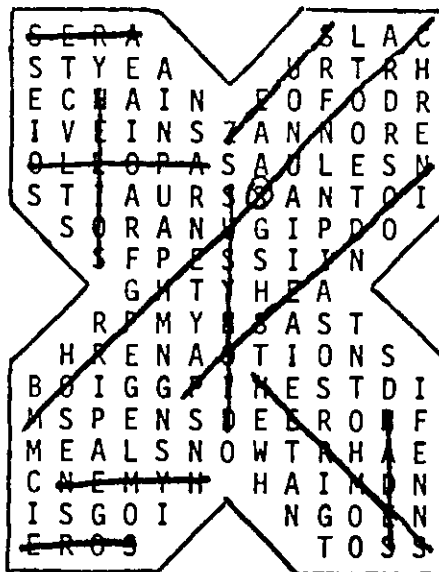

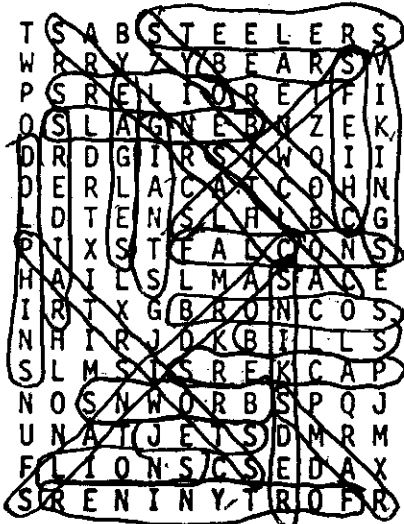

KOBRA-7:

Why are there so few court martials at Ramasun?

DYAS:

There has only been one court martial at Ramasun since I arrived here over ten months ago. However, seven other violations were referred to special court martial, which is the highest court possible at Ramasun. Of these, five individuals requested discharge in lieu of court martial, and received certificates with less than honorable discharge. One individual was medically evacuated for psychiatric problems, and another had his charges reduced to a field grade ART 15. However, it is true...there are very few courts at this station. The reason is very simple: there are few serious incidents by Ramasun personnel. There are numerous ART 15's for lesser offenses, such as disrespect, failure to repair, uniform and haircut infractions, and the list goes on. But there is very little major crime at Ramasun. Things like larcenies, assault and battery, fraud, and dealing in heroin have just not occurred at Ramasun during my tenure.

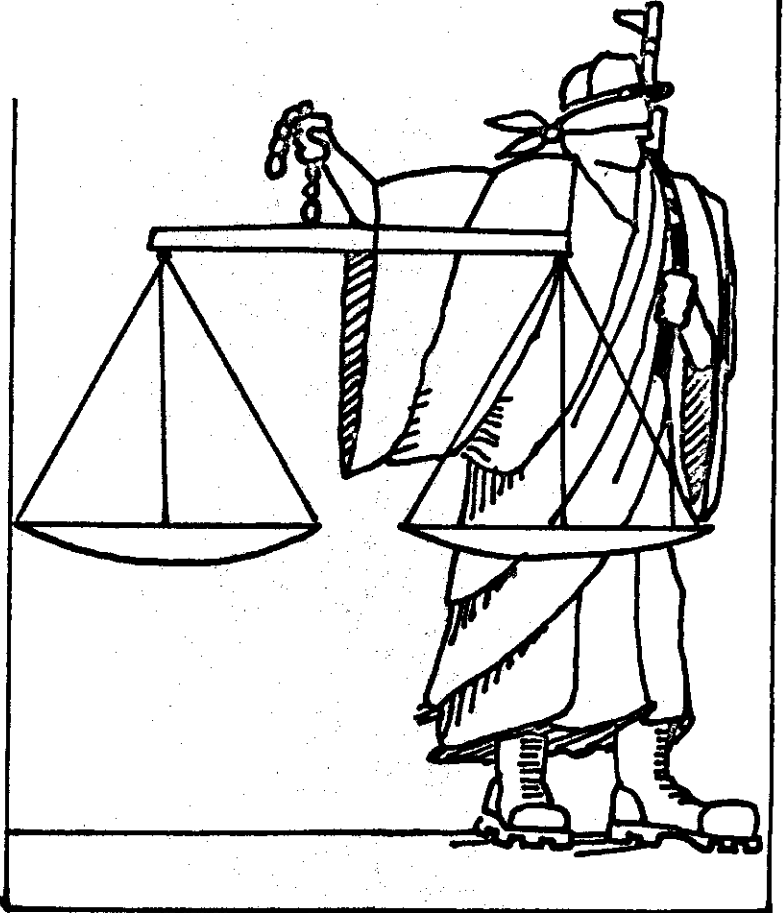
I honestly believe the rationale for this absence of major crime is the quality of the troops stationed here. Perhaps it's because Ramasun has an important mission, or because the individuals sent here are hand-picked, or because there are a lot of social outlets. I don't know what it is, but the troops at Ramasun seem to be far more intelligent and mature than those I have represented at prior assignments. I have been most impressed with the quality of my clients. It's been a pleasure.

KOBRA-7:

How many ART 15's are there at Ramasun?

DYAS:

During the fiscal year '73 there were 107 ART 15's imposed by the commanders of this installation. An ART 15 is punishment imposed by this command. It is first offered to an individual and he may choose to accept punishment or refuse it. If he refuses, the commander must decide whether or not to prefer charges for the alleged offense to trial by court martial. If charges are preferred and forwarded, the appropriate convening authority must decide whether to prefer charges to trial. For summary courts martial, the commander of the 7th RRFS is the convening authority. For general and specials empowered to give bad-conduct discharges, the convening authority is the commander of SUPTHAI.



KOBRA-7:

How is an appeal to an ART 15 made?

DYAS:

If ART 15 punishment is imposed upon an individual, he may (within a reasonable time) appeal the punishment. This is done by simply expressing grounds for the appeal in the ART 15 form itself, and submitting it to the commander who imposed it. That commander will then forward it to the next higher commander for approval or disapproval. The appeal will be reviewed for a legal opinion by the Judge Advocate Office before any action is taken.

KOBRA-7:

What rights does one have when offered an ART 15?

DYAS:

Before accepting or refusing an ART 15, a service member has a reasonable time in which to consider his decision...usually 72 hours. During this time frame he may consult with defense counsel at the JAG Office. Likewise, if he so requests, the JAG Officer may accompany him to the ART 15 proceeding. He may submit evidence on his own behalf, and request the commander to call and ask questions for him of material witnesses.

Silver Bells Chime

The men of the 6924th Security Squadron at Ramasun Station will join others across the globe celebrating the 25th Anniversary of their parent command, the United States Air Force Security Service, in ceremonies slated for October 20th.

USAFSS is an organization established to detect and correct communications security (COMSEC) leaks on the aerospace communications systems used by the US Air Force. In addition, the command maintains data and an analytic center for Air Force electronic warfare planning and operations.

The object of COMSEC surveillance is to determine where security weaknesses exist. When a problem is identified, an investigative team is dispatched to examine all aspects of the problem. Based on the team's recommendations, cryptographic equipment or code systems may be issued to the inspected unit.



The global command has more than \$200 million worth of cryptographic equipment and material scattered about the world to protect US communications. The importance of the USAFSS mission dictates the use of the most sophisticated electronic gear available. This equipment ranges from small inexpensive decoders to specially designed high and very high frequency receivers and antenna systems.

Because they use such sophisticated equipment, USAFSS men and women are among the Air Force's most highly trained and competent individuals. USAFSS operators come from the top 10 per cent of Air Force Recruits reporting to the Aerospace School of Applied Military Science at Lackland AFB, Texas.

Activated on October 20, 1948 at Arlington Hall Station, VA, the infant command was given control of three radio squadrons and one radio security section, all former Army units. Two of the units were deployed to overseas locations, while the others were positioned in up-state New York and at Arlington Hall Station, VA.

In 1949, the USAFSS headquarters staff and the Arlington Hall Station unit moved from their Virginia home to Brooks AFB, San Antonio, Texas. Four years later, the command moved to its present location in the west side of Kelly AFB, Texas.

With an assigned strength of more than 19,000 persons, USAFSS operates three specialized activities in addition to its worldwide network of field units. They are the Air Force Special Communications Center, the Air Force Communications Security Center and the Air Force Cryptologic Depot, all headquartered at Kelly AFB.

Providing aerospace communications security to an organization the size of the US Air Force is a monumental task. It is a continuous and exacting job and requires a dedicated effort of thousands of Security Service people - people in their 25th year of serving today's Air Force by maintaining "Freedom Through Vigilance."

It may be surprising to foreigners, but until 50 years ago Thais had no last names. At that time King Rama VI decided that his people should have last names, but in many ways the old custom of one name still remains.

There are so many different Thai first names that there really is no need to know a person's last name. As a matter of fact names in the Thai telephone directory are listed alphabetically by first names.

Introductions in Thailand are by first name. For instance, Mr. John Doe would be known as Mr. John. The custom of using first names is also evident in the newspapers, where high government officials are referred to in headlines by their first names.

In Thailand, a child is often given a nickname, even before his real name has been decided upon. This is because it takes time to find a name that has good meaning and is acceptable. The nickname given to a child is widely used by his family and later by his friends. It usually describes a characteristic of the individual such as "nid" - small; "maaew" - cat; or "uan" - fat.

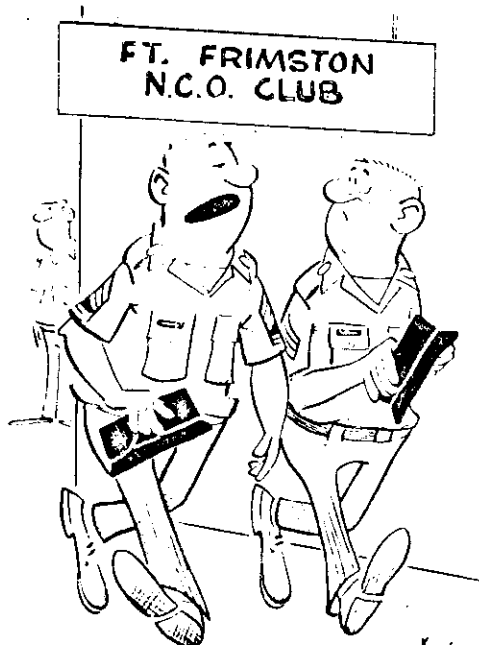
The All Black Flying Units of WWII

One of the most outstanding alumni of the 99th Fighter Squadron and the 332nd Fighter Squadron was the man who went to become the first black general in the US Armed Forces, Benjamin O. Davis, Jr. There were many other men, however, who flew with those units, and who achieved distinguished records.

CPT Charles B. Hall of Brazil, IN on July 2, 1943 destroyed a Focke-Wulf 190 over Castelventrane, Italy, giving him the honor of being the first black to destroy an enemy aircraft in aerial combat. For this accomplishment he was personally congratulated by GEN Dwight D. Eisenhower Allied Commander in Chief.

On Jan. 28, 1944, while leading a flight of eight planes on patrol in the Anzio area, a flight of enemy aircraft was encountered, Hall destroyed two of the planes. For this feat he was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross.

Of his experiences he modestly said, "Frankly, I don't think I have done any thing unusual....You know there were many whites who thought Negroes could not master swift moving planes under combat conditions. When I shot down a plane they were surprised and changed their minds. Furthermore, I couldn't feel right if someone writes about me and ignores the hundreds of other fellows who did as much as I to make the 99th and 332nd Fighter Squadrons successful in combat."

Some of these men were Edward L. Toppins of San Francisco who was officially credited with destroying four enemy aircraft in aerial combat and one probable, for which he was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross among other decorations.

CPT Wendell O. Pruitt of St. Louis, was credited with three victories and shared in the sinking of an enemy destroyer.

MAJ Lee Rayford of Arduick, MD, was one of the most decorated black pilots of WW II. After completing 90 missions in two tours of combat he was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal with six oak leaf clusters, the Purple Heart, the Order of Yugoslavia Partisans' Red Star, the American Defense Medal and the Victory Medal.

When the units were first formed back in March 7, 1942 at Tuskegee Army Air Field, Alabama, GEN George E. Stratemeyer then Commanding General of the Southeastern Flying Training Command said at the ceremonies, "I am sure that everyone present, as well as the vast unseen audience of your well wishers, senses that this graduation is an historic movement filled with portent of great good. Our country in engaged in a hard fight for its security and freedom. Here today is opened up a new source to wage that fight. It is my hope and my confident expectation that by your skill, courage, and devotion to duty you will fully justify that confidence and trust reposed in you, and that your service records will constitute bright pages in the annals of our country."

The men of the 99th and 332nd Fighter Squadrons more than lived up to those expectations. With a grand total of 1,578 missions, and with a grand total of 15,533 sorties, they were awarded more than 150 Distinguished Flying Crosses, 744 Air Medals and Clusters, fourteen Bronze Stars and eight Purple Hearts.

Golden Flow: Constitutionally Legal?

DYAS:

An Army member can file a claim for destruction, theft, or damage to personal belongings when it occurs incident to his service. That is, there must be some service connection for the claim. If a member has command approval to live off-post, and his bungalow gets ripped-off, he may file a proper claim. However, if he did not have command approval, he would not have a valid claim. Likewise, if a service member was the victim of a robbery on post, he could file a claim. The Army is responsible for protecting its members within its own jurisdiction. However, there would be no claim if the hold-up took place across the highway in Non Soong.

KOBRA-7:

What rights does an individual have against injustices committed in the Udorn community?

DYAS:

Many servicemen are under the misconception that the same judicial guarantees are available in the US. Therefore, they are usually rudely awakened when they are arrested by Thai authorities as a result of shakedown raids, or for merely being a spectator at the scene of a crime. Likewise, many servicemen are enraged when they are not afforded the right to an attorney when they are thrown in the "monkey house." Fortunately this command and local police have a very good relationship, and only one member of this station has received a jail sentence during my tenure. However, with the constantly changing political environment in Thailand, this good relationship is subject to change at any time. If this occurs, then the number of sentences to confinement could well increase.

KOBRA-7:

What procedural rights does one have against illegal search and seizure by the Thai police?

DYAS:

Although there are certain criminal procedures for search and seizure under Thai law, they are not as extensive as those in the US. The requirement for probable cause to conduct a search is far less stringent than that in America. Therefore, many troops are subject to having their premises searched at almost any time, with evidence seized admissible in Thai court. Likewise, by a 1967 Federal Court decision, Brulay v. United States, evidence seized as the result of a purely foreign search and turned over to US authorities, may be subsequently be pre-

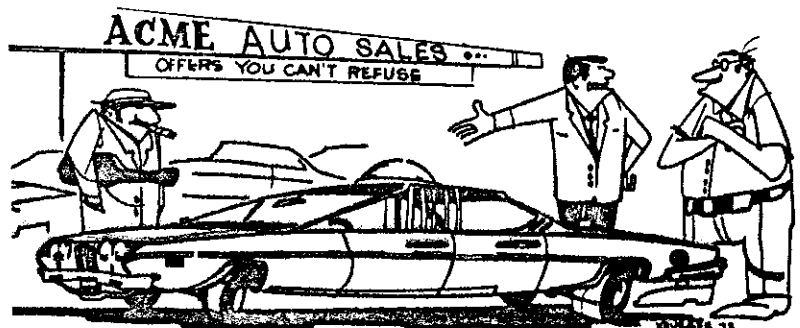
vented as evidence in a court martial, even where the search was a clear violation of Fourth Amendment protections.

KOBRA-7:

Is the Golden Flow Program constitutionally legal?

DYAS:

I have received more questions on this subject during the past year than on any other. To date Federal Courts have not seen fit to rule against urinalysis testing-by-order, as being a violation of the Fifth Amendment to the Constitution (the privilege against self-incrimination). The rationale for the tests by the Army is that it is solely for the purpose of protecting the health and welfare of its members. Also, by regulation, results of Golden Flow are not admissible in judicial or non-judicial punishment proceedings. Fifth Amendment rights are only applicable to those type hearings. The same Federal courts have not interpreted security revocations or administrative eliminations - based on Golden Flow results - as actions for which enlisted personnel are entitled to assert their Constitutional rights under the Fifth Amendment.

KOBRA-7:

Does the JAG Office handle immigration problems?

DYAS:

Presently, we provide counseling for service members who are contemplating bringing their dependents to Thailand, and for those who have married local nationals and desire to obtain US visas to return to the States. There is vast misinformation on this installation concerning US and Thai immigration procedures. Anyone who acts on this misinformation and fails to take advantage of the free counseling offered by our office is asking for whatever problems he encounters in the future. Also, the Judge Advocate Office assists enlisted personnel who are attempting to obtain command approval of foreign national marriages.

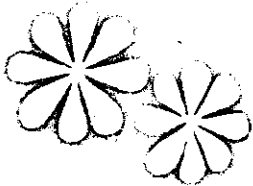

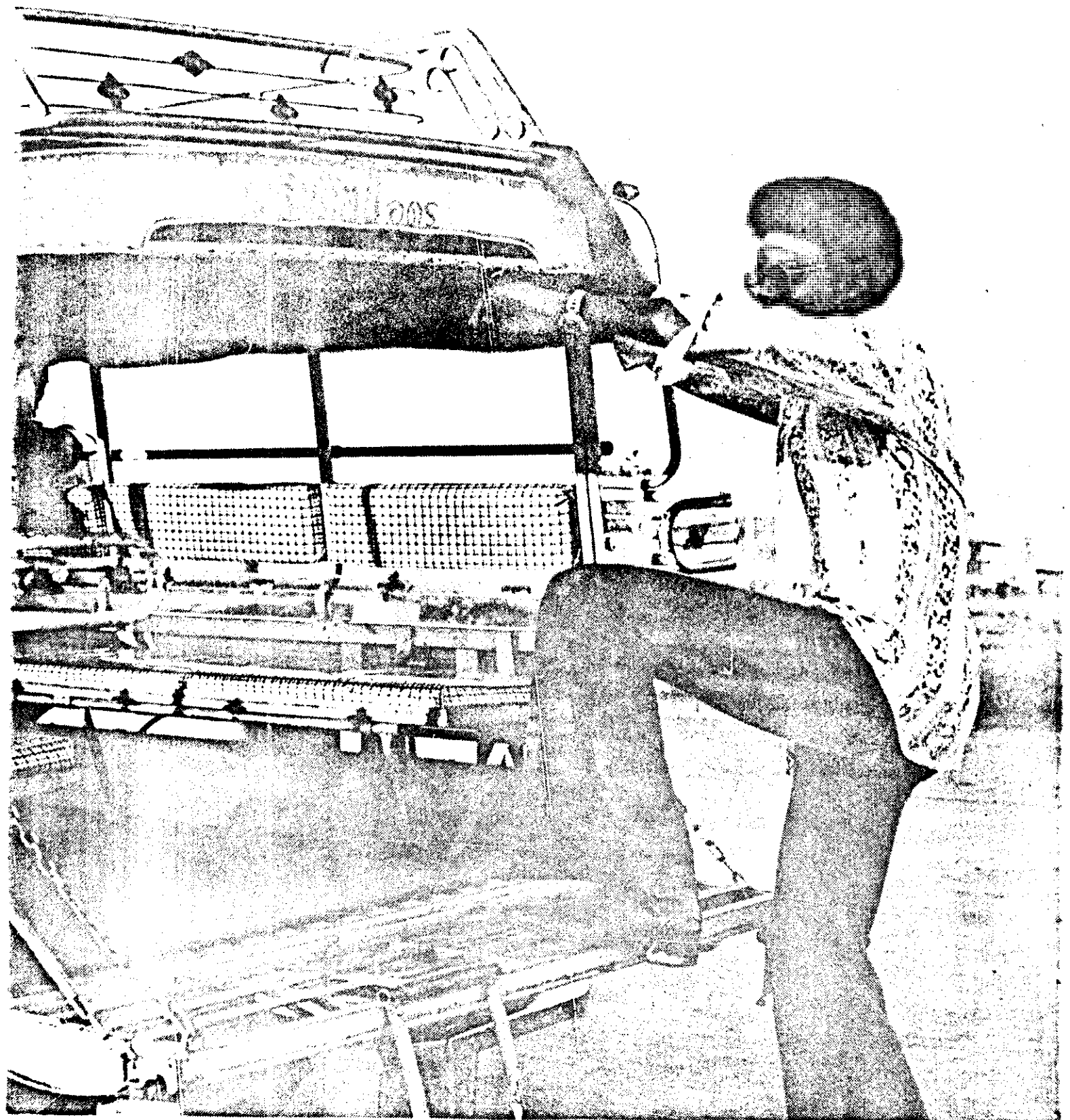

Here is the Pro Prophet picking the winners in the National Football League.

The Pro Prophet missed by one of a perfect record last weekend. The 12 out of 13 gives us a 29-8 record for the season, or an impressive .784.

Vikings - Lions

One of these weekends the Minnesota Vikings will be bounced from the unbeaten ranks. It could happen Sunday at Detroit. However, the Vikings have a few things going for them, like the one-two running punch of Chuck Foreman and Ed Marinaro. The Vikings are the pick to beat the Lions again.

Steelers - Chargers

Dolphins - Jets

The Miami Dolphins hope to shove the New York Jets minus Joe Namath deeper into the standings Sunday at Miami. Mercury Morris set a team record with rushing 97 yards in the 44-23 victory over New England. His three touchdowns tied a club mark. The Jet defense has given up only three touchdowns this season. But Miami is capable of doubling that number. The Dolphins are the choice.

Packers - Giants

The New York Giants move into the Yale Bowl Sunday for five home games and take on the Green Bay Packers. Both the Giant and Packers own identical 1-1-1 records. The Giants bowed to the Browns 12-10 last Sunday with leading rusher Ron Johnson on the sidelines with an injury. He'll be back against the Packers. Green Bay was held to a field goal in the 11-3 loss to Minnesota. A flip of the coin comes up Green Bay in a close one.

Falcons - 49'ers

The Atlanta Falcons are about to ready score a touchdown when the San Francisco 49'ers come to town Sunday. Patriots - Colts

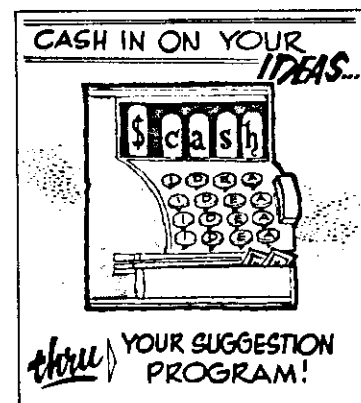
Cowboys - Redskins
