OBJECTIVES: To fund self-help development projects and disaster relief, and also to prepare and distribute educational materials for people in the U.S. on the issue of development and hunger; to campaign to end U.S. trade embargo on Viet Nam.

HISTORY OF INVOLVEMENT IN VIET NAM: Oxfam America made its first assessment visit to Viet Nam in 1982. On that visit staff identified a range of projects focusing on small-scale agriculture, agricultural training, and health. Under the strict embargo on humanitarian assistance in place at the time, however, only the health projects received a license from the U.S. government under the Trading with the Enemy Act. In response to the license denials Oxfam America concentrated its efforts related to Viet Nam over the next five years on changing U.S. government policy which prohibited even small-scale assistance to the critical agricultural sector. With the change in policy in 1987-88 allowing NGO work which meets "basic human needs", Oxfam America reactivated its program in Viet Nam. It is currently working both in northern and southern regions of the country with assistance concentrated on food production, agricultural research, afforestation, and credit for women.

OBJECTIVES: PACT is a consortium of NGO's from the U.S., Africa, Asia and Latin America. It was founded in 1972 to promote NGO collaboration, strengthen field programs, build capabilities of indigenous organizations and provide skill training and technical services to achieve people-centered sustainable development. PACT hopes to assist the NGO's in meeting Viet Nam's humanitarian and developmental needs.

HISTORY OF INVOLVEMENT IN VIET NAM: PACT began exploring ways of assisting NGO's working in Viet Nam after the Stony Point Conference organized by the Interagency Task Force on Vietnam in December 1989. During PACT consultant's visit to Viet Nam in February 1990, PACC (People's Aid Coordinating Committee) was identified as the contact point for NGO's desiring to work in Viet Nam. To enhance PACC capability in collaborating with international NGO's and in interpreting community needs to these organizations, PACT sponsored the visit of PACC Director to the U.S., in September-October 1990. Through meetings at U.S.NGO headquarters PACC Director gained greater understanding of the diversity of their objectives and methods of operation.

During the second trip, a meeting with the National Committee for Population and Family Planning (NCPFP) in Ha Noi resulted in that organization designating three provinces in which they would like Pathfinder to work: Ha Bac, Hai Hung, and Nghe Tinh.



OBJECTIVES: The Committee, composed of academics, physicians, and scholars from universities, has been one of the principal conduits for contact between American scientific and academic communities and the people of Viet Nam. One of the Committee's priorities has been to support projects and programs that empower people to pursue their own development rather than becoming passively dependent on infusions of financial and material aid from external sources.

HISTORY OF INVOLVEMENT IN VIET NAM: Founded in 1978, the Committee was originally aimed at facilitating exchanges and joint research between U.S. scientists and physicians and their Vietnamese counterparts. Later it expanded its area of focus to include assisting gifted Vietnamese graduate students to obtain additional academic training in the U.S., providing material assistance to scientific laboratories and hospitals, and support for cultural and social programs.

Humanitarian assistance has been provided to Bach Mai Hospital in Hanoi and the Rehabilitation Center for Undernourished Orphans in Ho Chi Minh City. USIRP publishes Indochina Interchange, a quarterly newsletter covering programs of aid to and exchange with Viet Nam, Cambodia and Laos.






