Many thanks for your several letters. This is in reply to your letter of September 1. I today located Bill Templeton who is in the East Asian area of AID. He said that he believed a feasibility study was conducted concerning Premier Angus, Inc., and so far as he knew, the study would be available for your perusal. He is going to call me back shortly to see whether he has located the study and whether I can borrow it, which I will send to you on a loan basis. I doubt that AID has any copies to give away since it is not in the printing business. In any case, I will spare no effort to get you what you need if there is any way to do it, and will be sending you another letter shortly on this subject.

Regarding the fishing in Montana, it was a wonderful experience. We caught and released a lot of trout, and ate a few, but did not locate any big ones. About 11 inches was the best I could find. We fished the Upper Gallatin and other streams in the Northwest corner of Yellowstone Park, and floated down the Madison River for a ways. Unfortunately, the power company had opened the dam to generate more power and this raised the water level and clouded up the Madison considerably. We stayed at a place called Elkhorn Ranch, which is a fairly expensive dude outfit, but still I got a good taste of the Big Sky country and really loved it. I don't know whether Troy, Idaho, is in the good country or not. If you know of a small tract, preferably with a cabin on it and in a remote location where there is access to good fishing, you might start your career in the real estate business by selling me a piece of land. I would expect to pay a substantial markup for the privilege of being advised by a knowledgeable expert in this area like yourself.

Len Maynard is here attending the National War College. He is just fine. You change your address a lot, so please make sure that if you move out of Pacific Mansion, you will let me know where to get you the next time.
