Dear Peter:

Your letter of August 10 reached me only today, since I have been away on vacation. You did not enclose the brochure containing Gullion's views on Viet-Nam, and therefore I cannot comment on them. When I talk on Viet-Nam, it is from notes because I like to stay away from the formalized presentation and create an atmosphere of informal and free exchange, to the extent possible.
