Although the primary source for advice and assistance to reserve judge advocates is the Executive Officer for Reserve Affairs in the local Army area, special circumstances may require that information be obtained directly from the Assistant for Reserve Affairs in the Office of The Judge Advocate General. II. PROMOTION OF THE RESERVE COMPONENT JUDGE ADVOCATE (AR 135-155).

A. GENERAL.

A reserve component judge advocate will be eligible for promotion at regular intervals and

may retire at the end of 20 or more years of satisfactory service with pay beginning at age 60.

B. PROMOTION SERVICE AND YEARS OF SERVICE REQUIREMENTS.

1. Promotion Upon Mandatory Consideration.

C. EDUCATIONAL QUALIFICATION FOR PROMOTION.

The current educational requirements for promotion are set forth in AR 135-155. Although there are some exceptions and alternate requirements, educational qualification for Reserve component JAGC officers may be summarized as follows:

To be educationally qualified for promotion to captain

Actual, equivalent or constructive credit for completion of the Judge Advocate Basic Indoctrination Extension Course, The Judge Advocate General Basic Course, 5F-8101, the Judge Advocate General Officer Orientation Course, 5-18-C21, the Judge Advocate General Field Grade Officer Refresher Course, 5-18-C08, or be enrolled in and satisfactorily participating in a judge advocate officer career course. (Officers who do not have credit for a basic course but who have been permitted to enroll in a career course must complete one of the basic courses).

To be educationally qualified for promotion to major

Actual, equivalent, or constructive credit for one-half of a judge advocate officer career course (240 hours of the E23 course, 4

phases of the USAR School Branch Officer Advanced Course, or any combination thereof).

To be educationally qualified for promotion to lieutenant colonel

Actual, equivalent, or constructive credit for an entire judge advocate officer career course (480 hours of the E23 course, seven phases of the USAR School Branch Officer Advanced Course, or any combination thereof).

To be educationally qualified for promotion to colonel

Actual, equivalent, or constructive credit for one of the following: (1) The Regular or Associate Course of the U. S. Army Command and General Staff College. (Associate Course no longer administered.) (2) Both the Special Associate Course (Division) and the Special Associate Course (Advanced) of the U. S. Army Command and General Staff College. (No longer administered.) (3) Both the U. S. Army Command and General Staff College Staff Extension Course and the Advanced Combat Arms or Advanced Logistics Course. (No longer administered.) (4) The U. S. Army Command and General Staff College Extension Course, effective 31 December 1969, including Phase X of (7) below. (5) The resident-nonresident Command and General Staff College Extension Course. (No longer administered.) (6) Both the USAR School Associate Command and General Staff Course (Division) and the USAR School Associate Command and General Staff Course (Advanced). (7) The USAR School Associate Command and General Staff Course (5-year Course). (8) The U. S. Army Command and General Staff College Mobilization General Staff Officer Course.

Effective 1 July 1972 the following educational requirements for promotion will apply:

To be educationally qualified for promotion to captain where the officer has completed two years of active duty and is filling a unit position

Same as current requirements.

To be educationally qualified for promotion to captain where the officer has not had two

years active duty or is not filling a unit position

Actual, equivalent or constructive credit for 25 percent of judge advocate career or advanced course.

To be educationally qualified for promotion to major

Actual, equivalent or constructive credit for the judge advocate career or advanced course.

To be educationally qualified for promotion to lieutenant colonel

Actual, equivalent or constructive credit for 50 percent of the Command and General Staff Officer Course.

To be educationally qualified for promotion to colonel

Actual, equivalent or constructive credit for The Command and General Staff Officer Course.

D. MANDATORY TRANSFERS UPON PROMOTION.

1. Each USAR officer assigned to a unit vacancy who was promoted upon mandatory consideration or to fill a vacancy in overall grade structure will, effective as of the date of his promotion, be transferred from his unit unless, upon promotion, he is still able to fill a vacancy in his unit that is consistent with his new grade. However, a first lieutenant who has declined his promotion for the maximum period under the provisions of paragraph 1-6a (2) AR 135-155, may be promoted upon completion of that declination period to the grade of captain without being transferred from his unit when there is no unit vacancy, provided qualified lieutenants

are not available and all other positions in the unit in the grade of captain and above are occupied.

2. For officers who do not wish to be promoted out of their unit position, new procedures for declining the promotion are established in paragraph 1-6, C 2, AR 135-155.

E. SELECTION BOARDS.

Army selection boards make all selections except those for promotion to fill unit vacancies in the Army National Guard. The latter selections are made by state authorities. The boards usually consider an officer during the calendar year preceding the calendar year in which he will meet the requirements of promotion service and years of service. The officer must fulfill the military educational requirements before the board is convened.

III. EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES.

A. EXTENSION COURSES.

1. Extension Course Catalog.

A new extension course catalog was published on 1 August 1969. It is available to reserve component judge advocates and other eligible persons interested in enrolling in one of the extension courses offered by this School. Requests for the catalog should be directed to the Commandant, The Judge Advocate General's School, U. S. Army, ATTN: Director, Nonresident Training Department, Charlottesville, Virginia 22901.

2. The Judge Advocate Basic Indoctrination Extension Course.

This course is designed for those reserve component officers receiving a commission in the JAGC without concurrent duty to active duty. It is an educational prerequisite for reserve component judge advocates who desire to enroll in the USAR School Branch Officer Advanced Course or the Judge Advocate Officer Career Extension Course (5-18-E23). Students enrolled in this course must complete its 66 hours in one year.

3. Judge Advocate Officer Career Extension Course, 5-18-E23.

The Judge Advocate Officer Career Extension Course, 5-18-E23, is a 480-hour course patterned after the resident career course offered at The Judge Advocate General's School, U. S. Army. The course must be completed at the rate of 120 hours a year. At least 40 of the 120 hours must be completed by extension subcourses. The remaining 80 hours may be completed either by correspondence or by attending resident short courses at The Judge Advocate General's School, U. S. Army.

The E23 course is a revision of the old Judge Advocate Officer Career Extension Course (5-18-E24), and, like its counterpart in the USAR School, (Branch Officer Advanced Course), consists of seven phases, three of which deal with common subjects. Although the time frame for completion of the Judge Advocate Officer Career Extension Course is recommended as four years as opposed to three years for the BOAC, the extension course is designed to be completely interchangeable with the BOAC. Thus, the reserve officer can complete his military education through a combination of USAR School training, extension course enrollment, and attendance at short resident courses at the Judge Advocate General's School without losing credits or delaying his career course completion.

4. Specialization Courses.

Specialization Extension courses are currently available in the fields of Military Affairs, Military Justice, International Law, and Procurement Law for judge advocate officers (active duty and reserve component) who have completed a judge advocate officer career course of basic graduate level courses, requiring an in-depth study of military legal subjects designed primarily for senior non-unit judge advocates who desire to continue their military-legal education and earn retirement points. Specialization courses are also available to officers enrolled in the USAR School New Developments or Staff Judge Ad-

vocate Operations Courses who are unable to attend ANACDUTRA at The Judge Advocate General's School, U. S. Army.

5. Other Extension Courses.

The following additional extension courses are available through The Judge Advocate General's School extension course program: Legal Administrative Technician Course (MOS 713A); Senior Branch Non-commissioned Officers Course; Legal Clerk Course (MOS 71D); Military Law for Commanders and Staff Officers Course; and Legal Clerk's Military Justice Specialization Training (Inferior Court Martial Administration). Students also may enroll for selected subcourses under the miscellaneous enrollment program.

6. Constructive and Equivalent Credit.

a. Extension course students who have completed courses, or portions of courses, which are identical or substantially similar to courses in the Judge Advocate extension course program will be awarded equivalent credit for such previous completions pursuant to paragraph 6a, AR 135-316.

b. Paragraph 6b, AR 135-316, authorizes The Judge Advocate General to award constructive credit for basic and career level courses to officers who possess unique professional qualifications or experience. Requests for such credit should be in the form of a letter and should be forwarded through the Commandant, The Judge Advocate General's School, U. S. Army, to The Judge Advocate General. The letter should detail all qualifications that warrant an award of constructive credit.

7. Extension of Enrollment, Cancellation, and Re-enrollment.

If an extension course student is unable to complete the minimum number of credit hours required for an enrollment year, he may, upon request, be granted one extension of up to 90 days to complete the required number of credit hours. However, the period of the extension will be deducted from the

subsequent enrollment year, thereby giving the student a correspondingly shortened period during the next enrollment year to complete the required number of credit hours. If the student completes the required number of credit hours prior to the end of the extension, any additional work completed during the remainder of the extension period will be credited toward the following year.

If a student fails to complete the required number of credit hours, even after an extension, his enrollment will be canceled involuntarily and re-enrollment may be denied for a period of 12 months. However, if a student voluntarily requests cancellation, he may, at any time after such cancellation, be re-enrolled simply by sending an informal letter to the Commandant, The Judge Advocate General's School, U. S. Army, ATTN: Director, Nonresident Training Department, Charlottesville, Virginia 22901. The 12-month waiting period for students who are involuntarily canceled may be waived by the Commandant, The Judge Advocate General's School, U. S. Army, when it would be inequitable to enforce it.

B. USAR SCHOOL COURSES.

1. Branch Officer Advanced Course (BOAC).

The USAR School Branch Officer Advanced Course (BOAC) for the judge advocate officer consists of 144 hours of common subjects instruction and 320 hours of judge advocate legal subject training. Two hundred and forty hours of the legal subject instruction will be accomplished in three periods of annual active duty for training. The remaining 80 hours of legal subjects will be completed by either a two-week short course at The Judge Advocate General's School, U. S. Army, or by correspondence. The common subjects instruction is conducted over a period of three years of inactive duty training.

The USAR School Branch Officer Career Course (BOCC) was phased out in August 1968. Students formerly enrolled in the

BOCC have been transferred to the seven (7) phase USAR School BOAC in accordance with the following plan:

Under the provisions of AR 140-1, reserve component officers assigned to a troop program unit may attend the USAR School Branch Officer Advanced Course as equivalent training in lieu of regularly scheduled unit training. Paragraph 7a, Appendix VIII, Annex AA, CON Reg 350-1, 3 November 1969, specifically authorizes officers to attend USAR School career course and command and general staff training in lieu of regularly scheduled unit reserve duty training and annual active duty training.

Students whose circumstances prevent them from completing a portion of the USAR School Branch Officer Advanced Course are permitted to make up that portion by completing equivalent extension subcourses offered by The Judge Advocate General's School. Application for this make-up is made on DA Form 145, submitted through appropriate military channels to the Commandant

of The Judge Advocate General's School. Item 10 of DA Form 145 should contain the notation "Integrated Program" and specify the portion of the USAR school career course which is to be completed by extension.

2. Judge Advocate Reserve New Developments Course.

The New Developments Course is offered during alternate years when the Judge Advocate Course, "Staff Judge Advocate Operations," is not being offered at the USAR school. New materials are provided each time the course is taught, so that students may profitably take the course more than once. Actual or constructive credit for the Judge Advocate Officer Career Course is a prerequisite for enrollment in the course. (See 3 below for ANACDUTRA). The current Program Of Instruction for the USAR School Judge Advocate New Development Course, 1 July 1969 is applicable for the 1969-1970 and 1971-1972 presentation of the course.

3. Staff Judge Advocate Operations Course.

The Staff Judge Advocate Operations Course is a graduate course which is offered in alternate years, when the Reserve New Developments Course is not offered. It provides officers with legal training in the operations and functions of the office of a staff judge advocate and prepares them for the assumption of mobilization duties in the Active Army. Actual or constructive credit for the Judge Advocate Officer Career Course is a prerequisite for enrollment. A Program Of Instruction for the USAR School Staff Judge Advocate Operations Course will be issued in the summer of 1970. It is anticipated that the Program Of Instruction will cover the 1970-1971 and 1972-1973 school years.

For both the Reserve New Developments and the Staff Judge Advocate Operations Courses, ANACDUTRA consists of attendance at a resident short course offered at The Judge Advocate General's School on completion of extension Specialization Courses.

C. RESIDENT SHORT COURSES.

To supplement the extension and USAR school programs, The Judge Advocate General's School offers various resident short courses during the year which are available to reserve component judge advocates. Such courses offer the student the advantage of receiving the identical instruction given active duty judge advocates by the faculty of The Judge Advocate General's School. Application to attend any of the School's resident short courses may be made by submitting DA Form 1058 through military channels. Applications should be submitted at least 60 days prior to the opening date of the course requested.

1. Basic Level Courses.

The four week Judge Advocate General's Corps Officer Orientation Course, 5-18-C21, and the two week Judge Advocate General Field Grade Officer Refresher Course, 5-18-C8, are equivalent to the Judge Advocate Basic Indoctrination Extension Course. Attending either of these two courses will satisfy the prerequisites for enrolling in the USAR School Branch Officer Advanced Course or the Judge Advocate Officer Career Extension Course. Company grade officers may attend the refresher course by requesting waiver of grade requirements when making application to attend the course.

2. Career Level Courses.

Throughout the year The Judge Advocate General's School offers various two week resident short courses as part of its continuing legal education program. Reserve component judge advocates are invited to attend these courses as either ANACDUTRA or as additional ACJL credit towards completion of the Judge Advocate Officer Career Extension Course. Credit for attendance at one of these courses, accordingly, officers should be careful to avoid duplicating, in residence, portions of the course already completed by extension.

3. Schedule of Resident Short Courses for FY 1970 Changed.

Due to a conflict with the Hartiesburg ANACDUTRA the schedule of resident short courses for the remainder of Fiscal Year 1970 has been modified. The schedule for the period 1 December 1969 to the end of the fiscal year will be as follows:

IV. UNIT TRAINING

A. LOGEX.

LOGEX 70 is scheduled to be held at Fort Lee, Virginia, from 26 April to 9 May 1970. The 1st and 9th JAG Detachments have been selected for participation in the exercise. All judge advocate officers, including those assigned to units, are eligible to apply for attendance. Individual reservists, not assigned to units, should send their application to the Maneuver Director through the Commanding Officer, U. S. Army Administration Center, St. Louis, Missouri 63132. Individual officers assigned to units should submit their applications to the Maneuver Director through their unit and AECOM commanders. Applications (DA Form 1058) should be submitted through appropriate channels in accordance

with AR 135-200. Applications should include a summary of military experience, military and civilian schooling, adjusted date of rank, social security number, whether proposed participation is to be ANACDUTRA or ACDUTRA, and whether the applicant participated in LOGEX 68 or LOGEX 69. Applications in duplicate should reach the Commanding Officer, 22d Field Army Support Command, ATTN: LOGEX Division, Fort Lee, Virginia 23801, for approval prior to 1 March 1970. Applications of mobilization designees will be submitted to the proponent agencies. An information copy of the application from each JAGC, USAR, officer should be forwarded separately to: Commandant, The Judge Advocate General's School, U. S. Army, ATTN: Director, Plans and Publications Department, Charlottesville, Virginia 22901.

B. JAG DETACHMENT ANACDUTRA.

With the exception of the JAG Detachments that will be attending LOGEX 70, all JAG Detachments will perform ANACDUTRA at Hattiesburg, Mississippi, during the period 14-27 June. All officer training will be of a military-legal nature presented by the faculty of The Judge Advocate General's School. Appropriate enlisted training will also be provided.

In addition to providing legal instruction, The Judge Advocate General's School will send representatives of the Individual Training and Career Management Division to Hattiesburg to provide career counseling on an individual basis.

C. JAG DETACHMENT RESERVE DUTY TRAINING.

To assist in reserve duty training, The Judge Advocate General's School prepares some 800 staff training problems designed to provide in-depth study in a given area of military law. A catalog of staff training material outlining the materials available may be obtained by writing the Commandant, The Judge Advocate General's School, ATTN: Nonresident Training Department, Charlottesville, Virginia 22901.

In keeping with The Judge Advocate General's School's continuing efforts to upgrade reserve training, the School has completed, and delivered to the field, 128 hours of filmed lectures for the use of reserve judge advocates. The lectures includes 15 hours of military affairs, 15 hours of claims, 30 hours of procurement law, 30 hours of international law, 30 hours of military justice and three hours on the legal aspects of civil disturbances. Each filmed lecture is to be accompanied by instructor and student packets of supplementary material designed to provide in-depth study in every area of military law. Officers who view the films and participate fully in the supplementary instruction will be granted appropriate equivalent credit in the Judge Advocate Officer Career Extension Course upon receipt by the Nonresident Training Department, The Judge Advocate General's School, U. S. Army, of JAGS FL 38 verifying their participation. The films, supplementary materials, and JAGS FL 38 are available through the Executive Officer for Reserve Affairs in each Army area.
