This month's cover symbolizes our national holiday of Thanksgiving, which is celebrated on the fourth Thursday of every November.



Chaplain's Page

One of the basic needs of every man is to be free. Christianity, with its focal point of Our Lord's rising from the dead, is the great celebration of human freedom. Let me illustrate how this is so by taking an incident from World War II:

In a Japanese prisoner of war camp on the Philippine island of Luzon, a ragged group of American prisoners, survivors of the infamous Bataan death march, waited. For five long years, their ranks were decimated by hunger, disease and maltreatment. They were discouraged, always wondering-about home, families, loved ones—never hearing a word. As time went on, they began to notice a change in their captors. They saw an occasional friendly plane fly overhead. At length, they began to hear the thunder of artillery in the distance. Finally, one day in early summer, the guards and staff fled in near panic. They had scarcely gotten clear of the camp when an American tank rumbled down the dusty dirt road and battered down the barbed-wire fence. Other tanks and infantry poured into the camp and released the prisoners. They were ecstatic—crying and laugh-

ing, throwing their arms around their liberators and shouting with all the strength they could muster: WE'RE FREE, THANK GOD, WE'RE FREE!

This is what the message of the gospel, the Christian way of life, is all about. I think you can see the analogy. Before coming of Christ, the whole human race sat like people in bondage, in the darkness of sin. It was a world without grace, without hope, save the dim expectation of a future saviour, people wondering, waiting, suffering-like prisoners in some colossal war between the forces of good and evil.

In the fullness of time, God sent signs upon the face of the earth, His prophets. And they proclaimed loud and clear, "Behold...He is coming. The Lamb of God", as John calls Christ, "Who takes away the sins of the world". This is the Lamb who was slain for us; God's Son, our Brother, Christ, the Lord. He, like another Moses will lead his people, which is all mankind. And He will lead us, will liberate us, by his agonizing, suffering and tears, his teaching and example, his death and resurrection. By all of this would He ransom captive mankind. By this would he burst asunder the shackles of sin that had bound his people. By this would he lead his people out of darkness into light; out of sin into the brilliance of his love and

grace; from despair to hope; from slavery to freedom, the freedom of the sons of God where with Christ has made us free.

This, then, is the meaning and message of Christianity. And to anyone who calls himself a Christian, it carries a challenge. The challenge is to walk worthy of the vocation with which we have been called. Following in the Master's footsteps, we are called upon to be other Christ's, ministering as He did to the anguish, the pain, the hunger, the sorrow, the loneliness, the tears of our brothers and sisters in the human family. The challenge of Christianity is to bring Christ from the tomb, to the market place; to radiate the goodness and love of the risen Christ to all men in the homes, the offices, the stores and factories, the streets and fields of our nation....and, yes, in our jails and brigs and prisons as well.

To this end, let me conclude with the beautiful prayer of St. Francis, that the true freedom of the sons of God may find its perfect expression in the life of each of us:

Lord, make me an instrument of Thy peace.
Where there is hatred, let me sow love.
Where there is injury, pardon.
Where there is doubt, faith.
Where there is despair, hope.
Where there is darkness, light.
Where there is sadness, joy.

O Divine Master, grant that I may not so much seek to be consoled; to be understood as to understand; to be loved as to love.
For it is in giving that we receive;
It is in pardoning that we are pardoned;
And it is in dying that we are born to eternal life.

NEWS AND COMMENTS

The following article was taken from the September-October issue of the Island Lantern, from McNeil Island, Washington. We would like to say "Thanks" to their staff for this excellent food for thought.

COLOMBIA LEGALIZES DRUGS

The Republic of Colombia is the first nation in the Western hemisphere, and possibly the world, to legalize the use and possession of narcotic drugs.

Effective as of July 15, this year, it is now legal to use or possess marijuana and all classes of narcotic drugs, including LSD, provided these drugs are used in one's own home or some other private place.

"This means," says Dr. Reynaldo Jaramillo of the Superior Court of Bogota, "that the voluntary use of such drugs in your own home or in any other private place is a free and sovereign act of the particular person if this act does not go beyond privacy and affect the public."

Judge Reyes, one of Latin America's foremost jurist and one of the principals responsible for this progressive legislation, explains that with this legalizing the use of and possession of narcotic drugs, the person who suffers from the effects of such substances and in some form affects the public order, will be treated medically and psychiatrically in place of being put in jail. It is his opinion that this is the better form of effecting the rehabilitation of the user.

This new and important approach to the handling of the drug problem is the result of a two year period of parliamentary debate by the National Congress of Colombia. The new laws, as translated from the *Diario Oficial* of Colombia dated August 5, 1970, are as follows:

TITLE II, Article 26. "He who without permission of the competent authorities, merchandises, elaborates, distributes, sells or in any other way provides marijuana, cocaine, morphine, or any drug or stupefying or hallucinogenic substance will be punished by arrest from one to four years.

"The punishment will be increased up to one-fourth more if such drugs or substances are provided to minors of age. In this case a fine of five hundred to ten thousand pesos will be applied."

Article 27. "He who possesses or carries in a public place or open to the public a stupefying substance or hallucinogen without being able to prove legitimate possession will be punished by a fine of one hundred to two thousand pesos."

Article 28. "He who in his house, place of business, or other establishment sponsors the use of a stupefying substance or hallucinogen will be punished by arrest of six to twelve months."

Article 29. "He who without permission of the competent authorities cultivates or maintains a plant from which can be obtained marijuana, opium, cocaine, or any other stupefying substance will be punished by arrest of six to twenty-four months and a fine of five hundred to two thousand pesos."

Peculiar to the classification of crime in Colombia, these offenses are *contravenciones* (misdemeanors) and not *delitos* (felonies). Pre-trial detention for a misdemeanor is not permitted; and, should the offender be sentenced to arrest, jail conditions will be special and exceptionally favorable.

Boiled down, the meaning of these new laws is that the Justice Ministry of Colombia is attempting to treat drug offenders more as sick people than as criminals. However, this amelioration of the user's position does not include in any way the person who traffics in drugs. The dealer will be still dealt with severely. Secure in the use and possession of narcotic drugs in his own home, the citizen of Colombia need not fear legal sanction. Compare this with the United States' "no knock" attack on the sanctity of the home and it is readily seen just how revolutionary this new group of laws is!

Darrel O. Lunda, writing in *This World*, September 13, 1970, tells us that although Colombia is a poor country, much more personal freedom is enjoyed there than in the United States. And that there truly exists a difference between personal and political freedom. He explains that, "In Colombia the police don't drill peep holes in toilets. Police women don't play prostitute to trap a lonely man. Nobody's party is raided because somebody happens to be twenty and not twenty-one." He adds that "it might be hard for many women's club members (United States) to understand that here (Colombia) what a person does in a private place is his own business."

Mr. Lunda describes the Latin American as being "intellectual, sensual, and above all, realistic." He quotes a saying that applies directly to Colombia's new position on the drug problem: "La prohibición es causa del apetito." Prohibition causes the appetite.

The lesson in the foregoing quotation should have been well learned from the great "Noble Experiment (*The Volstead Act*)," by the people of the United States. The persistent clamor for increased exorbitant sentences for the use and possession of narcotic drugs, however, clearly indicates that the people of the United States didn't learn a damn thing from that "Noble Experiment."

How To Be Drafted

The First Thing To Do

Notify your draft board that you are ready to go immediately and tell them you want to leave in the next draft call. They will probably turn you over to the local psychiatrist in your district.

Meeting With The Psychiatrist

Tell the psychiatrist that you are eager to get into uniform and your only hope is that as soon as you've finished basic training, they'll send you to Vietnam. If he asks you why you want to go, tell him you believe it's your patriotic duty to defend your flag and country. You want to protect your home, your mother, and the unborn millions of American children against the spectre of Godless Communism.

He will undoubtedly declare you 4-F on the grounds that anyone who is so eager to get into the Army is nuts.

You Have The Right To Appeal

Write to the head of the Selective Service in Washington, D.C., and give him the facts. Tell him your draft board has been scheming to prevent you from going into the Army. Imply that the psychiatrist who examined you had it in for you because you wanted to fight for your country.

Insist that the head of the Selective Service sign your orders himself, which will make it possible for you to go into the service immediately.

He will turn your letter over to the F.B.I. to see if there is any communism mixed up in your background.

When The FBI Comes To Visit You

You have a right to answer any questions the F.B.I. asks you. They may insist that you take the Fifth Amendment so you

can be listed as a security risk. But stand on your Constitutional grounds and reply to their questions. If they ask you why you want to be drafted, tell them you're sick and tired of reading about guys burning up their draft cards and pretending they're homosexuals just to get out of the service.

Show respect to the agents and say "Sir" to them. Tell them you have always admired the F.B.I. and ask them if you can get an autographed picture of J. Edgar Hoover. The more forthright you are, the more suspicious they'll get. When they discover you've never joined any left-wing organizations, they'll keep a close eye on you.

You Can Always Picket

When things look black, you can picket the Pentagon, demanding that Secretary Laird overrule your local draft board and draft you into the service. If


need be, lie down in front of a troop train taking draftees to camp and urge the troop commander to take you on board.






Like the smooth clean sands of Ethiopia.

And more of a man than before.



Privacy??

Privacy is one of the most common needs in life. After a long, hard, working day, a man goes to relax in the privacy of his home. Well, this was maybe five years ago. It's all over now with the new laws that have been passed in Washington, and so privacy is almost a past reality.

In the last five years, many changes have been brought about because of progress and crime. Progress is a substantial element in life, but today it's causing many problems in your private life.

With the invention of the credit card, not much information was obtained from a person in the beginning when applying for one. Anyone could obtain one as long as they were of age. But later, complications arose! Persons using credit cards or just credit would be late on payments and sometimes move from the area. Then crime would move in with persons applying for credit under different names and making off with the goods that would total over hundreds of dollars. Why did this happen? All because there was not enough information obtained from persons when applying for credit, such as where they worked, their income, and their past history as a citizen.

After years of companies suffering losses, and law enforcement agencies not having enough information to go on when trying to locate and arrest those involved, all U.S. business firms started to obtain more information on people applying for credit. The purpose was to separate the persons who were eligible, from the ones who were not. In today's present society, this process is a must, although many people are disturbed about it when applying for a credit card. So the firm either knows your background, or no credit.

T.R.W. Credit Data of Anaheim, California, is a computerized sub-division of T.R.W. Inc. This company's basic job is to keep up to date credit data on people across the United States. Their number of accounts on file, at this writing, is forty million.

Honeywell Inc. has recently signed a contract to develop a laser storage technique that would allow one 4,500 foot magnetic tape to record and instantaneously feed back the equivalent of twelve pages of information apiece on every single person in the U.S. With this, in a very short time, everyone's life history will be available at the flick of a button. So with

one bad instant of credit, you can be easily prevented from obtaining credit anywhere else in the United States. Even though you want to try to establish yourself again, you will be unable to! Is this really business privacy?

Your home life is also in danger of being invaded. Just in the past few month's, telephone companies across the nation have devised a computer that can record your voice waves each moment that you are on the phone. What's the reason behind it? The main purpose was to stop crank callers since there was an increase over the past few years of such calls. But what has this accomplished as far as securing our everyday privacy? Each moment that you are on the phone, your conversation could be taped by this computer.

Besides having this new device, wire tapping is also in use by the F.B.I. With the use of computer recording by telephone companies, wire-tapping, of course, will be used less.


The government cautiously approved telephone tap during W.W. II to keep track of spies, and saboteurs. By the late 50's, this system was used against corner bookmakers in the U.S.

When the 60's arrived, libertarians reacted with indignation to these secret taps, especially after it was known that J. Edgar Hoover had kept a steady ear on the late Martin Luther King Jr. Congress specified in 1968 that the Justice Department, F.B.I., and state and local police could use electronic surveillance only with a court order. But in July of this year, Attorney John Mitchell disclosed that his department in Washington has more than doubled the previous year's total of 33

court ordered taps, but this figure is next to meaningless.

The Federal government, moreover, reserves the right to tap a phone secretly in the interest of "national security", and nobody, not even Hoover, has any idea how many phones are bugged, but the fact remains that you are subject to being recorded by either wire-tapping, or the telephone computer. Is this protecting your privacy, even though it's in the best interest of national security?

Another invasion of privacy is the law that gives policemen the right to stop and search you on a city sidewalk. The purpose of this law is to cut-down on the trafficking of illegal drugs and the bearing of weapons without a legal permit. In city's such as New York, San Francisco, Los Angeles, Chicago, and Washington this law is very useful although to a lot of people the involvement of being stopped in front of friends because of suspicion is very embarrassing. If misused, this law can be very harrassing and very imposing on the privacy of American citizens.

Over the past ten years, the U.S. has become one of the shadiest and most data-conscious nations in the history of the world. So with merchants, banks, employers, public utilities, motor vehicle bureaus, census takers, pollsters, armed forces and police agencies your whole life of privacy is being slowly torn apart, put into computers, files and tapes. In other words you are being informationally raped.

So in the world crisis of today, individual Americans have begun to surrender both the sense and the reality of their own right to privacy.....and their reaction to their loss has been slow and piecemeal. Will you just sit back and think about your invaded privacy or take a stand to have legislations and bills passed to prevent the further rape of your privacy, both on the streets and home?




Although you have probably heard it on the radio time and time again, the staff would like to say a little about the death of a modern day music hero and a modern day music heroine.
