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
Subj: Restriction of liberty; policy and regulations concerning

restriction orders are received and the receipt of written restriction orders is delayed, the master should post his own letter at the gangway informing the crew of oral orders and stating that written restriction orders will be posted upon receipt. Records concerning restriction of liberty should be maintained for use in the event that crew members file pay claims for confinement to ship.

d. CMPI 630.6-6 states in part that masters will make every reasonable effort to provide launch service for marine personnel when the ship is to be anchored or moored for a period of more than 12 hours. However, launch service will be provided only when the trip to or from shore may be made safely. Employees will not be entitled to premium pay for restriction of liberty if provision of launch service is delayed or precluded by factors beyond the control of the ship's officers. In port where regular boat service is not available, members of the crew may make their own arrangements for transportation. In such case, personnel will be reimbursed up to \$2.00 per round trip per man carried once each 24 hours.

e. In addition to the jurisdiction of the Government of Vietnam over marine employees, the U. S. Forces Police have authority to apprehend and temporarily retain U. S. marine employees when necessary for the protection of human life or U. S. property, or when the individual's public conduct reflects unfavorably on the prestige and image of the United States. In such cases, marine employees may be detained until they can be turned over to the custody of the ship's master, a ship's officer or the MSTs Representative. Either U. S. military or Vietnamese detention facilities may be used to detain seamen.

f. All civilian marine employees will be apprised of the authority of the U. S. Forces Police in exercising jurisdiction over them as outlined in paragraph e. above and will be instructed to identify themselves properly with their identification cards upon the request of the Vietnamese Police and/or U. S. Forces Police.
