# 199th LIB HISTORY PROJECT

To those of you who are new to the Redcatcher association or are at your first reunion. I would like to welcome you and tell you a little about what this is. We (Bob Stanard and Larry McDougal) started working on the 199th history project about nine years ago at the start we thought it would take five or six years to complete but it is taking a lot longer. We are about halfway, we think.

We hope to be able to track the 199th LIB from our first day to our last day in Vietnam. We would like to be able to tell you where your were, what you were doing, what the weather was for each day of each year the Brigade was there, if we can, only time will tell.

We have maps of our area of operation and know most of the names of our base camps and their locations. We have records from Nov. 66 to Oct. 68 on a daily basis. We have quarterly reports for most of the whole time that the unit was there. Not all of the records have been easy to find or get. Some records are not complete and some we can't have at this time because they are still classified.

This handout contains some of our history on a month by month basis to try to give you an idea of what we want to be able to do when we are done. The biggest part of this is the 753 names that we know of at this time that is our casualties using Department of Defense data. While in most cases the date of casualty reflects the exact date on which the service members' life was lost; this is not true in all cases. Some of those listed lost their lives days, weeks and in a few cases years after the casualty date as a direct result of wounds incurred on that date.

## 199th LIB Activation & Training

The 199th Infantry Brigade (Separate) (Light) was ordered formed at Ft. Benning, Ga. The Brigade's First Commander, Colonel George D. Rehkopf, got orders April 8, 1966 to form the Brigade.

Speed was to be emphasized in organization and training if the 199th was to make its target date to be in South Vietnam by December.

Formally activated June 1, 1966 the Brigade observed its first organization day with a formal review June 24, 1966 at Ft. Benning. In the ranks, the men had all completed basic training and were MOS-qualified. June 27 small unit training began at Ft. Benning to be followed by eight weeks of field training at the National Guard site at Camp Shelby Mississippi.

Following intensive preparations, the advance party left in November. After a final review, the majority of the Brigade was flown to Oakland California, where they boarded the USS Sultan and USS Pope for the more than two-week trip across the Pacific Ocean to South Vietnam.

## November 1966

On November 26, 1966 Brigadier General Charles W. Ryder assumed command from Colonel George D. Rehkopf who had commanded from April 26, 1966.

On November 28, 1966 a 280-man advance party of the 199th Brigade arrived at the site of what was to become their Main Base camp. The 1st Infantry Division was on hand to help secure their position, the site had been cleared of foliage, leveled, and prepared for occupation. Redcatchers immediately began erecting tents to serve as quarters. A late monsoon rain greeted the advance party on the night of its arrival, and many tent pegs gave way as rain turned the camp into a series of big lakes.

The perimeter had to be built. It was not as large in the beginning, every thing West of the NCO Club and North of the "Old Guard" area was outside the wire until later in 1967.

## December 1966

December 10, 1966 the USS Sultan docked at Vung Tau, on December 12, 1966 the USS Pope docked.

The advance party managed to have some tents up by the time the rest of the Brigade arrived. General Ryder ordered three feet of sandbags surrounding all structures in the camp. The following day enlisted men, NCO'S, and officers alike worked until midnight filling sand bags around each tent.

Six days after landing a mild operation, Uniontown was begun to secure defenses of the Long Binh complex perimeter. The Brigade was officially operational, even in VC eyes, by the end of December the 2/40 Artillery had its guns unlimbered and were able to support the Brigade with 105's.

## January 1967






Operation "Fairfax / Rang Dong" began on January 12, and it lasted for 11 months. Operation "Fairfax" is a joint operation in which ARVN forces and U.S. forces are intermixed to form a combined force team. The 2/3 Inf. and the ARVN 2nd Marine Battalion are working together, the 3/7 Inf. and the ARVN 33rd Ranger's, and 4/12 Inf. with the ARVN 30th Ranger Battalion. Whenever a U.S. unit goes to the field on an operation a ARVN force of similar size goes with it.

January 18, first Redcatcher dies from hostile fire.

January 21, Pfc. Frenzell and Sp4 Jones killed in action.

## February 1967














Operation Fairfax, operations were conducted by the Brigade as follows 2/3 Inf. In Nha Be, 3/7 Inf. in Binh Chanh, 4/12 Inf. in Thu Duc, and D17 Cav. continued to secure the Brigade forward CP at Cat Lai and operations in Long Than Districts of Gia Dinh province.

The Brigade units participated in a total of 32 airmobile assaults, 2 eagle flights, 24 river operations, 20 cordon and search operations, and 1168 night ambushes in February. The 2/40 Arty. fired 18,112 rounds in support of Brigade operations.

The Brigade continued in Fairfax joint operations in which U.S. and ARVN forces are intermixed to form a combined forces team.

From 1 through 7 February the 2/3 Inf. maintained a company sized force in the Rung Sat special zone.

## March 1967

Brigadier General John F. Freund assumed command March 1, 1967. On March 1, the Brigade was placed under opcon to the 9th Infantry Division in operation Enterprise in Long An province, which borders Gia Dina to the south. The 49th Scout Dog platoon with 36 dogs was added to the Brigade.

Operation Hattiesburg, 27 March the 2/3th Inf. 199th and the 3/39th of the 9th Inf. Division conducted joint multiple airmobile assaults. Ambushes were placed the previous night by D-17 Cav. 199th and 3/39 Inf. 9th Div. To seal area of operations, the 199th Inf. Brigade controlled this operation.












Under operation Fairfax in March the 199th participated in 18 airmobile assaults, 14 river operations, 9 cordon and search operations, and 1172 night ambushes.

Under operation Enterprise the 199th had 1 airmobile assault, 5 river operations, and 116 night ambushes.

During the month of March the 2/40th Arty fired 17,993 rounds in support of Brigade operations.

## April 1967






Operation Cussetta was conducted in the Hoc Mon district of Gia Dinh Province between 4-7 April by 4/12 Inf., 3/7 Inf., D-17 Cav., 2/40 Arty., and 30th and 33rd ARVN Rangers as a part of the Fairfax mission.

During April, Brigade units participated in 10 airmobile, 11 riverine, 13 cordon and search, and 1,523-night ambush operations as part of Fairfax. The 2/40th Arty. fired 17,076 rounds in support of Brigade operations.

D-17 Cav. continued to secure the Brigade forwards CP at Cat Lai and conducted offensive combat operations along the Dong Nai River.

# May 1967

May 1, Brigade was released from the operational control of the 9th Inf. Div. Operation Enterprise ends.

On the night of May 14, VC forces overran the Command post of the 2/50th ARVN Regiment. Companies B and E of the 3/7 Inf. and the 3rd and 4th Companies of the 33rd ARVN Rangers conducted an airmobile assault to retake the compound.

The Brigade participated in 23 cordoned and search, 235 search and destroy, and 1,898 night ambushes. The 2/40 Arty. fired 22,885 rounds in support of operations.

## June 1967








On June 15, the ARVN 38th Ranger replaced the 2nd ARVN Marine Bn. working with 2/3 Inf.

On June 19, 2/3 Inf. and the 38th ARVN Ranger Bn. conducted airmobile assaults into Long An Province in support of the 9th Division's operation Concordia. On 20 June E 3/7 Inf. and 3/33 ARVN Ranger were inserted to increase pressure on enemy forces. All units extracted on the 22 June.

In June the Brigade participated in 26 cordoned and search, 232 search and destroy, and 2015 night ambushes. The 2/40th Arty. fired 19,061 rounds in support of Brigade.

## July 1967

A Brigade training team was organized on July 5, for the purpose of providing training to regional and popular forces located in Gia Dinh Province.

The Brigade continued, in operation Fairfax with 35 cordon and search, 255 search and destroy, and 2,405 night ambushes. Brigade units established 142 road and 134 water checkpoints in an effort to restrict VC movement during daylight hours. The 2/40th Arty. fired 25,602 rounds in support of operations.

## August 1967

August 7, Company E 4/12 Inf. and 4th Ranger Company 30th ARVN Rangers, conducted an airmobile assault operation in the Nhi Binh area of the Hoc Mon District. Element were hit by an estimated VC company on the LZ. Brigadier General Freund, was wounded when he attempted to rescue troops with his helicopter during the action that saw five helicopters shot down. The Brigade ready reaction force was airlifted in to reinforce the operation. The results of the operation were 22 VC KIA, 9 VC WIA during this engagement.

In August the Brigade continued participation in operation Fairfax by conducting 20 cordon and search, 273 search and destroy, and 2,346 night ambush's. The 2/40 Arty. fired 29,890 rounds in support of Brigade operations.

Operation Fairfax, integrated operations with the 5th ARVN Ranger, continued until 24, Sept. Since that date, U.S. and ARVN operated separately to develop 5th ARVN Ranger capability for the eventual assumption of the entire Fairfax mission.




September 18, brigade main base named Camp Frenzell-Jones.

On 26 September, the 11th combat tracker team, attached to the Brigade, became operational.

During the month Brigade units participated in 3 cordon and search, 254 search and destroy, and 2,151 night ambushes. The 2/40 fired 24,235 rounds in support of the Brigade operations.

On 9 October C 3/7 Inf. conducted an airmobile operation in Long An Province and found a VC base area with a well developed grenade factory.

12 October 3/7 Inf. CP at Binh Chanh received 53 rounds of mortar fire, fifteen rounds landed within the perimeter, no friendly casualties.

The Brigade continued in operation Fairfax with 5 cordon and search, 276 search and destroy and 1,641 night ambushes. The 2/40 Arty. fired 27,046 rounds in support of Brigade operations.

# November 1967

Primary concern during November was the readying of the 5th ARVN Ranger group to assume the Fairfax Mission. Enemy contacts during the month were few.

On 26 November 2/3 Inf. conducted an airmobile assault employing two companies. While conducting a search and sweep operation three ammunition and equipment caches were located.

During November the Brigade prepared for final phase out of operation Fairfax. 4/12 Inf. completed its phase out on 9 November and moved on 15 November to assume a new mission under Opcon 9th Inf. Div. The 3/7 Inf. terminated operation Fairfax on 29 November.

## December 1967

December 4, 3/7 Inf. deployed to FSPB Concord the 4/12 Inf. moved from Concord to FSPB Nashua. For operation Uniontown/Strike, this operation covered the period 1-17 December. On 18 December operations Uniontown and Manchester begun with the mission to prevent rocket and mortar attacks on the Long Binh-Bien Hoa complex and to destroy the Dong Nai Regiment.

December 6, A 4/12 Inf. with help from 3/7 Inf. and D-17 Cav. were in the bloodiest and bitterest battle to date. The 4/12 Inf. at FSPB Nashua received mortar fire. Based on back Azimuth of mortar direction of fire 4/12 Inf. conducted a search and destroy operation to the Southeast of Nashua. At 1445 hrs. 4/12 Inf. made contact with an estimated VC/NVA Battalion.

14 December 2/3 Inf. terminated operations in Gia Dinh Province ending operation Fairfax.











18 December 2/3 Inf. deployed in Uniontown AO.

25 December, an outbreak of food poisoning occurred in B 3/7 Inf. all 63 personnel were returned to duty within two days.

A total of 2,500 XM16E1 rifles have been exchanged for the M16A1 rifle to date.

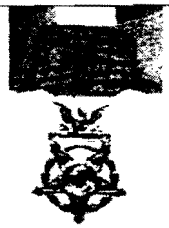

## January 1968

January 12, operation Manchester was terminated.






January 13, 199th Infantry Battalions were redeployed as follows, 2/3 Inf. in AO Columbus, 3/7 Inf. in AO Haverfore, and 4/12 Inf. in AO Uniontown.

January 23, on a search and sweep operation by 3/7 Inf. found two 57mm recoilless rifles with 29 rounds of ammunition.

January 31, 0100 hours the 71st Infantry reconnaissance spotted VC running towards Long Binh. The attack came at 0300 hours, the TET offensive was on, by 0400 hours C 4/12 Inf. and D-17 Cav. had run into a VC battalion north of Ho Nai. The 2/3 Inf. and 4/12 Inf. countered the VC offensive in Bien Hoa province. The 3/7 Inf. with help from D-17 Cav. went to Saigon and the Phu Tho racetrack. Heavy fighting continued during the daylight and sporadic fighting throughout the night.

## February 1968

On February 1, the 199th Inf. Bde. was in heavy contact conducting counter-offensive in the Uniontown and Haverford AO's and elements of 3/7 Inf. were in direct support of Capitol Military District (CMD) in the city of Saigon.

February 2, Uniontown I terminated began Uniontown II opcon to the 101st Abn Div. Uniontown II opcon to the 101st Abn. Div. terminated February 7.

Uniontown III February 7, began.

February 18, 2/3 Inf. opcon to the 9th Inf. Div. for operation Enterprise.

February 18, FSPB Anderson attacked. This attack consisted of a heavy mortar and RPG fire followed by a company size ground attack.

February 21, B 3/7 Inf. opcon to MACV Hqs for defense of Thon Son Nhut Airbase.

Since the Tet Offensive the VC/NVA use of 122mm rockets has increased considerably and a new rocket of Chicom manufacture a 106mm was introduced in the III Corps area.

The elements of the enemies abortive attempt of overrunning Long Binh-Bien Hoa complexes, prisoners revealed that, a great number of enemy officers and NCO's were killed which left most of the enemy soldiers leaderless and confused since they made no plans for withdrawal. Several wounded VC and NVA soldiers were found who testified that they were left behind and did not know where to go.

## March 1968

The Brigade has had several missions at times participating in three operations simultaneously. Thus, the concept of using the 199th Inf. Bde. as a "fire" Brigade reaction force for II field forces, Vietnam has been realized.

Chemical type ammunition was discovered in several VC caches and the use of Soviet flame-throwers K-50 and Chicon AT-64's were confirmed in the area. Enemy use of antiaircraft weapons has also increased considerably.

## May 1968

May 5, the Brigade was assigned the new mission of conducting Reconnaissance in Force operations and prevent enemy attacks on Saigon from AO Westchester located to the West and Southwest of Saigon.

Intelligence reports that the main objective of the VC offensive would again be Saigon. The time frame for the offensive was estimated to be between 5 and 10 of May. Large caches have been discovered a short distances from Saigon.

The second VC offensive commenced on May 5 at 0500 hours. On May 6 elements of the 4/12 Inf. contacted a battalion size force. Two more VC battalions were engaged along the same route on the same night and the following night.

From May 5 to May 14 there were many heavy contacts with large VC elements.

May 7 2/3 Inf. released from opcon 9th Inf. Div. operation Enterprise.

May 10, Brigadier General Franklin M. Davis, Jr. assumed command of Brigade.

May 13 2/3 Inf. in contact in the vicinity of Dong Phu Village.

May 14 the 6th local VC force battalion attacked A 2/3 Inf. and C 2/3 Inf. at the Binh Dien Bridge. This was the only enemy initiated incident in the AO.

From May 15 to May 22 scattered contacts with the enemy indicated that they were fleeing to the West, withdrawing to their Cambodia sanctuaries.

May 22 Brigade moved back to the area North and Northeast of Long Binh-Bien Hoa.

May 31 Toan Thang I terminated.

June 20, move to the Pineapple Plantation under operation "Toan Thang II".









June 22, all Brigade elements began to conduct aggressive and extensive operations on all likely avenues leading into our AO.

July 13, information was received that the 9th VC Division was moving through Cambodia North. This fact and the lack of contact indicate that the pressure on Saigon has decreased somewhat for now.



Sept. 1, Colonel Frederic E. Davison assumed command of Brigade.







Sept. 15 Colonel Davison was promoted to the rank of Brigadier General.

During September, the Brigade carried out extensive operations. The VC showed a reluctance to engage and when they did engage they broke contact despite aggressive pursuit by Brigade forces. The operations resulted in the capture of large quantities of enemy supplies, hampering the enemy's efforts to regroup.

## October 1968

Enemy actions remained the same as September. The Brigade initiated a series of four task force operations to force the VC out of hiding.

In mid October the 199th employed a new tactic termed "IMEX" (implosion/explosion). This concept permits large groups of forces to be used in cordon and search operations. The operation is conducted by employing a cordon well out from the area of prime concern. The search force is inserted by air inside the ring. Once the search force is inserted the outer ring sweeps in toward the center to a well defined "no fire line". When the no fire line has been reached, the search force begins pushing outward.

October 25, intelligence indicated that the enemy main force units had withdrawn into their rear base and staging areas in Cambodia.

## November 1968

November 7, troops from 5/12 Inf. found two 250-pound bombs set up as booby traps. The bombs were destroyed, as were three sampans they found.

November 9, D 2/3 Inf. destroyed eight bunkers and captured one bag of medical supplies, four Chicom grenades, one M-79, and fuse wire. B and D Company's 3/7 Inf. destroyed 26 bunkers that had iron reinforcing bar.

November 13, A 3/7 Inf. destroyed 7 bunkers and found two 9MM pistols, enemy supplies, and documents.

November 14, A 5/12 Inf. found a cache of B-40 rocket rounds, medical supplies, and documents 3 miles Southeast of Duc Hoa.

November 16, Redcatchers from 5/12 Inf. destroyed 27 bunkers, 1 sampan, and 21 bobby traps operating in the western portion of the pineapple.

December 2, 2/3 Inf. found three caches South of Duc Hoa. Totaling 125 B-40 rounds, 28 B-41 rounds, 5 AK-47 rifles, 4 boxes AK-47 ammunition, 8 grenades, and 1 box fuses. They also destroyed 32 bunkers.

December 4, 3/7 Inf. found stocks of medical supplies, food, enemy clothing, and cooking utensils 3 miles Southwest of Duc Hoa.

December 6, 4/12 Inf. destroyed 69 bunkers and found 24 grenades, 300 rounds small arms ammo, and cooking and field equipment East of Saigon.

December 21, elements of 2/3 Inf. found a arms cache of 31 RPG-7 rounds, 11 AK-47 rifles, 11 120mm mortar rounds, 32 Chicom grenades, 1 30-pound Chicom claymore mine, 3-82MM mortar rounds, 1 82MM mortar, and a fifty-five gallon drum of oil.









December 23, 3/7 Inf. found a cache of 130 mixed RPG rounds, 150 60MM mortar rounds, 12 75MM recoilless rifle rounds 1000 grenade detonators, and 25 lbs. TNT.

## February 1969

High-ranking VC began to rally on February 18, the security commander of SR-2 rallied at Binh Chanh.











Two major combined cordon and search operations were conducted in February, Strangler I in Hung Long and Strangler II in Tan Nhut.

On the night of 22-23 February the anticipate offensive began with 107mm rockets, mortar, and ground attacks against Bian Hoa, Long Binh Post, Bear Cat, and Camp Frenzell-Jones. The contacts resulted in very heavy losses for the VC.

On the morning of February 26, a VC company entered Loc Lam Hamlet Ho Nai Village at 0500 hours moving toward Camp Frenzell-Jones. Villagers spotted the VC and attacked, the remainder of the VC Company was engaged by the 199th Inf. After this aborted offensive the enemy units retreated back into their sanctuaries.

## March 1969

On March 10, LTC. Nam Xuam, Chief of staff of the SR-2 forward HQ. was killed by C 5/12 Inf. The death of Nam Xuam was a sever blow to the VC because he had lived and operated in the pineapple for ten years and possessed extensive area knowledge. Captured documents revealed that Nam Xuam was preparing for an attack on the 199th Brigade's forward command post at the time of his death.

March 12-14 Operation Lulu, the operation was a combined independent area search operation with elements of the 199th Inf., 9th U.S. Inf. Div., 5th ARVN Ranger Group, and the 46th ARVN Regiment participating in the Long Thuong area. Operation Lulu concluded with a cordon and search of Long Thoi and Loc Trung.















On March 17, 4/12 Inf. conducted a cordon and search of Dai Thanh.

On March 20, 3/7th Inf. and D-17 Cav. conducted cordon and search of Binh Tri Dong # 1.

March 26-28, Operation Hunter, 5/12 Inf. and 2/3 Inf. conducted airmobile assault and reconnaissance in force astride the Bo Bo canal.



Operation Strangler III ends on May 5.

May 11-16, Operation Caesar I, a cordon and search in Hung Long.

May 17-22, Operation Caesar II, a cordon and search in Ben Luc (Eagle's Beak).









The Brigade elements not committed to Operation Caesar II and I continued to reconnaissance in force, patrolling, area searches, and night ambush operations.

The Brigade combined with ARVN units launched a series of cordon operations Southwest of Saigon aimed at breaking the VC. The operations began in February and ended this month. A total of 249 Viet Cong and VC supporters were eliminated as 41 draft dodgers and 7 ARVN deserters were caught. Numerous weapons and munitions caches were found. U.S. losses were light in the operations each of which lasted from a few days to a week.



## July 1969

On July 3, D 2/3 Inf. while moving to a pick-up zone received fire from a heavily defended VC base camp, hunter/kill teams, artillery, and air strikes supported while C 2/3 Inf. reinforced, the contact. Most likely the MR-VII VC Headquarters element withdrew while at least two VC Companies held off the U.S. force. In late July the 33rd VC Regiment and MR VII Headquarters withdrew to the Northeast.

On July 12 a 199th Brigade helicopter was shot down by RPG fire South of FSPB. Libby.

During the period 17-19 July C 4/12 Inf., operating Northwest of Bina Quan, discovered several large caches containing a total of 33,700 lb. of beans, 14,900 lb. of salt, 9,700 lb. of sugar, 5,800 lb. of peanuts, 250 lb. rice, 6 bicycles, and 6 fifty-five gallon drum's of gasoline.

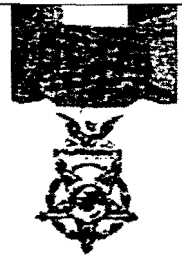

## September 1969








## January 1970

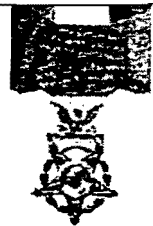

# April 1970

April 1, General Bond killed in action, command assumed by Colonel Robert W. Selton.

An estimated reinforced company engaged D-17 Cav., while escorting a convoy South of Xo Xu on April 1. Five U.S. were killed, sixteen wounded and two Sheridans and one APC were destroyed.

On April 6, Southwest of FSPB Den, B 4/12 Inf. found a cache of 400lbs. of food.

On April 15, North of FSPB Den, A 4/12 Inf. found 5 tons of rice. On April 16, A 5/12 Inf. found a cache of 7 1/2 tons of rice in the same vicinity.

On April 18, FSPB Den was attacked by an estimated two companies and a sapper company. Elements of 4/12 Inf. and 2/40 Artillery were at the base.

April 26, North of FSPB Mat, D 3/7 Inf. found a cache containing 500lbs. of flour and 19-100yd. Rolls of electrical wire.

On April 30, Southeast of FSPB Sun, D 4/12 Inf. was in a contact lasting all day.

On April 30, President Nixon announced that U.S. troops were going into Cambodia.

## May 1970

On May 5, 5/12 Inf. went Opcon to the 1st Cavalry Division.

2/3 Infantry conducted operations in Southeastern Long Khanh and Western Binh Tuy Province. One company operated in Nhon Truch vicinity. 3/7 Infantry operated in Central and Southern Binh Tuy Province. 4/12 Infantry conducted operations in Northeastern Long Khanh and Northern Binh Tuy Province.

On May 12, the 5/12 Inf. crossed the Cambodian border and set up at land zone Brown. Six hours later the 5/12 Inf. was attacked. When the attack ended Bravo and Charlie Companies had killed 50 NVA Regulars. In the next month the warriors were busy finding numerous caches including nine jeeps, 1133 60MM-mortar rounds, 279,000 AK-47's and several crew-served weapons.

On May 18, C 3/17 Inf. engaged 5 enemy East of FSPB Sun, 1-82MM mortar, 2 sewing machines and 2 individual weapons were captured.

May 23, North of Xo Xu, Ren- 4/12 Inf. found a cache consisting of 6 light machine guns, 1-51cal. machine gun, 22-AK-47s, 11-60MM mortar tubes, 10 mortar sights and 2-51cal. Barrels.

On May 28, 4 NVA companies attacked FSPB Sun, with RPG, mortar, 51cal machine gun and small arms fire. The attack lasted on and off for approximately 5 hours. The MACV compound in Tan Linn, just to the North, received 82MM mortar fire at the same time.

On June 8, Tanh Linh and elements of A 3/7 Inf. received mortar and RPG fire; contact lasted for 4 hours.







On June 25, 5/12 Infantry returned from being Opcon to the 1st Cavalry Division and stood down at Long Binh for re-fitting.

On July 5, Northwest of FSPB Strike, B 2/3 Inf. found a cache of 20 cans of milk, 200 flashlight batteries, 50lbs. of tobacco, and 20lbs. of sugar.

On July 7, Northeast of FSPB Guin, C 3/7 Inf. found one ton of rice.

On July 10, East of FSPB Rita, C 2/3 Inf. found a cache consisting of 3 weapons, 1 box blasting caps, 20 books, 40 bottles of distilled water and 23 vials of penicillin.

## September 1970

On 1 September operation Keystone Robin began the Brigade disengaging from combat operations. Segment one stand-down of 5/12 Inf., 49th Inf. Plt., 503 Chem. Det., 76 Inf. Det., and 2/40th D Btry on 1 September. Segment two, 3/7 Inf., 75 Inf. Co. M and 2/40th B Btry on 9 September. The 87 Engr. Co on 12 Sept., 179 MI Det. 15 Sept. Segment three, 2/3 Inf., 4/12 Inf., D Trp. 17 Cav. and 2/40th C Btry 15 Sept., 052 MP Plt. 24 Sept., 2/40th A Btry, 2/40th HHB and 313th Sig Co. 25 Sept.

The 2nd Battalion, 40th Artillery commemorated the firing of the Brigade's last round in Vietnam on September 15, during a ceremony held at fire support base Silver 70 miles Northeast of Saigon. The 105MM Howitzer round fired by the 199th Infantry Brigade Commanding Officer, Colonel Joseph E. Collins, was the 1,100,452 round fired by the Artillery unit since beginning operations in Gia Dinh and Bien Hoa Provinces. Having begun operations in December 1966, the final round marked 3 years and 10 months of Vietnam service for the 199th Light Infantry Brigade.

On 23 September the honor guard organized at Camp Frenzell-Jones, included 11 officers, 1 Warrant Officer, 1 Command Sergeant Major and 80 enlisted personnel.

## IN COUNTRY AND ON LINE

It rained on the advance party when they arrived and it rained on the Honor Guard when they left. From November 28, 1966 with the arrival of the advance party to the departure of the Honor Guard on October 11, 1970 the 199th LIB served in South Vietnam. Making it four years the unit was there, in those four years we did many things, in all types of weather, from our first operation Uniontown in December 1966 to our last operation Keystone Robin in October of 1970.

Not all of our operations were search and destroy, cordon and search, ambushes, road checkpoints or river check points operations. Some operations were designed to help the villagers and the orphans. Like medcap, road building, building schools and distribution of food and supplies to the villagers.

Not all our casualties had combat arms MOS's either, they included Mechanics, Supplies Clerks, Finance Clerks, Clerk-Typist, Carpenters, Cooks, MP's, Medics and many other MOS's. In that four-year time period 39 Officers, 130 NCO's and 584 Enlisted Men of the 199th Light Infantry Brigade died.

The 199th LIB served with Valor and Honor, four Redcatcher's received the Medal of Honor, thirteen received the Distinguished Service Cross, and 753 lost their lives that we know of in that four year period of time the Brigade was in country and on line.

LITEKY, ANGELO J.

Rank and organization: Chaplain (Capt.), U.S. Army, Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 199th Infantry Brigade

Place and date: Near Phuoc-Lac, Bien Hoa Province, Republic of Vietnam, 6 December 1967

Entered service at: Fort Hamilton, New York

Born: 14 February 1931, Washington, D.C

Citation; Chaplain Liteky distinguished himself by exceptional heroism while serving with Company A, 4th Battalion, 12th Infantry, 199th Light Infantry Brigade. He was participating in a search and destroy operation when Company A came under intense fire from a battalion size enemy force. Momentarily stunned from the immediate encounter that ensued, the men hugged the ground for cover. Observing 2 wounded men, Chaplain Liteky moved to within 15 meters of an enemy machine gun position to reach them, placing himself between the enemy and the wounded men. When there was a brief respite in the fighting, he managed to drag them to the relative safety of the landing zone. Inspired by his courageous actions, the company rallied and began placing a heavy volume of fire upon the enemy's positions. In a magnificent display of courage and leadership, Chaplain Liteky began moving upright through the enemy fire, administering last rites to the dying and evacuating the wounded. Noticing another trapped and seriously wounded man, Chaplain Liteky crawled to his aid. Realizing that the wounded man was too heavy to carry, he rolled on his back, placed the man on his chest and through sheer determination and fortitude crawled back to the landing zone using his elbows and heels to push himself along. Pausing for breath momentarily, he returned to the action and came upon a man entangled in the dense, thorny underbrush. Once more intense enemy fire was directed at him, but Chaplain Liteky stood his ground and calmly broke the vines and carried the man to the landing zone for evacuation. On several occasions when the landing zone was under small arms and rocket fire, Chaplain Liteky stood up in the face of hostile fire and personally directed the medivac helicopters into and out of the perimeter, constantly encouraging and inspiring the men. Upon the unit's relief on the morning of 7 December 1967, it was discovered that despite painful wounds in the neck and foot, Chaplain Liteky had personally carried over 20 men to the landing zone for evacuation during the savage fighting. Through his indomitable inspiration and heroic actions, Chaplain Liteky saved the lives of a number of his comrades and enabled the company to repulse the enemy. Chaplain Liteky's actions reflect great credit upon himself and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the U.S. Army.

OLSON, KENNETH L \*

Rank and organization: Specialist Fourth Class, U.S. Army, Company A, 5th Battalion, 12th Infantry

Place and date: Republic of Vietnam, 13 May 1968

Entered service at: Minneapolis, Minnesota

Born: 26 May 1945, Willmar, Minnesota

Citation: For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty. Sp4c. Olson distinguished himself at the cost of his life while serving as a team leader with Company A. Sp4c. Olson was participating in a mission to reinforce a reconnaissance platoon which was heavily engaged with a well-entrenched Viet Cong force. When his platoon moved into the area of contact and had overrun the first line of enemy bunkers, Sp4c. Olson and a fellow soldier moved forward of the platoon to investigate another suspected line of bunkers. As the 2 men advanced they were pinned down by intense automatic weapons fire from an enemy position 10 meters to their front. With complete disregard for his safety, Sp4c. Olson exposed himself and hurled a hand grenade into the Viet Cong position. Failing to silence the hostile fire, he again exposed himself to the intense fire in preparation to assault the enemy position. As he prepared to hurl the grenade, he was wounded, causing him to drop the activated device within his own position. Realizing that it would explode immediately, Sp4c. Olson threw himself upon the grenade and pulled it in to his body to take the full force of the explosion. By this unselfish action Sp4c. Olson sacrificed his own life to save the lives of his fellow comrades-in-arms. His extraordinary heroism inspired his fellow soldiers to renew their efforts and totally defeat the enemy force. Sp4c. Olson's profound courage and intrepidity were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the U.S. Army.

FOLLAND, MICHAEL FLEMING \*

Rank and organization: Corporal, U.S. Army, Company D, 2d Battalion, 3d Infantry

Place and date: Long Khanh, Providence, Republic of Vietnam, 3 July 1969

Entered service at: Richmond, Virginia

Born: 15 April 1949, Richmond, Virginia

Citation: For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty. Cpl. Folland distinguished himself while serving as an ammunition bearer with the weapons platoon of Company D, during a reconnaissance patrol mission. As the patrol was moving through a dense jungle area, it was caught in an intense crossfire from heavily fortified and concealed enemy ambush positions. As the patrol reacted to neutralize the ambush, it became evident that the heavy weapons could not be used in the cramped fighting area. Cpl. Folland dropped his recoilless rifle ammunition, and ran forward to join his commander in an assault on the enemy bunkers. The assaulting force moved forward until it was pinned down directly in front of the heavily fortified bunkers by machine gun fire. Cpl Folland stood up to draw enemy fire on himself and to place suppressive fire on the enemy positions while his commander attempted to destroy the machine gun positions with grenades. Before the officer could throw a grenade, an enemy grenade landed in the position. Cpl. Folland alerted his comrades and his commander hurled the grenade from the position. When a second enemy grenade landed in the position, Cpl. Folland again shouted a warning to his fellow soldiers. Seeing that no one could reach the grenade and realizing that it was about to explode, Cpl Folland, with complete disregard for his safety, threw himself on the grenade. By his dauntless courage, Cpl. Folland saved the lives of his comrades although he was mortally wounded by the explosion. Cpl. Folland's extraordinary heroism, at the cost of his life, was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflects great credit upon himself, his unit, and the U.S. Army.

## *Medal of Honor*

PENRY, RICHARD A.

Rank and organization: Sergeant, U.S. Army, Company C, 4th Battalion, 12th Infantry

Place and date: Binh Tuy Province, Republic of Vietnam, 31 January 1970

Entered service at: Oakland, California

Born: 18 November 1948, Petaluma, California

Citation: For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty. Sgt. Penry, company C, distinguished himself while serving as a rifleman during a night ambush mission. As the platoon was preparing the ambush position, it suddenly came under an intense enemy attack from mortar, rocket, and automatic weapons fire which seriously wounded the company commander and most of the platoon members, leaving small isolated groups of wounded men throughout the area. Sgt. Penry, seeing the extreme seriousness of the situation, worked his way through the deadly enemy fire to the company command post where he administered first aid to the wounded company commander and other personnel. He then moved the command post to a position, which provided greater protection and visual communication and control of other platoon elements. Realizing the company radio was damaged and recognizing the urgent necessity to reestablish communications with the battalion headquarters, he ran outside the defensive perimeter through a fusillade of hostile fire to retrieve a radio. Finding it inoperable, Sgt. Penry returned through heavy fire to retrieve 2 more radios. Turning his attention to the defense of the area, he crawled to the edge of the perimeter, retrieved needed ammunition and weapons and resupplied the wounded men. During a determined assault by over 30 enemy soldiers, Sgt. Penry occupied the most vulnerable forward position placing heavy, accurate fire on the attacking enemy and exposing himself several times to throw hand grenades into the advancing enemy troops. He succeeded virtually single-handedly in stopping the attack. Learning that none of the radios were operable, Sgt. Penry again crawled outside the defensive perimeter, retrieved a fourth radio and established communications with higher headquarters. Sgt. Penry then continued to administer first aid to the wounded and repositioned them to better repel further enemy attacks. Despite continuous and deadly sniper fire, he again left the defensive perimeter, moved to within a few feet of enemy positions, located 5 isolated wounded soldiers, and led them to safety. When evacuation helicopters approached, Sgt. Penry voluntarily left the perimeter, set up a guiding beacon, established the priorities for evacuation and successively carried 18 wounded men to the extraction site. After all wounded personnel had been evacuated, Sgt. Penry joined another platoon and assisted in the pursuit of the enemy. Sgt. Penry's extraordinary heroism at the risk of his own life are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit on him, his unit, and the U.S. Army.

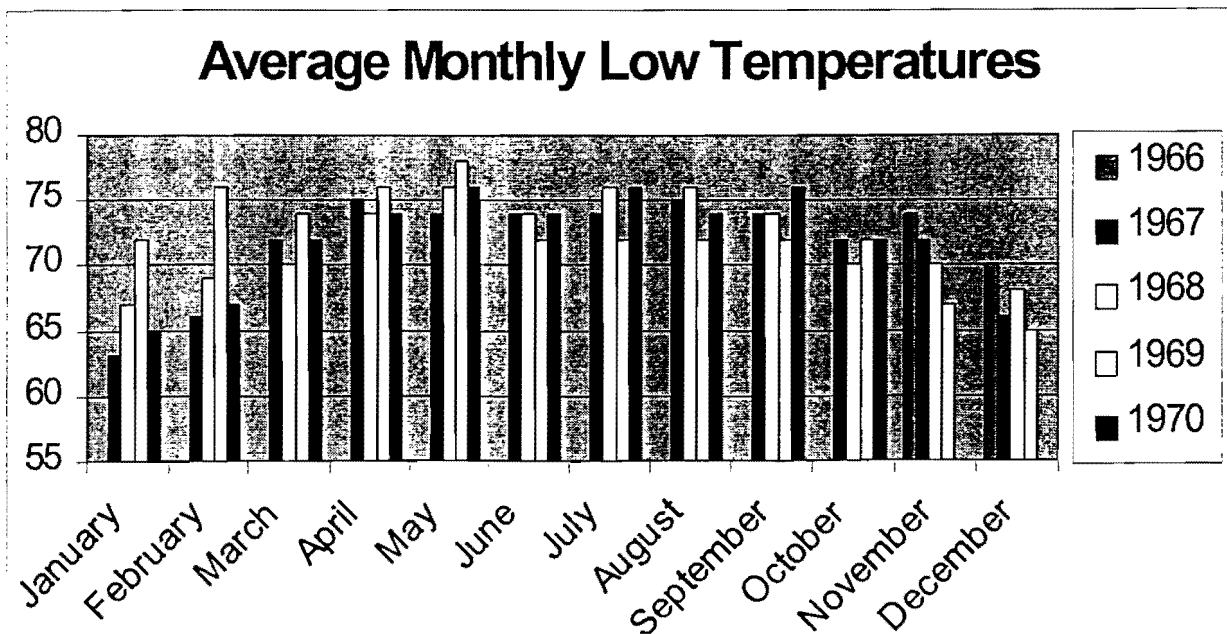
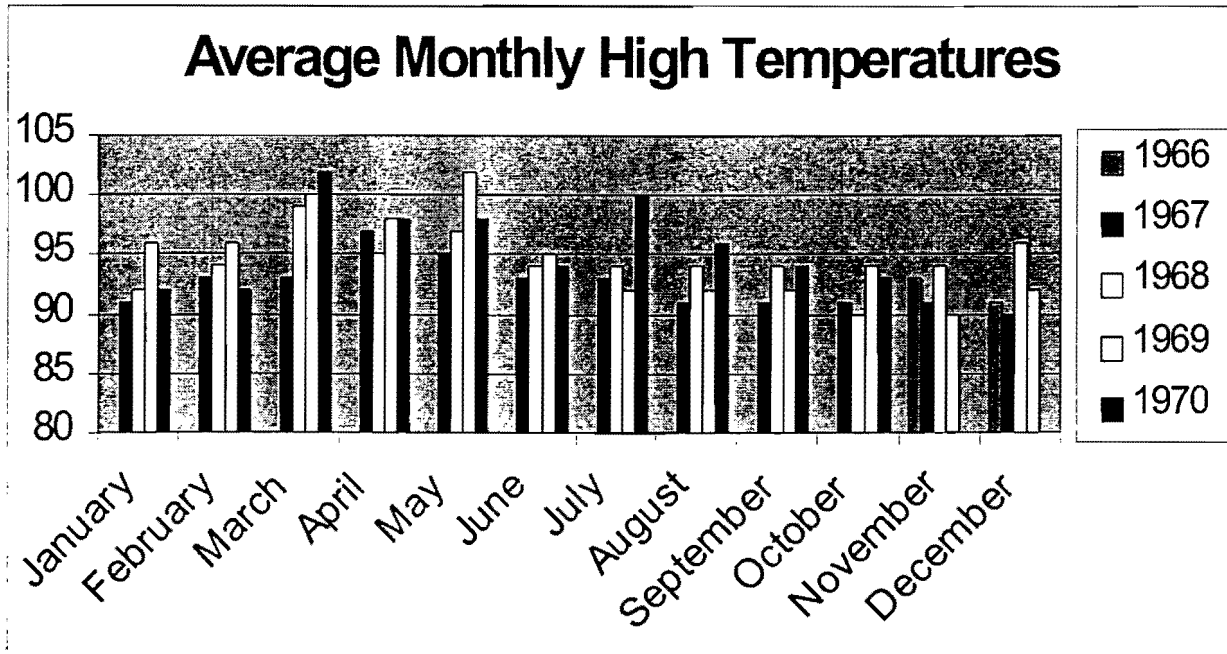

## Money in Vietnam

Military Payment Certificates, or MPC (better known as script or “funny money”) was issued to all U.S. troops upon arrival in Vietnam. We were prohibited from having or spending U.S. dollars, in the fear that doing so would place these dollars in the hands of the VC and NVA, as well as in the hands of the widespread black market. It was also an attempt to keep down inflation.

MPC was used on all U.S. bases as the official currency. In Post Exchanges, there was also a ration book required – limiting purchase of such things as liquor and cigarettes to what was determined to be that which could be consumed by one soldier. There was also rationing of the more expensive items such as stereo equipment and higher-priced cameras and watches. Of course, if someone had used up his monthly allocation, he simply got a friend who hadn't to make the purchase. From a grunt's perspective, the PX system was just a hassle.

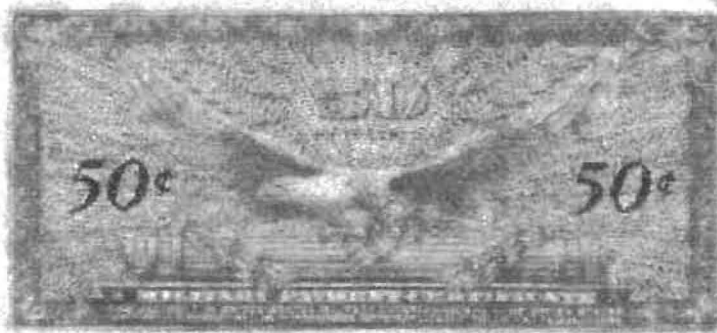
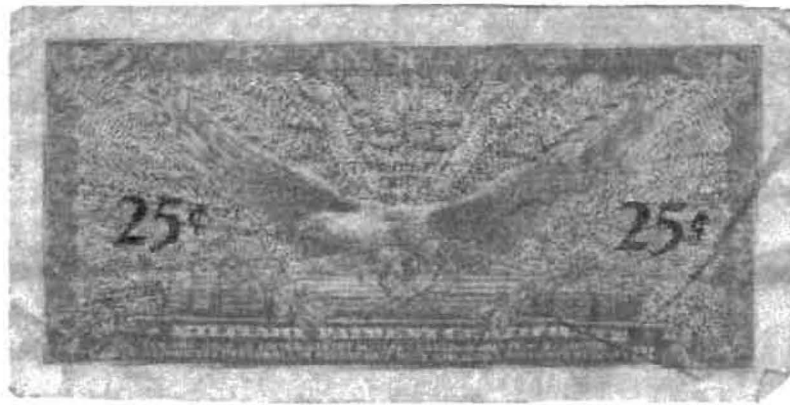
Periodically, there would be a total exchange of MPC from one version to another, with only a brief one or two day period in which to complete the procedure. Only a limited amount could be exchanged without special permission of the unit commander – also an attempt to keep down black marketing and gambling.

Supposedly, Vietnamese were discouraged from using MPC, and could not exchange it, but most field troops didn't have access to finance officers except maybe around payday (the end of each month) when one of the unit lieutenants or captains flew to each location and paid everyone. So MPC was usually treated just as the local currency.

A limited number of Vietnamese dollars, called Piasters, were authorized, and could be obtained at the official exchange rate of about 100 per MPC dollar – at least the going rate in the streets was that amount. If memory serves correctly, the official rate in 1967 was 117 to the MPC dollar, and in 1969 it was 97.

It was always humorous to watch the Vietnamese try to get Americans to exchange their MPC for them when a version switch took place. Rumor was that the “big players” had no problem, but the local merchant - who simply accepted MPC as the only way goods (pop, beer, french bread – and probably a good many other things which won't be mentioned) could be sold to the American field soldiers who had no piasters – could lose all his profits if he could not somehow get his MPC converted.





## Note:

The following list of Casualties (Killed in Action and Non-Battle Deaths only – we do not have names or numbers of all the wounded) has been compiled using Department of Defense data supplemented by Panel and Line Numbers locating where the names are located on the Vietnam Memorial (“The Wall”).

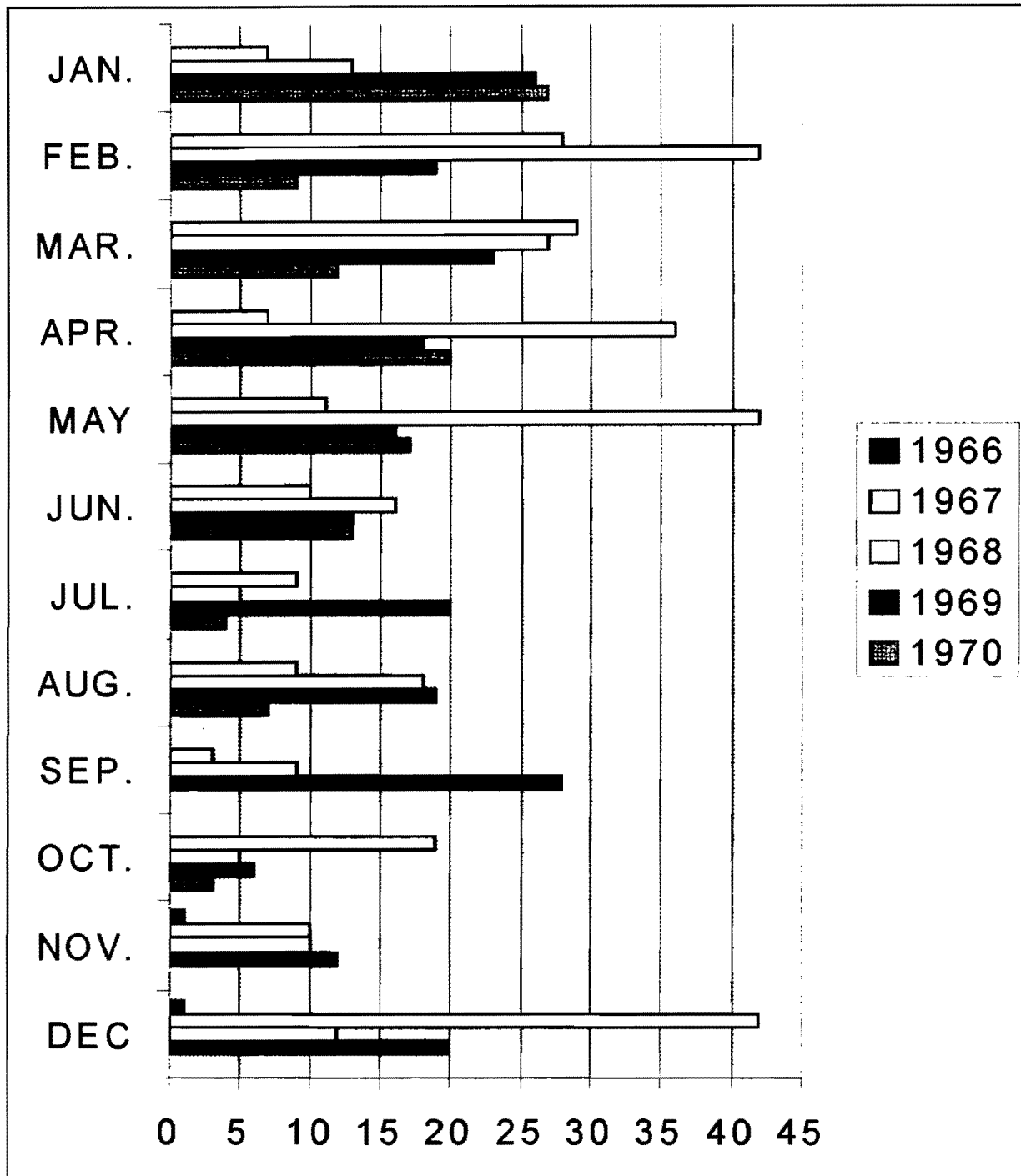
While in most cases the Date of Casualty reflects the exact date on which the service member’s life was lost, this is not true in all cases. Some of those listed lost their lives days, weeks and in few cases years after the casualty date as a direct result of wounds incurred on the given date. There is also at least one instance in which the Department of Defense appears to have entered the month and year as October of 1970, when reports are that the lives were lost in October of 1969.

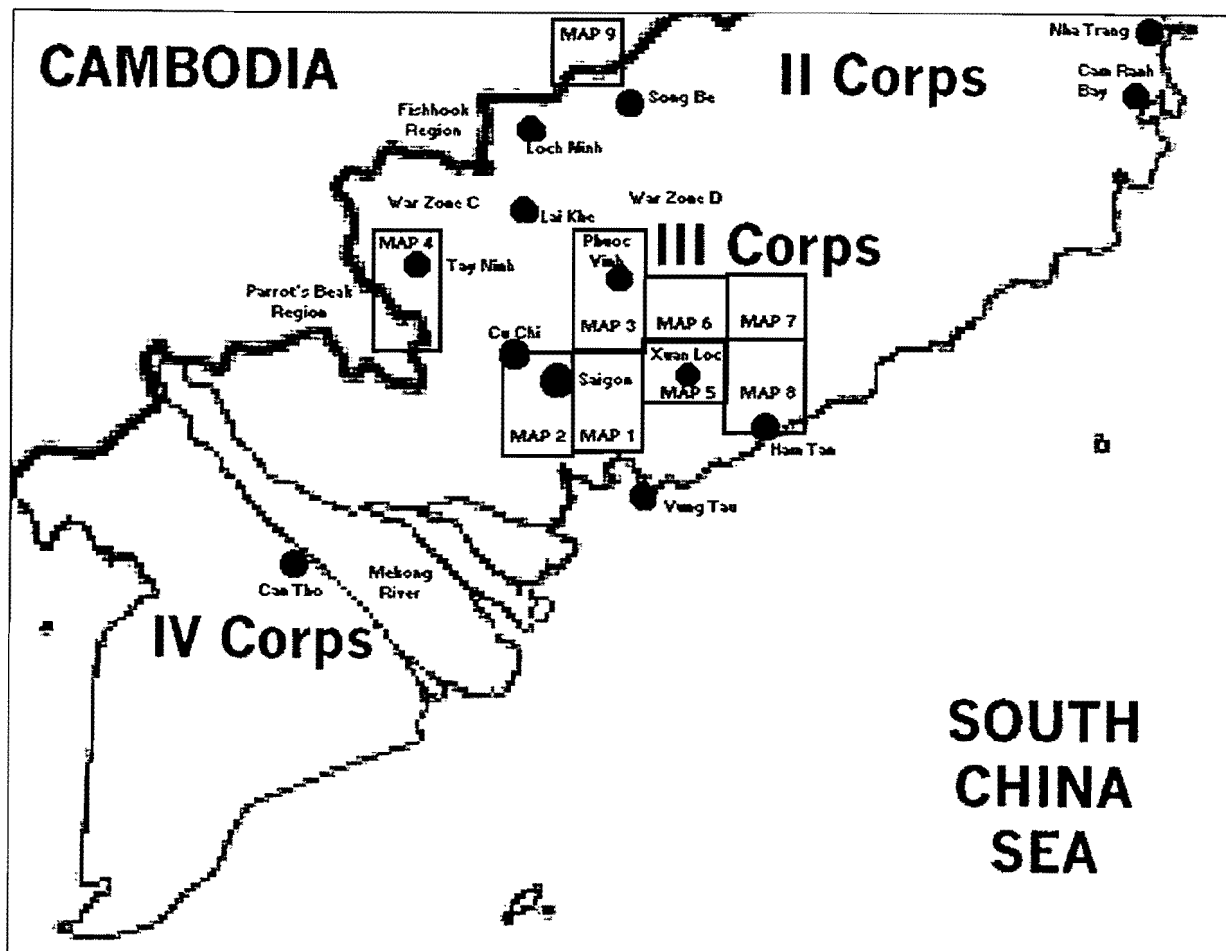

Above is a general overlay of the Brigade Areas of Operations in Vietnam. On the following pages are detailed maps of those areas showing specific base locations, accompanied by lists identifying the bases. The map areas are as follow:

- Pages 4 - 9      Maps 1 through 3— Long Bien/Bien Hoa, Southwest of Saigon, and the Rocket Belt. The Brigade Main Base (Camp Frenzell –Jones) was set up near Long Bien in late 1966, with preliminary training missions conducted in the general vicinity. Many other units also had their main rear bases in the area, which was headquarters for both II Field Force Vietnam (IIFV) and United States Army Vietnam (USARV). To the North of Bien Hoa was War Zone D, the Southern part of which consisted of the “Rocket Belt” used by the VC/NVA as a staging area for rocket attacks on the huge air base and American installations. Brigade units took their turn rotating into the rocket belt to defend the area during 1967 and 1968, although their primary maneuver area during the period was Southwest of Saigon.
- Pages 10 & 11      Map 4 – Tay Ninh Operation in Spring 1968 by several of the Brigade’s units.
- Pages 12 - 19      Maps 5 through 8 – Blackhorse/Xuan Loc, Dinh Quan, Tanh Linh, and Ham Tan. In June 1969, the Brigade shifted operations to Blackhorse with the departure of the 11th Armored Cav to the Cambodian border. Later in 1969, forward headquarters was set up in Xuan Loc. For the remaining year in-country, Brigade units would operate in this area, gradually expanding to the Northeast and Southeast so that by mid-1970 they were near the II Corps boundary and South China Sea.
- Pages 20 & 21      Cambodia. In the Spring of 1970, the 5/12 Infantry was made a part of the first major incursion into the NVA sanctuaries along the border under the 1<sup>st</sup> Air Cav.
- Pages 22 & 23      Epilog

From an enlisted man's perspective, at first the troops didn't really refer to where they spent their nights when not on ambush patrols as any type of "base" – with the exception of the Brigade Main Base "BMB". Most locations in 1967 were known by local names (villages, etc.). By 1968, we were calling many of these locations "firebases" (maybe because we also started constructing them in the middle of nowhere with bulldozed birms for perimeters) and coded designations were used in all the journals. Eventually, more precise designations were used in the journals – "patrol bases", "fire support bases" and the combination "fire support/patrol bases". These designations appear to have been to identify where artillery was located (hence the "fire support" wording). As this writer recalls, most of us just called them by their code/local names or with the generic term "firebase".

There are at least four bases which were identified Southwest of Saigon but did not have names associated with them in the journals. There were also some base names identified for which locations could not be determined. If you can help in any way, please let Bob or Larry know. The unidentified bases are listed below as "Unknown 1" through "Unknown 4". The names without locations are Turtle, Marge, Brown Eye, Elvira, Chris, and Jeannie.

Several bases were known by different names during the years, as different units occupied them and the headquarters staff changed. At least one name (Nancy) was used twice – Southwest of Saigon and again in the Xuan Loc area.

In the alphabetical list, only the base names followed by the map pages on which they appears is given. The detailed map pages contain our attempt to provide more information (often incomplete because units rotated through bases frequently) on who occupied a given base, and when it first appeared in the journals.

Where maps overlap, bases are listed on each map. Firebase Joy is located in the corner where 4 maps join, so is shown on all four. Also, a few base names were actually placed on the maps where it was felt to do so would help orient where the maps are located in relation to each other.

Map 2 – Southwest of Saigon

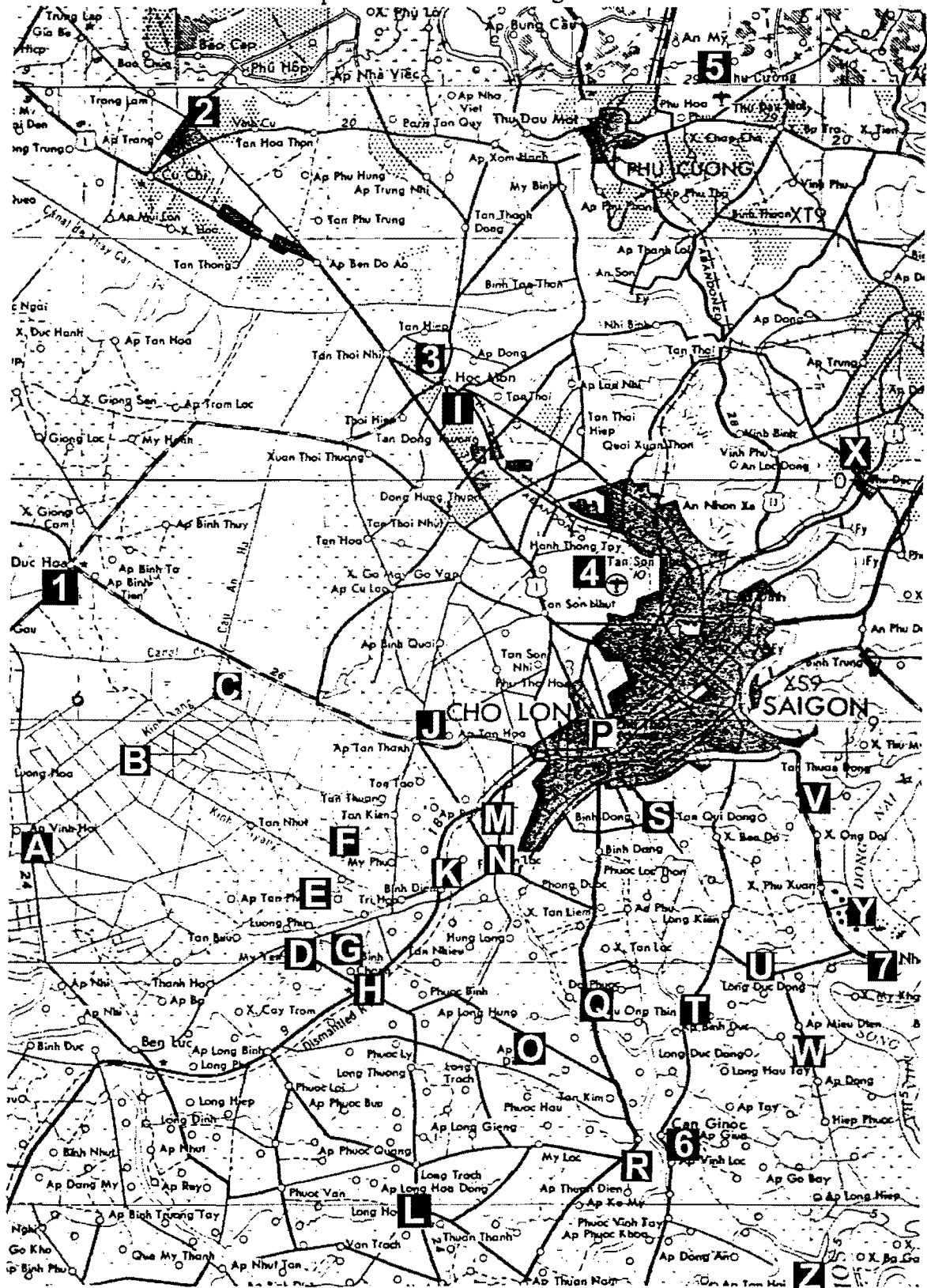

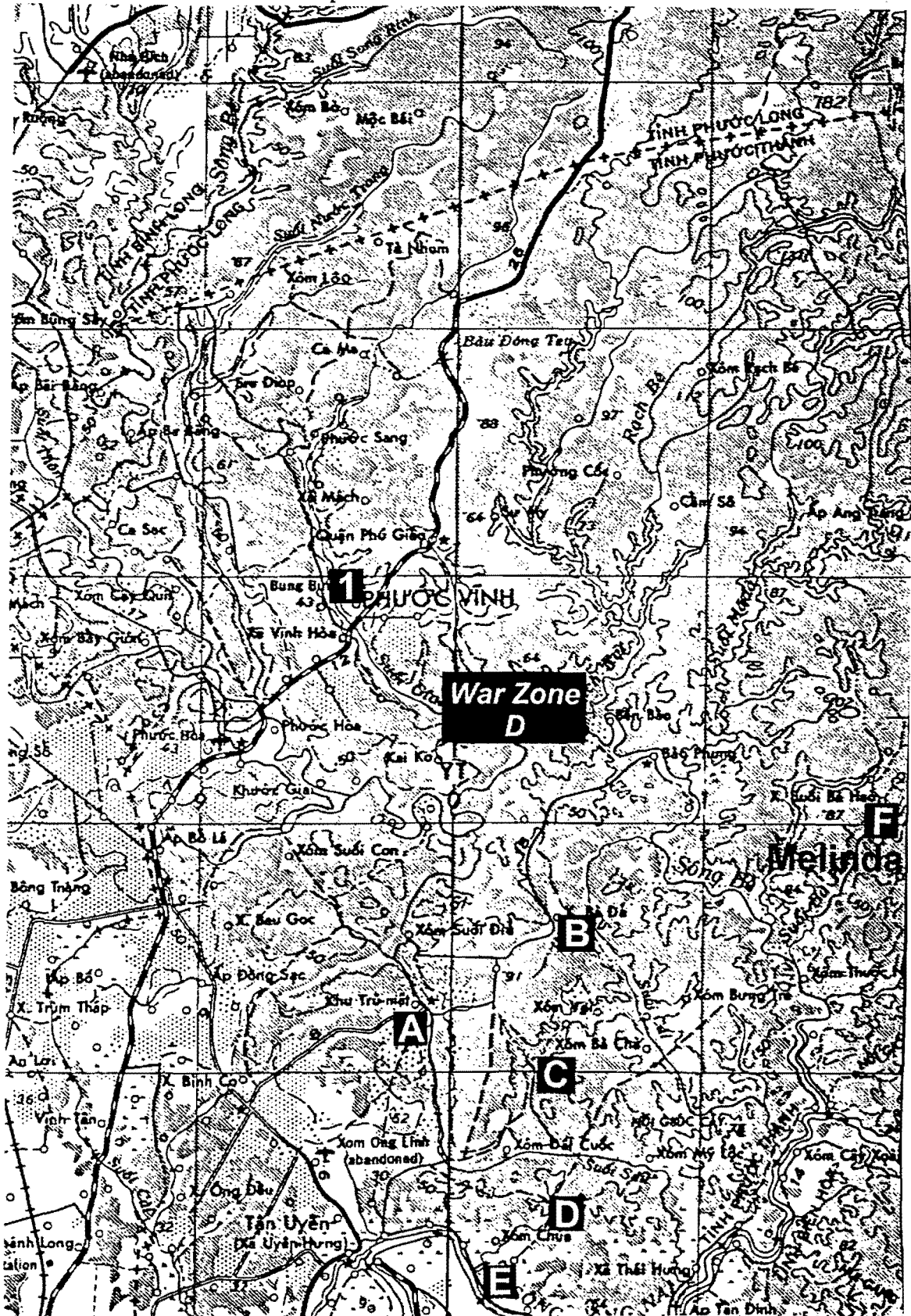

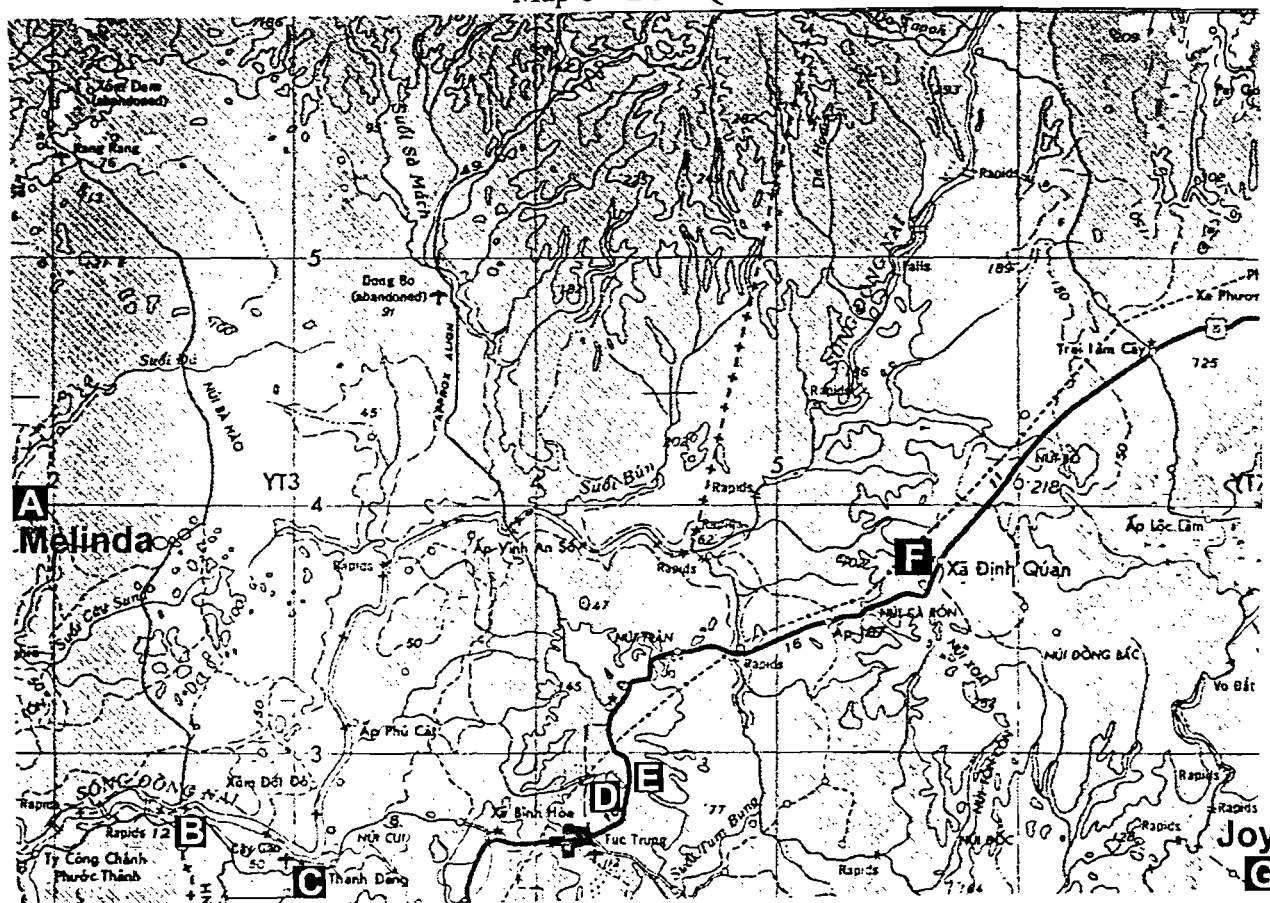

Epilog

The Brigade Main Base was named Camp Frenzell-Jones in ceremonies on September 18, 1967. A Memorial Plaque was placed on a stone base at the foot of the Brigade flagstaffs in honor of the two soldiers from the 4<sup>th</sup> Battalion, 12<sup>th</sup> Infantry who died near Thu Duc on January 21 of that year. Following is the inscription on the plaque (a photo of the ceremony is on the facing page):

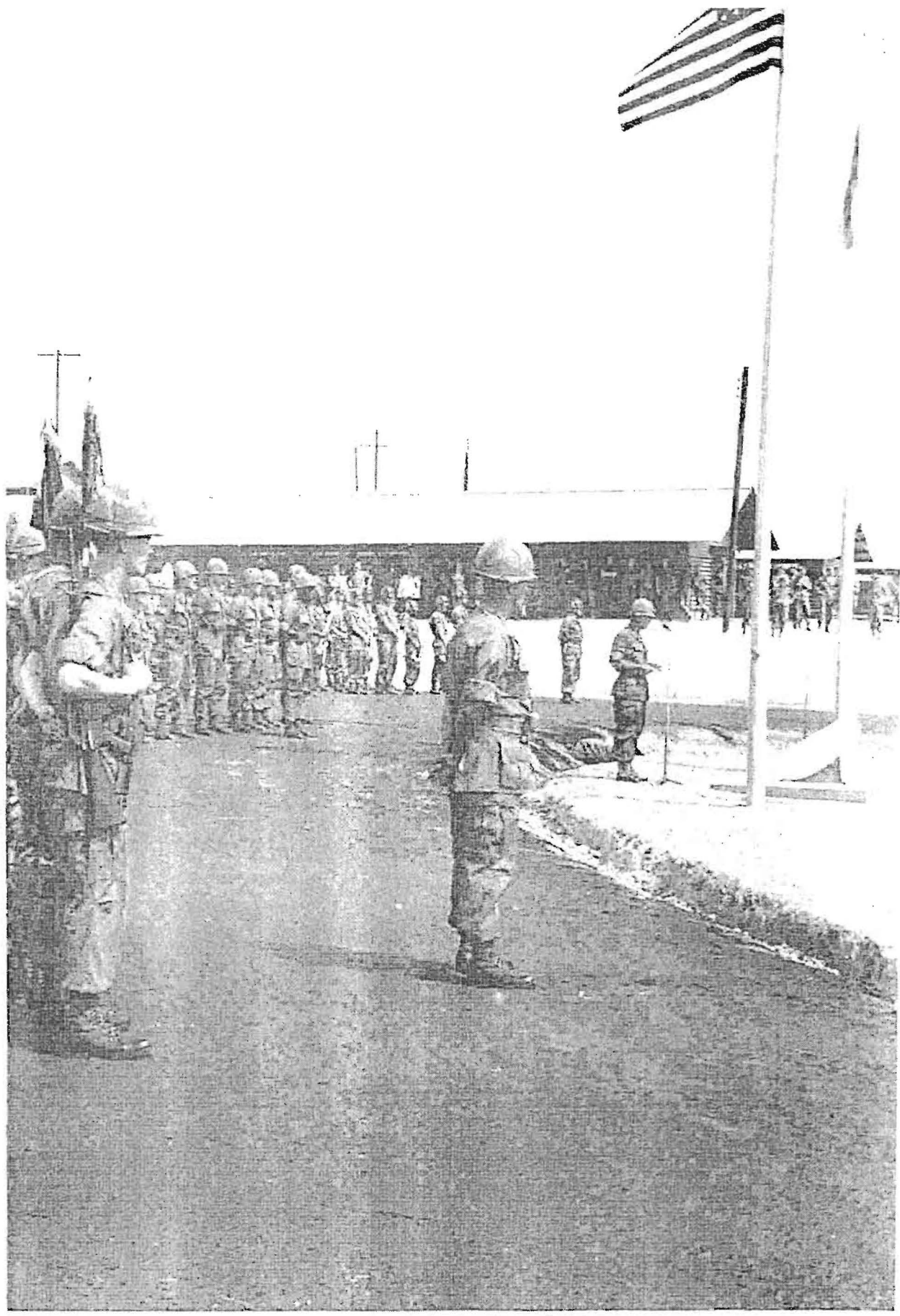
**SPECIALIST BILLY C. JONES AND PRIVATE FIRST CLASS HERBERT E. FRENZELL WERE ON AN EAGLE FLIGHT ON 21 JANUARY 1967 WHEN THEIR UNIT MET A WELL ENTRENCHED VC FORCE. THE UNIT, CAUGHT IN OPEN TERRAIN AND WITHOUT COVER, WAS IN A DESPERATE SITUATION. PFC FRENZELL, WHO WAS NOT AT THE TIME DIRECTLY INVOLVED IN THE AMBUSH AND WAS IN A SAFE LOCATION, CHOSE TO OPEN FIRE ON THE ENEMY, THEREBY DRAWING FIRE AWAY FROM THE EXPOSED POSITIONS. AFTER EVERYONE HAD WITHDRAWN, PFC FRENZELL STARTED HIS ATTEMPT TO MOVE BACK TO REJOIN HIS SQUAD. AS HE LEFT HIS CONCEALED POSITION HE WAS SHOT AND KILLED. SPECIALIST FOUR JONES CRAWLED THROUGH THE MUD AND ENEMY FIRE TO RECOVER FRENZELL'S BODY. AFTER CONTACT WAS BROKEN, SP4 JONES CARRIED PFC FRENZELL'S BODY FOR OVER TWO HOURS THROUGH THICK JUNGLE GROWTH AND HAZARDOUS SWAMPS TO PLACE PFC FRENZELL ON THE WAITING HELICOPTER. HOWEVER WHEN HE SAW ANOTHER MAN HIT AND FALL, HE LOWERED PFC FRENZELL'S BODY TO THE GROUND AND RUSHED TO ASSIST THE NEWLY WOUNDED SOLDIER. IT WAS AT THIS TIME THAT HE WAS FATALLY WOUNDED. HIS FINAL WORDS WERE, "I TRIED. I DID ALL I COULD DO. I COULDN'T DO ANY MORE."**

Regardless of political and historical revisions, the men who went to Vietnam with the Brigade believed they were sent to stop the Communists from overrunning the country. After nearly four years of fighting, the Brigade was withdrawn and deactivated in October, 1970. That November, Pacific Architects and Engineers were sent to the old Brigade Main Base to salvage building material. Soon, all that was left to be slowly covered by the dust, mud and undergrowth were the cement pads on which the buildings had stood.

The physical trappings may be gone, but as long as **WE** remember, the unique spirit of the 199<sup>th</sup> remains alive – not for the military lineage or banners but to honor those with whom we served, both the living and the dead.

Whether the veterans of other units can claim this is a matter for their reflection, but for those of us in the 199<sup>th</sup> Light Infantry Brigade – the Redcatchers – the final words of Specialist Four Jones were prophetic and can be paraphrased for us all:

**“WE TRIED. WE DID ALL WE COULD DO. WE COULDN'T DO ANY MORE.”**

If you know of anything that we don't have listed about our casualties or basecamps or anything else you think we should know about; please write it down and give it to us. We want to make our records of the brigade as true and complete as we can. So we can state what the brigade was doing on a daily basis for the four year time period we were there and make it all available to you. So if you want; you can get a record of the time you were there for your company.

If you have any questions please ask us. The only dumb question is the one not asked. We would like to know what you think of the history project.
