AMERICAL MEDAL OF HONOR RECIPIENTS

This is the ninth in a series of Americal Division Medal of Honor recipients.

ROBERT C. MURRAY K.I.A.,

Rank and organization: Staff Sergeant, U.S. Army, Company B, 4th Battalion, 31st Infantry, 196th Infantry Brigade, Americal Division. Place and date: Near the village of Hiep Duc, Republic of Vietnam, 7 June 1970. Entered service at: New York NY. Born 10 December 1946, Bronx, NY

Citation: S/Sgt. Murray distinguished himself while serving as a squad leader with Company B. S/Sgt. Murray's squad was searching for an enemy mortar that had been threatening friendly positions when a member of the squad tripped an enemy grenade rigged as a booby trap. Realizing that he had activated the booby trap, the soldier shouted for everybody to take cover. Instantly assessing the danger to the men of his squad, S/Sgt. Murray unhesitatingly and with complete disregard for his own safety, threw himself on the grenade absorbing the full and fatal impact of the explosion. By his gallant action and self sacrifice, he prevented the death or injury to the other members of his squad. S/Sgt. Murray's extraordinary courage and gallantry, at the cost of his life, above and beyond the call of duty, are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit to him, his unit, and the U.S. Army

Thank you for offering to put a request in your next issue regarding my late son, Craig. It will be interesting to learn more about the engagement that took place on Feb. 11, 1968. He was a rifleman and had to expose himself twice to lay down protective fire. On the second occasion, he was mortally wounded."

A letter follows from the Mother of SP/4 James L. Lopp who was KIA during Tet 68'. He was a member of my own company, A Co. 1/6th. Infantry of the 198th. Light Infantry Brigade. I arrived in-country shortly after so I hope that there is someone else out there that can help Mrs. Lopp.

"I saw your ad in our local paper for the reunion of service men. I hope that this letter reaches you in time for the January reunion. Its possible that there wont be anyone that knew my son but I thought I would write to you and see if it would do any good. Jimmy was in a special class at Fort Hood. Most of the boys were from the mid-west. They were so proud of the 198th. It was a special bunch that trained especiall for "search & destroy". They left in the Fall of 67'. We lost him in the battle of Danang. Just before they went up there he sent a lot of pictures of things over there, their landings and a lot of guys I suppose were his friends. He never got home to tell us who they were and as we dont have a class picture, we dont know who they are. He had a twin Brother who could not go because of an injury, who would be glad to hear from someone who knew him. So if you can in any way find someone that knew of him, tell them to contact me. Maybe they would like the pictures. I know that they lost a lot of men that day, Feb. 8. He was reported missing for 10 days. It will be 20 years next year. I cant believe it. Im 70. Hope you can find one of his buddies. Thank you for any thing you can do for me and I hope I get a reply from someone.

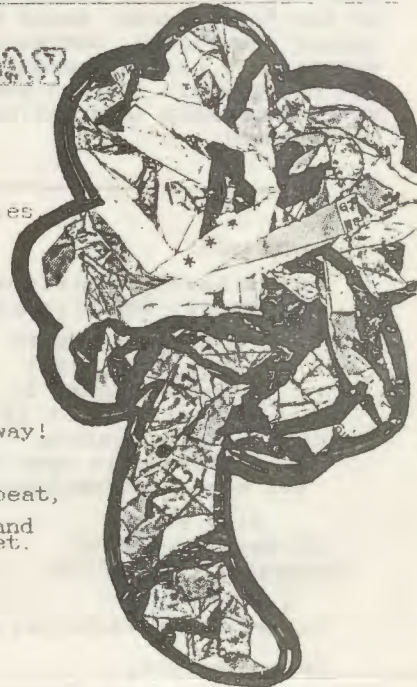

OUR COMBAT GI'S

Vietnam is still a pop art oddity 12,000 miles away.

The public worries more about living with a possible tax increase. Officials worry about living with world opinion. The GI worries about living.

His world there is nightly blackout and mortar traffic. It's alive with booby traps that can blow his legs or his life to shreds. It's occupied with an enemy and an ally that look exactly alike.

He would give a month's pay for a sound sleep.

And 10 years of his life for a night at home.

He is not a bit player in a comic opera conflict, not the trump in an international card game and not 12,000 miles away but as near as the muddy and bloody pictures in the newspapers.

Moreover, he is usually a very young American citizen in a hell of a fix. The average age of a combat GI in Vietnam is eighteen and a half.

But what a man he is!

A pink-cheeked, tousled-haired, tight-muscled fellow who, under normal circumstances, would be considered by society as a half-man, half-boy, not yet dry behind the ears, a pain in the employment chart.

But right now, he is the beardless hope of free men.

He is for the most part unmarried and without material possessions except for possibly an old car at home and a transistor radio here.

He listens to rock 'n' roll and the 105mm howitzers.

He has learned to like beer by now because it is cold and because it is "the thing to do". He smokes because he gets free cigarettes in his C-ration package and it also is the thing to do.

He still has trouble spelling, and writing letters home is a painful process. But he can break down a rifle in 30 seconds and put it back together again in 29. He can describe the nomenclature of a fragmentation grenade, explain how a machinegun operates and, of course, utilize either if the need arises.

He obeys now, without hesitation. But he is not broken.

He has seen more suffering than he should have in his short life. He has stood among hills of bodies and he has helped to construct those hills.

He has wept in public and in private, and he is not ashamed in either place, because his pals have fallen in battle and he has come close to joining them.

And he has become self-sufficient; he has two pairs of fatigues, washes one and wears the other. He sometimes forgets to brush his teeth, but not his rifle.

He keeps his socks dry and his canteen full. He can cook his own meal, fix his own hurts and mend his own rips - material or mental.

He will share his water with you if you thirst, break his rations in half if you hunger, split his ammunition if you are fighting for your life.

He can do the work of two civilians, draw half the pay of one and find ironic humor in it all. He has learned to use his hands as a weapon and his weapon as his hands. He can save a life or, most assuredly, take one.

Eighteen-and-a-half-years old.

What a man he is . . . already.

Before that went to press Jim Buckle called me (Mar. 30 or 31st and he said a couple of members had called the hotel and were quoted a rate of \$56.00 before the convention and were not able to obtain a rate for the period after the convention.

At this point I want to admit I was had by an overzealous new Director of Sales who didnt mind bending the truth in order to book the convention. She dangled a carrot and I bit, hook, line and sinker. This was not so far fetched, as the MGM Grand, which is the best hotel in Reno is advertising a \$17.00 rate at the present time. The only thing the Sands would give me in writing was the \$42.00 convention rate and we are locked into that with a contract. I have dealt with many hotels over the years and this is the first time I have had this happen. Invariably they would give a rate and honor it.

I have filed a complaint with the Reno Visitors and Convention Bureau, as they were the initial contact for the hotel arrangements. I have been unable to contact the General Manager of the hotel, as yet, but hope to do so in the next few days and see what can be worked out. Unfortunately, I have to meet the publishing date of the Newsletter before I can strighten out the problem, or make different arrangements.

Each of the members who have sent their registration, or declaration of interest, will receive a clarifying letter from me very soon, explaining how this situation has been resolved. I am also sending the National Commander and Adjutant a recent letter from the Sales Manager, admitting they do sometimes have a \$14.00 rate for out of State visitors, to show I was not hallucinating in initially referring to this rate.

Please do not let this change your plans, as we have a lot of registrations in already and everything except this is going good. Give me a chance to work out the details and let you know the results. I can promise you wont be sorry. And please accept my apologies for this confusion.

They have recently played at such world renown jazz festivals as Sacramento and Monterey.
