My name is Chu Van Duong, a former political prisoner of the Vietnamese communist regime. I am currently residing at _____, Tucson

Before April 1975, I was a First-Lieutenant _____ of the Police Department in Viet Nam. After the communists came to power, I was imprisoned in a re-education camp from 6/5/75 to 2/4/81 at Ben gia, Chu Long. Because of that experience, I have been admitted to the United States on 3/7/95 in accordance with _____ subprogram of the ODP program for former political prisoners under a bilateral Agreement between Viet Nam and the United States. While I am grateful for the chance to resettle in the United States, my resettlement has been made extremely difficult on account of the fact that the following unmarried children of mine have been rejected for resettlement despite the fact that for many years the unmarried children were permitted to accompany their parents who were former political prisoners.

Thus, I hope that you can help me so that our family could be together again. In particular, may I urge that you give your support to Section 596 of the Foreign Operation Appropriation Bill H-R.3540 offered by Senator John McCain and enacted by the Senate on July 26, 1996. The Bill will be considered by the Conference Committee in early September 1996. By making sure that this Section remains in the final Act, you will be helping many families of former political prisoners who are in the same sad situation as mine.
