Dear Applicant or Sponsor:

The names of the individuals listed above appeared on the ODP case noted. Following review of the file(s) it has been determined that they are not eligible for an ODP interview.

Since the applicants are not eligible for an ODP interview, ODP has closed their file(s). Original documents contained in the file(s) are being returned to the sponsor of record. In the event the latest address ODP has for the sponsor is outdated then an attempt will be made to return the documents to the applicants in Vietnam.

Should the sponsor or other eligible relative wish to file an immigrant visa petition or a refugee petition for a close relative in Vietnam, he or she can do so at the nearest office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. It is advised that a phone call be placed to that office first to determine what documents are required.

If an immigrant visa petition in a family preference category has already been filed, sponsors may call (800) 325-6536 for a recorded message from the US Department of State Visa Office advising on current visa processing cut-off dates. If the petitioner should become a naturalized U.S. citizen, he or she should send a copy of his or her naturalization certificate or passport to the National Visa Center (NVC) at 32 Rochester Avenue, Portsmouth, New Hampshire 03801-2909. Petitioners and beneficiaries should keep NVC informed of all address updates.

The only persons now eligible for interview under the former re-education camp detainee program are those with existing files who can establish that they were (1) incarcerated for three or more years in a re-education camp; (2) incarcerated for one or more years, and either worked for the US government or a US private organization for one or more years, or attended training in the US under USG auspices; or (3) widowed as a result of the death of a spouse either in a re-education camp or as a direct result of that incarceration. Cases based on claims of Amerasian ethnicity also continue to be processed under ODP.

We regret that we cannot give you more encouraging news.
