Dear friends:

I - Thank you very much for giving me this opportunity to speak with you today about the issue of "SERVICES PROVIDED TO THE VIETNAMESE COMMUNITY BY THE FVPPA"

My name is Khuc Minh Tho, I came to the United States in 1977 as a refugee.

II The FVPPA is a non-profit organization. We try to provide support to approximately 10,000 members to assist them in resettling in the U.S. and ending their suffering after so many years of incarceration.

Our Association tries to respond to their needs by helping them to adjust to a new environment.

III Our main objectives consist of:

- First of all, urging the Department of State and the Congress to increase the budget and quota for the resettlement of the political prisoners.
- Secondly, working with other mutual assistance associations and service agencies in helping former political prisoners to adjust smoothly to their new lives and become productive members of the community, especially in the following areas:

- o Language and/or skills training
- o Housing
- o Health care
- o Education

CONCLUSION:

Although, these people were unfortunate in the past, they are now very proud to use their ability to rebuild their lives in the United States. If they have a good orientation they will regain their dignity and self-esteem. They can and will be good citizens in this country and they will be enjoy the freedom they have acquired.
