BG COOKSEY TAKES COMMAND

BG Howard H. Cooksey (Brentsville, Va) assumed temporary command of the Americal Division, October 15, 1969, as MG Lloyd B. Ramsey (Somerset, Ky) departed for a thirty day CONUS leave.

The acting division commander comes to the division from Hqs. USARV where he was Deputy Chief of Staff for Plans and Operations.

General Cooksey has served in World War II and the Korean Conflict. He is the holder of the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star with two oak leaf clusters as well as the Combat Infantryman's Badge with star.

Moreover, General Cooksey is no stranger to the Americal Division as he was assigned here as Assistant Division Commander from June 1968 to April 1969.

In reading one of the Rat patrol stories yesterday someone mentioned B52 strikes. That uncovers another memory about VN for me because I was quite close to at least 2 of these strikes. When I saw the use of B52's in Desert Storm on the Iraqi positions--I could easily relate to the incredible destruction of these bombers.

It's a long story ----- one of the strikes I was connected. Perhaps highly unusual for an infantry unit. We once went on a patrol in a remote valley without any Arty support and discovered thousands of NVA staging in the area. They were aware that we discovered them but did not fire at us. They could have wiped us out in minutes if they chose to do so. We had one company--about 90 guys--and found 100's of 122mm's, a base training camp with 20 buildings with straw thatched roofs, long columns of NVA marching southward. They were clearly on a mission to somewhere and were not going to mess with my little unit. At one point, we radioed in that we were observing a long column of NVA marching on trail in broad daylight. Shark gunships and Phantom jets were sent to attack. The column would not stop at anything. They would get shot at from the air--run for cover alongside the trail--and resume marching after the air strike stopped. I can remember them quite vividly--all very young--and dressed in clean new NVA uniforms. Under orders to move forward. After spending a few days in this area observing and discovering--we were told to pack up and move out quick. I think we got orders at about 3pm and had to reach an objective 10 clicks away by about 7 pm. The reason: B52 precision bombs were going to be dropped on the valley. Planes may have been in the air already for all I know. We had to be 1 click away from the bombing zone--or the strike would be stopped. Our CO turned into a real sun-of-gun. We damn near ran out of that place.

We reached our objective at just about sunset and the CO radioed the word in. Fifteen minutes later the earth began to shake--the airstrike was underway. The ground felt like it was bouncing up and down. Like an earthquake, you almost couldn't hold your footing. The noise was incredibly loud

The incident when I almost lost my head was in July of 69.--give or take a month. That might have been before Frank's time. He might have known some of the participants though. In May/ June of 69 there was a siege on LZ Professional that lasted about 10 days --- the 1/14th battery took some very heavy losses and therefore had to be replaced with an entire new unit. We had gotten to know the old 1/14th unit pretty well. They were a laid back bunch and I thought they were pretty good. Apparently the top command must have thought that they were not maintaining enough military discipline--and apparently concluded that caused the casualties.

The replacement 1/14th unit was a whole different story. Reminded me of basic training a bit. They had very inexperienced people. Made them wear flak jackets all of the time and they usually double-timed it every where they went. As grunts, we got a chuckle out of how the replacement battery was run. Glad we were not in it. It reminds me of when Patton took over the 2nd Armored Div. in No. Africa in WWII. The old story how can a unit be any good if it doesn't look good--polished boots etc....

At least in my infantry unit, in the bush, we didn't get too concerned about dress or looks or any of that good stuff. We just performed very well as a unit. Unfortunately, when we came back into the firebase or the rear area--we would actually have to shave. Old memories...

On Hiep Duc--Hell we didn't know what we were getting into. Typically being a grunt all you knew was that a call would come in from some HQ and you were told to get your stuff together--choppers were in air. You would be picked up and were going to "so and so" because there probably had been some hostile action. Much of the time by the time we got there all was quiet--other times maybe some sniper fire--maybe a lot of fire. Maybe it lasted a while--maybe not. After a while you figure that either (1) your time is up and you go home or (2) you get wounded and get out of the field for awhile or (3) you luck out and get a d-ck job back at the HQ. You never know what will happen when Huey's drop you in--it's a day to day thing. You kind of cast your fate to the wind and hope for the best. My unit--D. Co. spent only about a week in the Hiep Duc area to relieve another outfit first then we patrolled the surrounding jungle and broke machetes on the dense weeds in that area. The intensity of the firefight I was in was just incredible. I carried a thousand rounds of ammo and used it in two hours plus I shot leftover ammo from guys who got wounded after I ran out. All I can say is that those suckers were well supplied and dug in very deep. Their mission was to kill/maim as many GI's as possible without any concern of how many NVA were lost. We shot at them, fired mortars and arty, had shark gunships overhead and had Phantoms bomb them. They just kept shooting and mortaring us--wouldn't stop. It was nuts. You asked about what I thought at the time. Well a battle like that is so intense--you don't think--you do whatever it takes to save your *ss and everyone else's. We fortunately didn't have Rambo type--we believed in self preservation--no one put pressure on us to get body count. It is amazing how people can act under stress like that. Two guys ahead of me were pinned down behind a wall of sod. They could not go in any direction without getting killed immediately. I yelled up to them not to move. The stress was so incredible. All of a sudden, these two guys started laughing and told jokes to each other. They started yelling jokes back to me. I guess it was their way of dealing with the stress. They could look behind their position and see GI's getting hit and there was nothing they could do about

Gary, Got your package about the 1/46th in the mail on Friday. Somewhere I do have an article that was in Vietnam magazine about the 196th Infantry and it states when the 1/46th was transferred from the 198th. I will ship you a copy when I find it.

The last page of the stuff you sent me was for a "Regimental Medal of Honor". (I am not familiar with a Regimental only citation but I found it to be very close to home.) The recipient was the CO of Alpha 1/46th for action on May 13 and 14, 1969. I can vividly remember the beating Alpha took near LZ Professional and how the company got split up and part of it was lost for a few days without radios or maps. Cpt. Dunagan's company was decimated for practical purposes as I believe they may have had 50% casualties in just a few days. I can remember the lost platoon of Alpha returning to Pro about as demoralized as any guys I have ever seen. By the time they hit Pro, Dunagan must have been in the hospital. The award citation reads that "Dunagan was leading an attack to relieve pressure on the battalion's forward support base when the Company came under intense fire from a well-entrenched enemy battalion. (The forward support base mentioned was LZ Professional--where Delta happened to be during the attack on May 12, 1969.) Last Fall, Vietnam magazine had a big article about the May 69 events around Pro and the TAC-E or Tactical Emergency that was declared. The 101st Airborne was brought in and the 1/46th was under the control of the 101st for a few weeks until the area stabilized. Somewhere I have a copy of this article and I will send it to you even though it was a bit before your time with the 1/46th. (Luckily, Doc saw the

article and sent me a copy of it.)

I've had real problems with a lot of the stuff written about the incident. Lets face it, sometimes we got our butts kicked not because of some screw-up, but because charlie did something right. I think Maryanne falls into that category. I do know, after it got over run, we got more drop-ins by staff officers than ever before and were issued beaucoup defoliant to pour down the sides of our hills. Had a real problem on OP-3, it had been a marine 1z and they mined it, and then army and then marine and then army. We weren't sure where all the mines in the perimeter were. When we moved the unit north during the last week of my tour we found a nice booby trapped bomb was buried right in the center of the position. The engineer in the cat, dozing the bunkers went straight up in the air with a squeal, all of us hit the dirt, after laying there awhile, I asked the driver what was going on (or words to that effect). He informed me of this rather large bomb he had just found with the blade of his dozer. We collected ourselves on the helo pad, waited for EOD and when they blew it in place, our job tearing down the OP was finished. There was a trigger device for the bomb, but in the 2-3 years we occupied the position, it never went off. The marines said they cleared the position, but I guess the old stamping your foot while covering your ears with your hands was less than totally effective (BG)

Jay: According to my text, Foundations in Microbiology, K. & A. Talaro, Wm. C. Brown Publishers, 1993. "The microbiology of alcoholic fermentation was greatly clarified by Louis Pasteur after French wine makers hired him to uncover the causes of periodic spoilage in wines. Especially troublesome was the conversion of wine to vinegar and the resultant sour flavor. Up to that time, wine formation had been considered strictly a chemical process. After extensively studying beer making and wine grapes, pasteur concluded that wine, both fine and not-so-fine was the result of microbial action on the juices of the grape and that wine "disease" was caused by contaminating organisms that produced undesirable products such as acid. Although he did not know it at the time, the bacterial contaminants for the acidity of the spoiled wines were likely to be Acetobacter or Gluconobacter introduced by the grapes, air, or wine making apparatus. These common gram negative genera further reduce ethanol to acetic acid and are presently used in commercial vinegar production. Pasteur's far-reaching solution to the problem is still with us today - mild heating, or pasteurization, of the grape juice to destroy the contaminants, followed by inoculation of the juice with a pure yeast culture. It also introduced the concept that a single microbe could be responsible for both a desired product and a disease."
