

At the 1996 Seawolf reunion in Washington D.S. Dennis Cladwell asked me to forward to him an article on Seawolf history. Hopefully this information which resulted from that request will be of some help to you Wolves who are interested in our units history.

The first and best place to start is to call or write Dan Calvert and ask him for copies of Jim Sprinkles history of the Wolves and for a copy of Admiral Kevin Delaney's remarks at the 1994 reunion in Pensacola. I think the Association charges \$1.00 each for these to cover copying and mailing. There is much factual information in these two sources. I am forwarding to Dan copies of two years of the squadron annual historical summary which you can also get from him. No historical summaries for the squadron's other existing years have been found.

I have collected quite a number of magazine articles on HA(L)-3 but most of them are very general in nature. There are perhaps four or five Videos you might want to get. Member Mike Madrid made the first one and you can contact him for a copy. There is "The Seawolves" by Brendan Tully(1996) which runs 35 minutes, (ISBN 0-9639698-2-X).
