

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

A Hospital Corpsman must be able to improvise and HM3 HARRISON is doing it. Although our laboratory manuals have not yet arrived, he accepted the challenge of becoming our laboratory technician. When he views an object under the microscope that may be clinically significant, he takes a picture of it with his Polaroid camera. He is a young man with many talents.

On behalf of the Medical Department I would like to take this opportunity to thank AN PEREZ for the outstanding job he did while assigned collateral duty with us for the past 3 months.

MEDICAL NOTE

MALARIA

This is a systemic communicable disease, acute, sometimes severe and often chronic, commonly beginning with indefinite malaise shortly followed by a characteristic shaking chill and rapidly rising temperature, usually accompanied by headache and nausea and ending with profuse sweating. After an interval free of fever, the cycle of chills, fever and sweating is repeated, either daily, every other day or every third day, depending on species of malaria parasite. Duration of untreated primary attack varies from a week to a month or longer. Relapses are common and may occur at irregular intervals for several years. Fatality in untreated cases vary from less than 1% to 10%. Clinical diagnosis depends on characteristic intermittent chills and fever enlargement of the spleen and sometimes a mild jaundice.

There are 4 types: Plasmodium Vivax for Vivax Malaria, P Falciparum for Falciparum Malaria, P Ovale for the less common Ovale Malaria and P Malariae for Juartan Malaria. Man is the only important reservoir of the disease. The immediate source of infection is an infected mosquito.

The disease is spread from human to human by the Anopheles Mosquitoes. These mosquitoes come in some 67 species and transmit malaria in many tropical and subtropical regions.

If a female Anopheles bites someone with malaria, the blood she sucks may contain malaria parasites. Within her body, these parasites will develop over a 14 day period. After this time if she bites a healthy person, she will inject infective parasites into his blood. Some 10 to 14 days later, symptoms of malaria appear - the typical cycle of fever and chills accompanied by headaches and nausea.

Treatment: A variety of quinine derivatives.

Control: (1) Spraying billeting areas with appropriate insecticides.

(2) Protective screening of billeting areas.

(3) Eradicating breeding areas of the Anopheles Mosquitoes (ponds, pools of standing water etc.)

Prophylaxis: In endemic areas such as Southeast Asia the recommended drugs are: (1) Chloroquine - Primaquine Tablet - A medium size orange tablet taken weekly.

(2) Dapsone Tablet - A small white tablet taken daily.

The C-P Tablet must be taken for 8 weeks after return to CONUS and the Dapsone should be taken for an additional 30 days after return to CONUS.
