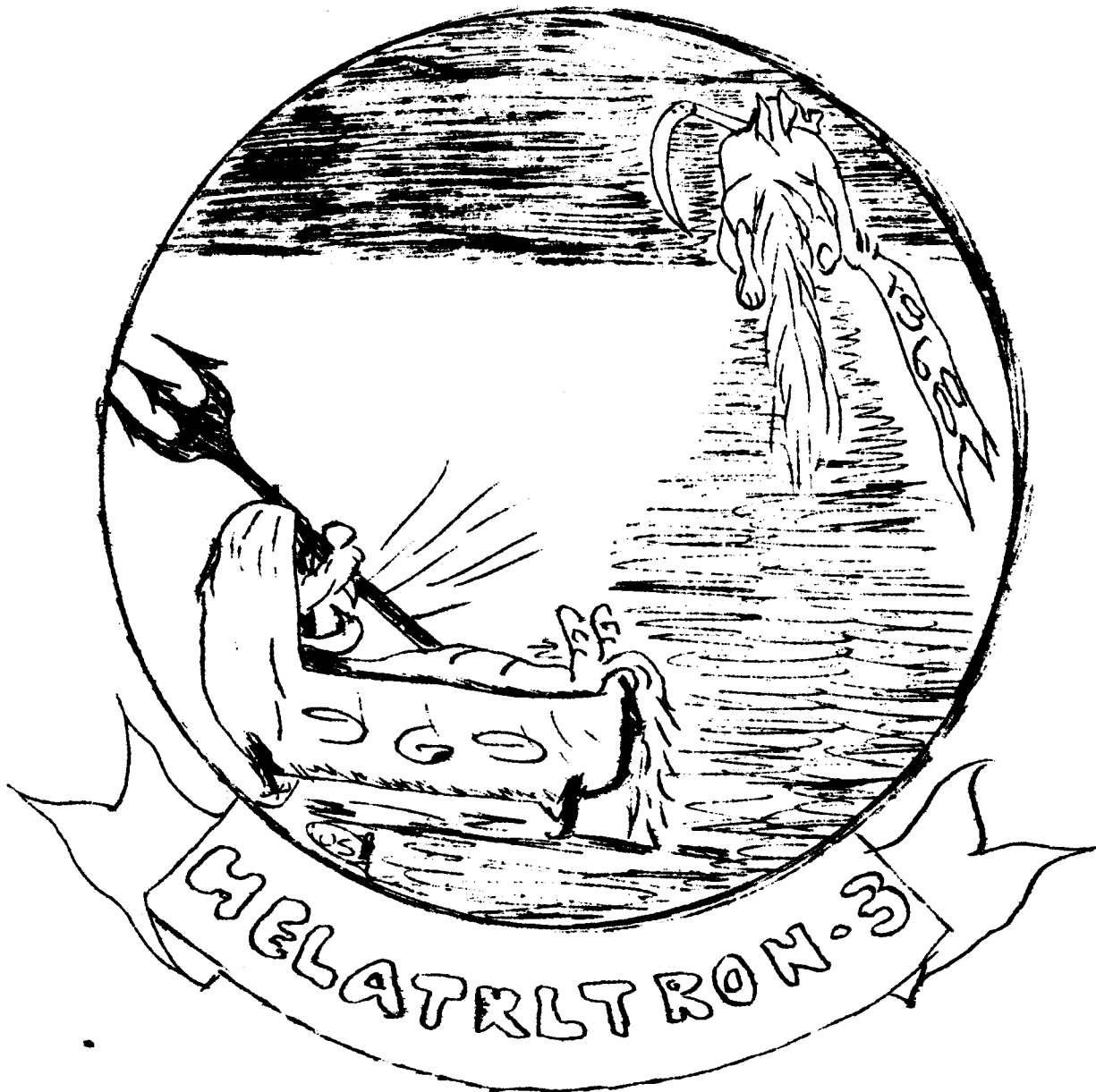


HELICOPTER ATTACK (LIGHT) SQUADRON THREE (HA(L)-3)

MEDICAL
DR. SPENCE

INFLUENZA

Influenza is an infectious disease caused by a virus. Single cases of influenza appear occasionally, but the disease usually occurs in epidemic form. People catch it from each other easily and develop symptoms quickly. During the first few days of an epidemic, a large number of people in a community or military command may come down with the disease. Cases build up rapidly and the epidemic is usually over within 4-6 weeks. Epidemics may appear in a number of places in one country or throughout the world at the same time or closely following one another.

SYMPTOMS:

Influenza attacks suddenly. The symptoms can be some or all of the following: fever, chills, headache, sore throat, cough and soreness and aches in the back and limbs. Although the fever usually lasts only 1-5 days, the patient is often exhausted or weakened as if he had gone through a long illness.

PRECAUTIONS:

(1) Practice good health habits such as getting plenty of rest and eating regular, well balanced meals. This will help keep up your resistance to infection.

- (2) For the short duration of an epidemic avoid crowded places.
- (3) Keep a good distance from people who do not cover their coughs and sneezes with a handkerchief or tissue.
- (4) If you feel symptoms starting, do not forget that your illness is catching and that carelessness on your part will increase the risk of infection in others. Influenza is most easily transmitted during the early stages of the illness.

TREATMENT:

No known medicine will cure influenza. Getting well without developing dangerous complications (e.g. PNEUMONIA) depends upon giving your body every known advantage while it fights the influenza infection:

- (1) Go to bed when symptoms start to develop.
- (2) Keep warm and out of drafts.
- (3) Eat simple foods that agree with you.
- (4) Drink plenty of water or other fluids.
- (5) Check with the medical department to insure that no complications have developed.
- (6) A single dose of influenza vaccine has been shown to be about 60% effective against influenza if it is given during the late autumn months before the beginning of the usual influenza season.

TO THE ENLISTED PERSONNEL:

The Medical Officer would like to take this opportunity to thank you for the surprise birthday party. It may be said that in one's lifetime he meets many acquaintances and few friends. By your gesture of friendship it proves that there are exceptions to this rule.
