One of these is the bush hat, worn exclusively by American G.I.'s over there, especially the infantrymen. the village where she lived.

To the infantry man in Viet Nam, the bush hat has special status because it becomes so much of a part of him. During the raining season, it is the bush hat that keeps his head dry. When the sun is out, the bush hat shields the sun from his eyes. When he is washing in a stream out in the fields, the bush hat holds his valuables, such as watches, rings, and wallets. It sometimes serves as a small pillow if nothing else is available. The bush hat is the infantry man's constant companion twenty four hours a day. *fine personal expression*
