# Khmer Rouge Cut All Roads To Capital, Urge 'Uprising'

PHNOM PENH (AP) — Anti-government forces struck on two sides of Phnom Penh Wednesday and called for an "uprising of the people" in the Cambodian capital as U.S. President Nixon vetoed a bill that would cut off funds for American bombing support.

Two other government positions along Highway 6 also have been evacuated in the last five days and the insurgent forces were reported massing for an attack on the key district town of Skoun, five miles north of Phaaiv.

In the south, U.S. warplanes pounded antigovernment positions in efforts to dislodge Khmer Rouge forces closing in on the key road junction of Highways 3 and 38, only nine miles from the edge of Phnom Penh.

All of Cambodia's major highways have been cut by anti-government forces.

American fighter-bombers also provided an air umbrella for a convoy of five ships which ran a gauntlet of insurgents' fire from South Vietnam 60 miles up

the Mekong River corridor to Phnom Penh. The convoy included two freighters and two oil tankers.

A third tanker broke down at the Cambodian naval base of Neak Luong, 32 miles southeast of Phnom Penh. Every ship in the convoy was hit by rockets or small arms fire.

Two freighters, the Thai registered Aquatic and the Hong Kong registered Kabbali, were hit by several rounds of 75mm recoilless cannon. One crewman aboard the Aquatic was

wounded. The Kabbali was set afire, but the crewmen extinguished the blaze after two hours.

Antigovernment leaflets distributed in Phnom Penh urged an "uprising of the people" against the regime of President Lon Nol. The leaflets called on the populace to seize and improvise weapons and to attack all those remaining loyal to Lon Nol. They declared that the Lon Nol government was on the verge of collapse and one more uprising would tumble it.
