It is well to recount their passing and remember them. It is the mission of those of us who survive to tell the story of those who do not. I imagine the fact that Sgt. Gray was assigned to the 134th Med was the problem with listing him as a KIA for the 121st. I will pass this along to the association president for his counsel with the recommendation that he be included in our list of honored fallen.

I will also forward your contact data on to the database chief for inclusion on our rolls. I sincerely hope you will make the reunion at Ft. Rucker next year. The years are rushing by and each reunion seems more dear than the last. I truly appreciate your comments regarding the helicopter crews and thank you for all those who served those aircraft in those days. Joe Galloway called us "God's own lunatics". I'm sure he was correct with that. I was, and still am, proud to call myself a Soc Trang Tiger and the opportunity to serve with some of America's finest was truly an honor.

I hope this finds you and yours well and prosperous and hope to see you at Mother Rucker next spring.

Hi Dave,

I am pleased to hear from you, and to get updates on the Soc Trang Tigers. Several months ago I started to write my memories of VN, and had just been struggling with the terrible accident that took Sgt Gray's life. He was the NCOIC of the 134th Medical Detachment, and a wonderful man with a family. I wonder if the confusion about this comes from the fact he was assigned to the 134th?

On February 11, 1963 we had just finished sick call when we were informed of a med evac to an outpost over run early that morning. I asked Sgt Gray to go with me. When we reached the area, we loaded 5 litters and three ambulatory patients on our chopper. The other chopper loaded 7 or 8 dead.

We arrived back at Soc Trang without incident. We were preparing to unload, and the gunner in the back swung the machine gun into the aircraft so we could unload. Eleven rounds were discharged accidentally into the hold, and Sgt Gray was wounded severely in the right arm, groin, and left leg. Two of the ambulatory Vietnamese were fatally wounded.

We rushed Sgt Gray to the Dispensary for IV Dextran, stopped the bleeding, and stabilized him as best we could. A medic and I loaded him in to a waiting Otter, and we took off for Saigon where he was pronounced DOA. He probably died within minutes, but we just could not believe it or give up.

We returned to Tan San Nhut for plane side services February 13, 1963. Surely one of the saddest days of my life.

I am sure this is more than you wanted or needed to know, but the fact I was reviewing my journal for that exact

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event before your contact seems more than coincidental?

I am truly hopeful to be at Ft. Rucker when the Tigers roar again. My admiration for the chopper pilots I had the privilege to know is surpassed only by my affection for them.
