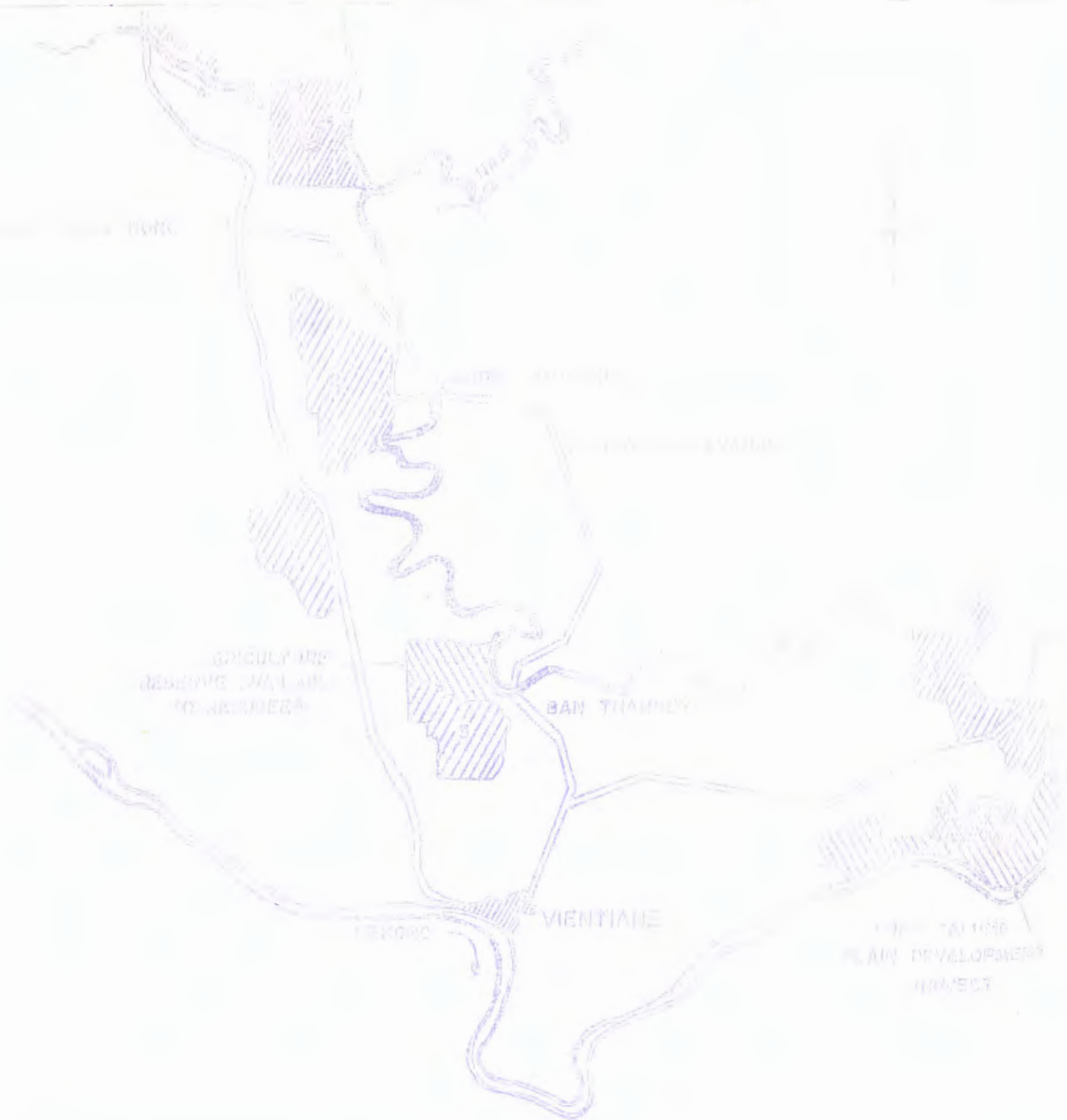

Ladies and Gentlemen

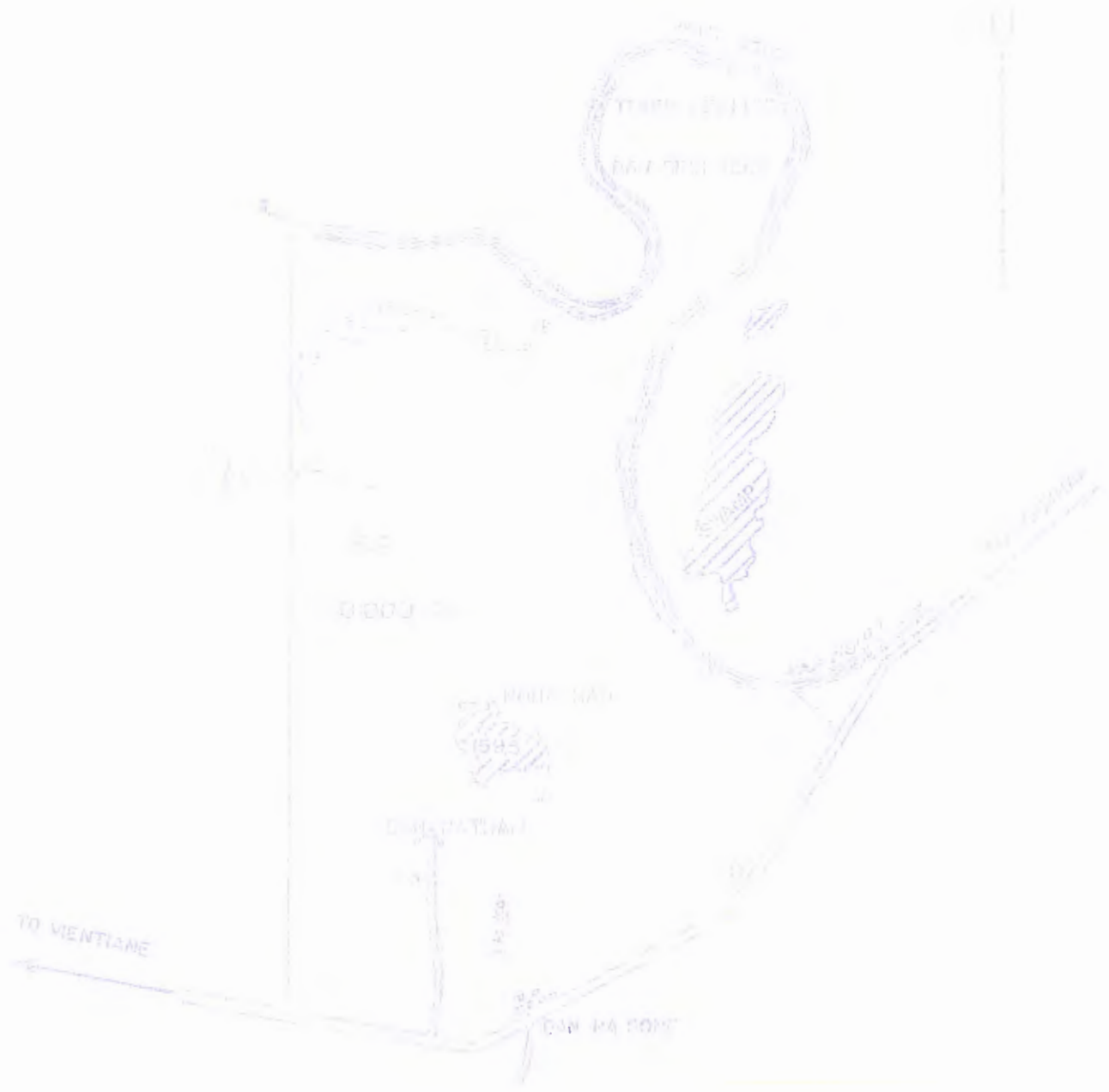

We further hope that in the future the Royal Government and the USAID Mission as well as the other aid organizations will continue to assist us and will not abandon us.
