

A mangrove tangle of folktales leads him to the aboriginal Kubu who can guide him into the highlands where the enigmatic ape-people [can be found]."

It deals with the twelve-year Emergency in Malaya, the formation of Malaysia, President Sukarno's campaign of Confrontation, the secession of Singapore, the revolutionary changes in Indonesia in 1965 to 1967, Sukarno's eventual deposition, the quality and structure of the federation of Malaysia and the Republic of Singapore, and the background of stresses which continue to face their national leadership."

"For his own countrymen Raffles the empire builder has obscured Raffles the administrator. The Dutch, on the other hand, have long recognized that his period in Java (1811-16) marked an important turning-point in their colonial policies in Indonesia."

"The theme of this novel is the conquest of Bali by the Dutch. [It] is concerned with a historical event which is known in the story of the colonization of Bali as the 'Poepoetan', that is, roughly, 'The End', or better, 'The Last Stand'. Nevertheless, it is not in the strict sense a historical novel, but rather a free paraphrase of actual occurrences."

"Early in 1944, when the war between the Allies and Japan was three years old, twenty thousand special troops invaded enemy-held Burma. Three thousand were Americans and came to be known as Merrill's Marauders. The rest were 'Chindits', mainly British soldiers together with Nigerians, Chinese, Gurkhas, and Burmese. Trained in guerilla warfare, they penetrated Burma by secret routes or landed on remote airfields hacked out of the jungle. Their mission: to free the land route blocked by the Japanese along which aid from America could reach China."

The so-called Malays from the Western part of the Indian Archipelago here met with the off-shoots of the Oceanic Negroes whose birth place is commonly said to have been somewhere in Melanesia, New Guinea included." The objective of the author was to survey the various peoples inhabiting the three largest islands of the Timor Archipelago: Sumba, Flores and Timor.

Then he infiltrated as a guerilla into Indo-China, where he was captured in 1942. He escaped in 1944 and was picked up by a British plane."
