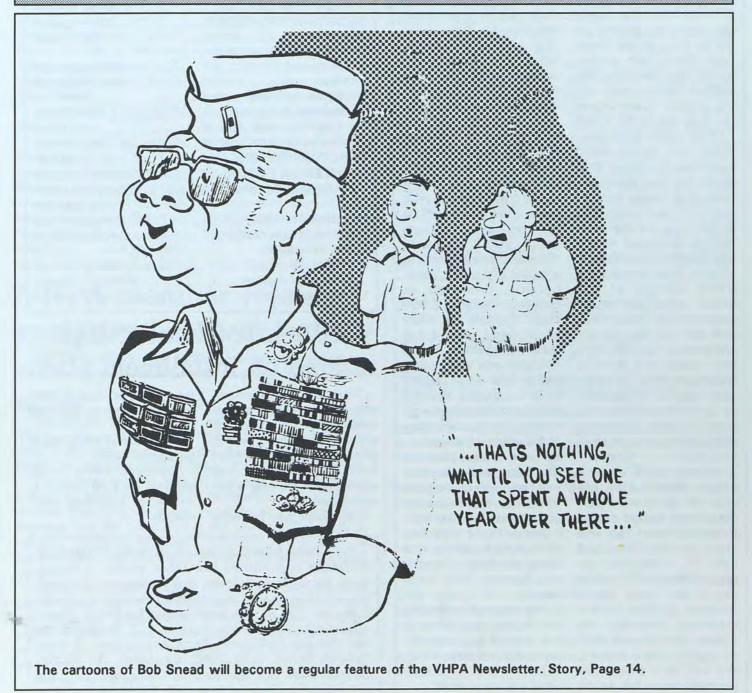

Last year in Reno, my husband Ronald C. Richtsmeier and I attended our first annual reunion, and it was an especially poignant one for us both.

You see, 25 years ago last July in Pleiku, I was a young U.S. Army nurse, new in-country and I met a downed helicopter pilot who was one of my first patients at the 18th Surg; a year later, he became my husband. His co-pilot in the crash became my brother-in-law (my sister was also an Army nurse).

Although 20 years and 3 children later they are no longer married, we have all stayed quite close.

The U.S.A.F. "Husky" pilot that rescued my husband was shot down and later became a patient of mine also. Another U.S.A.F. "Husky" pilot from the same unit in Pleiku, rescued my future brother in law... and we all got together for the first time, 25 years after the fact! At the reunion, my husband finally got to meet and thank the man who saved his life and gave him all his tomorrows.

This (now aging) Army nurse had the opportunity to reminisce with four of the gallant helicopter pilots (and former patients) whose lives became so inextricably entwined with hers! What a reunion that was, for all of us!

At the time of the reunion last year, Ron was hoping to purchase a life membership but this past year has not been easy for us, as for many, and he decided to trim his share of the budget by allowing his VHPA membership to lapse . . ! This August marks our silver wedding anniversary, and July marks the 26th anniversary of the helicopter crash that brought us together. Either occasion is certainly worth celebrating in grand style; for now, I think that renewing Ron's membership is a gift of special significance. I hope we can get him to Atlanta as well!

I'm sure you hear so many stories like ours ... the VHPA serves such a wonderful purpose in getting people in touch with each other and with their past ... a major part of who we are today. Thanks!

Pilots escaped injury in Blackjack 39 crash

The photo on Page 8 of your June issue was indeed of "Blackjack 39," which crashed following a low-level flight/short shaft failure. As I recall, the RLO A/C and WO Peter Pilot escaped injury!

What stirred my recall of this event was the clear photo of the beloved "Blackjack" on the battery access door, as I painted that one and approximately six others during my March 1969-March 1970 tour of duty at Camp Enari with A Company, 4th Aviation Battalion, 4th Infantry Division.

They (the pilots of the crashed aircraft) were undertaking the dawn patrol that December morning and, according to the report, the ship actually "end-o'd" before self-destructing in the numerous trees! Lucky!!

It's been 22 years since I painted my last Blackjack and it was a labor of love. The ships' A/C or crew chief would bring a clean battery cover to my hooch, bribing me with paint and some bartering materials (wine, magazines, white underwear, stuff like that) and in three or four days, a new Blackjack would take to the skies over II Corps.

The last three or four almost got me in Dutch with the brass, as I began to ad lib with foreign objects painted into the hands and robes of the Jacks and Kings. (I think it was the roach that steamed 'em the most!)

Member says: Thanks for putting together a great VHPA reunion

This past weekend I had the honor and pleasure of attending my first national reunion. I just want to say "thanks" to Kenny Bunn and all those responsible for putting it together.

I felt my wife, who went through the Army and Vietnam experience at my side, finally could understand

what we did and why. The movie at the banquet was excellent. I only wish I had been able to find some of the guys I flew with 20 years ago.

Well, maybe at future reunions, which I will do my best to attend, I can get to meet and thank some of the guys for making it possible for me to come back home and see my children grow up.

I would like to contribute to the unit histories and shed some light about a UH-1H, tail No. 6717497, lost on May 17, 1970. Old "497" was assigned to the 71st Assault Helicopter Company, 14th Combat Aviation Battalion, Chu Lai, RVN. Her A/C was Capt. Mike Callahan, "Rattler 26."

Mike was grooming me to take over as second platoon leader, so I flew with him as "Peter Pilot" until I received my A/C orders. Mike and I had been out flying resupply for the 4/31st Infantry, 196th Brigade of the Americal Division out of LZ West.

Late in the afternoon, we received a call over our company frequency to report to Hawk Hill, refuel and stand by for a mission. A few minutes out of Hawk Hill we met with the departing flight of about six ships, led by CWO Mike Curtis. We checked in with lead and were instructed to take up trail position. It seemed that some ARVNs were in some heavy contact and needed to be extracted.

After a short flight out to Hiep Duc Valley (better known as Death Valley), we started an approach, to the west, to a hilltop just to the north of LZ Siberia. The PZ sat at the base of Nui Chom, a ridgeline that separated the Americal AO from the 1st Marines to the north.

About 300 feet out of the PZ, in staggered trail formation, the flight came under heavy .51-caliber fire.

The PZ also erupted with incoming mortar rounds. Lead broke the silence on the radio, advising the rest of the flight that he had taken hits and instructed us to break up the flight. At that point, our company commander, who was flying command and control, instructed the flight to reassemble over the village of Hiep Duc and he would direct us in, low level, to the PZ.

We dropped down to treetop level and started our run to the base of the hill. About halfway down the stream

bed we were following, a burst of white tracers flashed in front of the aircraft from the left. Unable to take evasive action at this low altitude, we flew right into the burst of fire.

Old "497" shuddered and kicked to the right. The next few seconds, which seemed frozen in time, went like this:

The intercom was damaged, but we

could hear the crew chief shouting that the aircraft was on fire. At that point, Mike and I were both on the controls. We started to set her down, but the .51-caliber still had a bead on us. We hovered around a bend in the stream bed and set "497" down.

After a quick survey of the instruments and controls, we were preparing to try and get her out when the company commander said he was sending in "Snake Doctor," our maintenance/recovery ship, to pull us out. We took quick stock of all crew members, who all were in good shape, and exited the burning "497."

No sooner had we cleared the burning ship when "Snake Doctor" dropped in. We quickly jumped on board, and were off and out.

The pilots of "Snake Doctor," whose names I hate myself for not remembering, took a lot of fire coming in and going out, but never took a hit. These guys were the greatest.

Old "497" sat in the stream bed, rotors still turning, and eventually burned to the ground. Why the JP-4 on board never exploded may have been due to the fact that we never had a chance to refuel and were very low at this point. Fate? Luck? Whatever?

I'm indebted to those guys flying "Snake Doctor" that day. If any of our members remember this incident or if "Snake Doctor's" pilots read this account, I would love to hear from you. I owe you my life, and my children and grandchildren owe you their gratitude. As for Mike Callahan, wherever you are, "thanks for saving me."

Now here is a story you may be interested in publishing:

In November 1991, the 513th Military Intelligence Brigade was conducting a preparation for overseas movement in conjunction with a brigade exercise.

While I was standing in line waiting to have my shot record checked, an older gentleman came out of a conference room and walked past me en route to the latrine. At first I thought I was seeing things, the older gentleman looked just like Leo Borst, the communications maintenance warrant officer from the 116th Assault Helicopter Company, Chu Lai, Vietnam.

I watched as he walked by, trying to confirm in my mind that this was in fact Leo.

I waited until he passed me the second time and then asked one of the other gentlemen if that was Leo Borst. He, of course, said it was.

I asked the second gentleman to tell Leo that Lt. Col. Ed Hughes, "Hornet 24," would like to talk to him.

Well, to cut a long story short, Leo and I spent the next 1½ hours telling war stories and catching up on the past 21 years.

I can tell you that it was great seeing an old friend, an old Hornet.

What happened to Chinook mascot of aviation battalion?

I was given your address through David Baum on the military forum of Compuserve. I had left a message for any person who served with the 228th Combat Aviation Battalion in Vietnam. Mr. Baum thought I would have better luck with you, since there were no responses left for me.

I am seeking information dating from 1966 on the mascot for that particular battalion. I have very limited information to help you research or give me a different place to write.

The facts I can give you on this Chinook are as follows: Col. Max Clark was the commanding officer of the 228th. The article which gives the information is dated Wednesday, June 1, 1966. He came from Perry Greene Kennels and was five months old.

This dog was to land in Saigon during the rainy season of that year. The people who were the liaison between the kennels and Vertol managers were Mr. and Mrs. William Becker of Philadelphia, who became interested in the CH-47A helicopter in Vietnam.

There are no facts on this Chinook. Shortly after this dog was donated by Mrs. Greene Smead, she died. By the time the early '70s arrived, there were approximately 12 breedable Chinooks left. We nearly lost this breed. With dedication and hard work from a few people across the U.S., the number has risen to over 200. They are no longer on the Guinness records as the rarest dog.

A club has been formed of these owners with a board of directors to help and advise those in the breeding as to prevent this from happening again. I am on the board as the newsletter director. I have been doing a lot of research on their history.

The Vietnam Chinook is a mystery I have yet to gain any facts on. I would appreciate any and all information on this Chinook that you may have. It would be helpful to us to know his name and any factual data as to what he may have done in Nam. Did he survive or was he laid to rest there? Are there any people still in this division who may remember him? If so, is it possible to contact them directly for human interest stories for the membership?

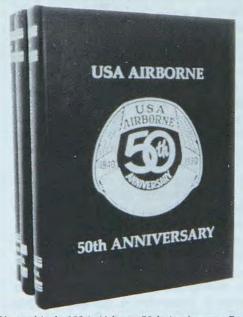

Sample Biography

WILLIAM HAYDEN JONES, (PAPPY) CW3 US Army Aviation, RET, was born on Jan. 29, 1938 in Russellville, AR. He enlisted in the Army in 1960, spent eighteen months on a MAAG assignment in Iran. Jones went to Viet-

Council OKs six Newsletters a year

The VHPA Executive Council has approved increasing the number of Newsletters from four to six a year starting in 1993.

Instead of being published quarterly as they currently are, the Newsletters will be distributed to VHPA members every two months, Newsletter Editor Jack Swickard said.

A distribution schedule is being worked out now.

During the general membership meeting at the VHPA Reunion in Atlanta this summer, Swickard reported the Executive Council would be considering an increase in Newsletter issues.

Executive Council members approved the addition of the two issues during a telephone conference meeting the night of Aug. 11.

The cost of adding the two issues averages \$1.49 per VHPA member per year. Current dues will cover the additional cost.

As VHPA membership increases, the permember cost of the Newsletter will decrease.

Savings in composition costs and the change to a different paper stock, as well as advertising earnings, during the past year have reduced the Newsletter's dependence on membership dues by \$800-\$1,000 per issue, Swickard estimated.

An advertising policy was instituted by the Executive Council last year to bring ad revenue in line with Newsletter printing and distribution costs.

VHPA president reports on year

The Vietnam Helicopter Pilots Association Annual Business Meeting was held during the ninth annual reunion at the Hilton Hotel and Towers in Atlanta on July 3, 1992.

The meeting was called to order by President Gary Slaughter at about 1:15 p.m.

Slaughter said that during the previous year's membership drive, more than 1,000 new names were added to the data base.

He also reported that during the previous year, the Executive Council negotiated a new, three-year contract with PAI (Performance Associates Inc.) as the VHPA management company.

Constitutional proposal

Vice President Mike Law presented a proposal to change the VHPA Constitution to provide for filling the past president position should it become vacant.

A member on the floor reminded the Executive Council that a decision was made at an earlier Annual Business Meeting in that all proposed changes to the Constitution must be submitted to the general membership no later than being inserted into member's reunion packets. Therefore, the vote could not be taken on the proposal.

Another member made a motion from the floor to table discussion of the proposed constitutional change. The motion was seconded and then approved by the general membership.

Financial report

Dan Ferguson, secretary/treasurer, presented the VHPA financial report, comparing 1990 and 1991 figures. The numbers showed a healthy growth in VHPA and its membership.

However, this was reflected in higher expenses, due to growth itself and the increased cost of dayto-day business expenses.

Ferguson reported that the associ-

ation's savings and checking accounts increased to approximately \$76,949, and certificates of deposit increased to about \$128,647.

He explained that although it appears there is a large sum of money in the bank, the money has to be there to cover Life Memberships and cannot be used for general expenditures.

Ferguson reported total assets at \$188,575 and total liabilities at \$153,468, with \$35,107 in unrestricted funds.

Election of officers

Phil Marshall, mid-term member at large, was elected vice president.

Charles Rayl, VHPA legal adviser, was elected junior member at large, a three-year term.

Kenny Bunn, 1992 reunion chairman, was elected senior member at large, a one-year term.

Database Committee

Gary Roush, Database Committee chairman, thanked volunteers who helped with the flight school class rosters during the past year.

He reported the rosters are about 60 percent complete, with some 13,000 names.

Roush reported there are 4,682 dues-current members, including

530 Life Members. He also reported there are 1,753 potential members in the database.

Total identified as members and potential members is 6,435, he said.

Membership Directory

Vice President Mike Law, who also oversees the Membership Directory, said the 1992 directory will contain an index by flight school class to make it easier to find old classmates. The index will contain the names of all who are alive or have died.

Historical Committee

Bill Greenhalgh, Historical Committee chairman, said the association's historical data has grown considerably, but appealed to members for more information, specifically old orders, lists of units, unit histories, and so forth.

Membership Committee

Jack Glennon, Membership Committee chairman, reported on the membership drive which resulted in 1,425 names being submitted.

He recognized the top five finishers in the drive.

Member No. 6,000 joined VHPA several weeks before the reunion.

VHPA Newsletter

Jack Swickard, Newsletter editor, said he has taken over layout and assembly of the publication, resulting in a substantial savings to the association.

He also reported on the establishment of the Newsletter Committee made up of the Newsletter editor, the immediate past president and the Membership Committee chairman.

Swickard announced he is collecting data which he will present to the Executive Council seeking approval to publish six Newsletters a year.

He said this will require more letters, photographs and articles by VHPA members.

Mike Law reported on the AAAA (Army Aviation Association of America) meeting he attended and manned a booth. The booth accounted for 72 VHPA members and 54 more names. The cost was

about \$400.

He thanked AAAA for its support. Law said Jack Jordan will run the Fort Worth AAAA in 1993.

AHS 1992

Skip Butler reported that booth space, furniture, electricity, etc., were donated at the AHS (American Helicopter Society) convention in Washington, D.C.

Turner Publishing Co.

Bob Martin of Turner Publishing Co. reported on the VHPA book the publishing company is working on.

Martin, who is the editor for the book, appealed to the membership for stories, pictures, etc., to be included in the book.

Holley book strong on war action

"Aeroscouts" by Charles Holley. Publication date: June 1992 by Pocket Books. 252 pages. \$4.99.

Charles Holley ended up in the cockpit of an Army helicopter in South Vietnam the same way as many other members of the VHPA:

Like many of his contemporaries who wound up in the rotary wing aviator pipeline at Forts Wolters, Rucker and Stewart, Holley had no idea what a warrant officer was when accepted for flight training.

They soon learned, from Tac officers in the warrant officer candidate (WOC) companies and on the flight line and in the classrooms at Fort Wolters.

Though he gives more details than most other Vietnam War authors about the training of warrant officer helicopter pilots, Holley slides through the WOC experience too quickly for former and current aviation warrant officers to fully savor.

But "Aeroscouts" was written for a wider reader base than ex-Vietnam helicopter pilots.

These readers are more interested in face-downs with Viet Cong and NVA soldiers, rocket and minigun attacks against the enemy,

helicopters being shot down or severely damaged by ground fire, and valiant rescues by chopper pilots.

And Holley gives them plenty of action – mixed with a healthy dose of humor – as he describes his life as a scout pilot with Delta Troop, 2/1st Cavalry Regiment (Air).

"Aeroscouts" will hold the attention of almost everyone who picks it up, including wives who yawn at the repeated war stories they hear at VHPA reunions. My wife, who

rarely finishes a book in less than three months, completed Holley's book during one day's drive while returning home from the Atlanta reunion.

Holley has a winner with "Aeroscouts." It should be on the bookshelf of every former Vietnam helicopter pilot — and wife.

If you want to know more about WOC life, though, Holley will have to explain it in person at future VHPA reunions.

Navy nurse writes about her Vietnam experiences

"A Navy Nurse In Vietnam, 1963-64" by LCDR Bobbi Hovis, NC, USN (Ret.) Publication date: May 1992. 167 pages. Photographs. Maps. List price: \$21.95.

In 1963, Bobbi Hovis and four other nurses arrived in Saigon charged with the monumental task of converting, in four days, a dilapidated apartment building into the first U.S. Navy Station hospital in Vietnam.

This memoir, one of the few books written by and about women in war, describes their efforts to provide the first American casualties with care despite thirdworld conditions.

Operating in a city of chaos, where the extraordinary became the ordinary as the war escalated, Hovis provides a rare inside look at Vietnam in the early years of conflict. Her vivid impressions contrast the serene beauty of the countryside, before the ravages of full-scale war, with the excitement of Saigon and the horror of Viet Cong bombing attacks.

Her firsthand account of the Diem coup gives the reader a true sense of the turmoil and uncertainty experienced by the beleaguered medical staff.

Her recollections of activities that helped to alleviate the intensity of her hospital duty holidays in Cambodia, tennis and tea parties with the Westmorelands and Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge – further highlight the contrasts of her experience and allow the reader to become part of the small circle of U.S. personnel then in Vietnam.

This personal memoir makes a significant contribution to the history of the Navy Nurse Corps and the Vietnam experience.
