RADIO SCORES NIXON, KISSINGER REMARKS ON PEACE PLAN

Liberation Radio [Clandestine] in Vietnamese to South Vietnam 1407 GMT 8 Jul 71 S

[Text] While world public opinion and many U.S. politicians have welcomed the new, seven-point peace initiative of the Republic of South Vietnam Provisional Revolutionary Government and have demanded that Nixon agree to this initiative, the White House ringleaders have stubbornly plotted to prolong the war of aggression in Vietnam, thus ignoring the new PRG/RSV initiative.

On 7 July, en route to the western White House, Nixon delivered a speech in Kansas City, Missouri, in which he revealed his intent to stubbornly prosecute the war of aggression in Vietnam. He overbearingly stated: "Regarding the Vietnam issue, there is nothing to add. Whatever may happen in Paris, the plan to Vietnamize the war will be carried through"--meaning that he will continue his policy of prolonging and expanding the war of aggression in Vietnam and in the other countries of Indochina. Nixon revealed his stubborn stand by refusing to withdraw all U.S. troops from South Vietnam and persistently clinging to the Saigon puppet administration in order to prolong the war.

Earlier, Nixon sent his special adviser, Kissinger, to Saigon to appease and motivate the lackey clique--the country-selling Vietnamese traitors. In Saigon, Kissinger stated that he would not approve the PRG's 1 July initiative. It is crystal clear that Nixon is still stubborn and plots to prolong and spread the war of aggression in Vietnam and Indochina. He has feigned ignorance of the PRG's new peace initiative.

Our South Vietnamese people, firm in their just stand, say to the Nixon clique that if it stubbornly continues the war and refuses to withdraw all U.S. troops from South Vietnam, refuses to abandon the bellicose ruling clique in South Vietnam led by traitor Nguyen Van Thieu, and refuses to end the war and restore peace, it will certainly suffer appropriate punishment.
