FRONT RADIO FEATURE ON U.S. HANDS SABOTAGING PARIS AGREEMENT

Liberation Radio [Clandestine] in Vietnamese to South Vietnam 0500 GMT 7 Sep 74 S

[Feature: "Here Are the U.S. Hands Directly Sabotaging the Agreement and Continuing the War"]

[Text] Dear Friends: The U.S. ruling circles, from Nixon to Gerald Ford, have been very afraid that the U.S. hands directly sabotaging the agreement and continuing the war in South Vietnam would be exposed. However, the Americans have now failed to conceal them.

The disguised U.S. war command in Saigon has been brought to light and tens of thousands of U.S. generals and field-grade officers disguised as civilian advisers have been exposed. These people are directly commanding the Thieu administration's nibbling, pacification, terrorist, and screening campaigns, as well as its apparatus of terrorism-- from the police branch to the prison system, as well as directing the various sectors, from the economic to the educational and cultural, of this administration.

Broad segments of public opinion in Saigon and other southern cities are continuing to openly expose the sabotaging and warwaging U.S. hands. Beginning today, in our 1200 and 2100 [0500, 1400 GMT] newscasts, we will introduce to you, friends, in the feature "Here Are the U.S. Hands Directly Sabotaging the Agreement and Continuing the War," concrete evidence to help you further understand the U.S. crimes.

A Plaque which simply reads "U.S. Embassy, 4 Thong Nhat, Saigon" is attached to the front of the building located at this address. It looks like other diplomatic plaques in Saigon. However, in reality, this building houses the supreme U.S. command in South Vietnam headed by governor general Martin. This U.S. Embassy is publicly known to contain four components: The embassy staff, the U.S. Agency for International Development, the U.S. Information Service, and the attache [as heard] component. However, the U.S. Embassy has more than these four components. It has 106 components, including those whose activities have no connection whatsoever with Martin's diplomatic activities. These include the special assistant to the ambassador for field operations, the office of the special assistant headed by U.S. CIA Chief Polgar, and the Defense Attache Office [DAO] which, in fact, is a U.S. military command in South Vietnam.

However, in reality, U.S. ruling circles set up the so-called DAO as its replacement. Although the name differs, DAO has the same headquarters and organization as MACV; that is, it completely resembles the former eastern Pentagon and assumes direct U.S. military command in South Vietnam.

John Murray, a two-star general, was appointed to head this military command. Under him were some 7,000 U.S. servicemen wearing civilian clothes. One thousand of them continue to operate in Saigon and the remaining 6,000 work at the four U.S. consulates, that is at the four U.S. commands in the four military regions located in Danang, Nha Trang, Bien Hoa and Can Tho. The U.S. DAO military command headed by John Murray has 37 subordinate organs whose names obviously prove that their chief mission is to devise plans for and directly command the Saigon troops engaged in pacification and nibbling operations. These organs include the offices for plans and coordination, operations and training, military intelligence and operational support, air force and navy military transport command, and advisory and other offices.

To enable the U.S. DAO military command to satisfactorily perform its mission of formulating plans and exercising command, U.S. ruling circles have placed it under the direct command of General John Vogt who is based in Nakhon Phanom, Thailand. On 5 September, they appointed Homer Smith, a two-star general who had taken part in the war in South Vietnam between January 1969 and August 1970, as John Murray's replacement.
