RVN SPOKESMAN DENIES 'SECRET TALKS' WITH DRV

[Text] Saigon, September 9 (AFP)--It is absolutely out of question to hold secret negotiations with the communists, a government spokesman said today, dismissing reports that two key government officials had left Sunday for Indonesia to seek a dialogue with the North Vietnamese.

The spokesman said these reports are totally unfounded. He specified that General Dang Van Quang, special assistant to President Nguyen Van Thieu, in charge of military affairs and national security, who left for Indonesia Sunday, had gone "for a pure private reason."

The spokesman added the other alleged [person] involved, roving Ambassador Bui Diem, is still in Saigon. He said if the ambassador is going to Indonesia, it would be mainly in "his current and very normal activities."

PRGRSV 2-PARTY JMC DELEGATION HOLDS 7 SEP PRESS CONFERENCE

[Text] At a 7 September press conference held at the headquarters of the PRGRSV military delegation to the central Two-Party JMC at Tan Son Nhut, Col Vo Dong Giang, deputy head of this delegation, vehemently denounced and sternly condemned the Nguyen Van Thieu administration which over the past 19 months since the signing of the Paris agreement and on U.S. orders has continued to accelerate the genocidal, biocidal, and ecocidal war conducted by the Americans for many years--a criminal war which was vehemently condemned by world progressives and in which the Americans sustained ignominious setbacks.

Col Vo Dong Giang stressed: The Vietnamese people and world progressives are determinely insisting that the Americans end the criminal acts of war which they continue to pile up in South Vietnam through their agent, the Nguyen Van Thieu lackey administration, and that the U.S.-Thieu clique respect and strictly implement the Paris agreement on Vietnam.
