In early 1963 there were some Photo/Recon Mowhawks/ L-19's attached to our unit but were quietly replaced to avoid treaty violations about introducing new weapons. I am still trying to track down the following personnel who served with me in 63-64. Can space be bought in the Dragonflight?

A note about call signs. In 63-64 they would change daily and were sometimes quite colorful. During a siege by the VC of the DAKTO complex of fortified hamlets, the 119th was staging out of Kontum.

The air force had controllers on the ground directing traffic, their call sign that day was Whaleboat Control. The 119th slicks were "Dump Truck". The C-123 Providers

Roy Strawser, Roswell, Jim Nowack, Michael Verdecchia, Pertello, Hotchkiss, Kien, Tom Tubo, Garrison, Don Raines, Bruce, Blamey. That's all I can think of but it may help locate others from the 170th Dennis Kedrowski

Although, a long way from retirement, I am enjoying Florida and working in rebuilding the aviation industry since 9/11

The attached story is an event that happened to me while flying the 0-1 Birddog for the 219th Avn Co (Recon) The event occurred while I was assigned to the 3rd Platoon located in Qui Nhon

I was in RVN from Sep '70 to Sep 71 Holloway was my home for my first 2 months. Then my home away from home when I flew in from the remote platoon locations The 219th "Dog House" was just outside the main O Club at Holloway. I lived just inside the Dog House's main door and spent many blurry nights playing cards or stumbling from the Club to my room. My future wife was an Army nurse assigned to the 71st Evac Hospital in Pleiku. We met while I was attending flight school and she preceded me in country by 5 months Our dates together were unusual in the fact that I would catch the Flare Ship from Holloway and jump off at the hospital medevac pad. The flare ship would pick me up later. Several times I was caught in a red alert and could not get back to Holloway. Fortunately, someone always called out my name as "present" when the headcount was taken in the 219th bunker. We married in Hawaii and returned to RVN (Qui Nhon) for our honeymoon. The night we returned a sapper blew up the Qui Nhon Port ammo dump behind our platoon HQ and created the biggest explosion any of us had ever seen up to then and since. Light filled shock waves radiated up and over our heads created a scene like no other. Lead from fire activated ammunition rounds rained down on us from every direction. Some honeymoon! By the way, we just celebrated our 31st wedding anniversary.

Subject: We Were Soldiers, Once....and Young

I wasn't that young when my first tour started in 62. I was rated on 30 Apr 55

I Landed Caribou #61-2392 in Korat RTAFB, Thailand, 21 June 62, after flying from Ft Benning, GA. (Scenes at Lawson AAF brought back memories)

First TDY trip to Tan Son Nhut.... 28 June 1962.

Helen and I saw "We Were Soldiers" this afternoon, in a theater about 1/4 full. It will take me several days to truly think about what I saw today. "Awesome"! Three scenes stick in my mind right now (not the flying and combat scenes, they cannot be described in mere words).

First.... The pre-dawn arrival of "LTC Moore" at the Ft. Benning parachute training towers, alone, prior to being joined by his Sergeant Major and his Company Commanders.... before the troop busses arrived. As a photographer, I thought the lighting and mood was superb.

Second.... "LTC Moore" wearing his dog-tags, as he went to bed with his wife.

Third.... The quick scene where a bucket of water was thrown into the Huey, and red blood flowed out the other door.

(Nov 67, Battle of DakTo, where we washed out the Chinooks each night, after carrying KIAs and wounded back to the Pleiku Field Hospital)

Many of us stood in silence and watched the "credits" at the end.... helped the eyes dry out. Out in the lobby, I saw a 15-year friend, a VN Special Forces retired Major. Neither of us could speak beyond nodding and agreeing. ...Wow!

Sometimes it feels like.... "Yesterday, All my troubles seem so far away"
