

Our trailer to transport it should be ready this week. Our Vo-tech school here in Citrus Country, under the direction of Don Fehrenbach, has volunteered to paint it for us. We will also get authentic striping and lettering. We would like to dedicate this ship to the crew of Blue Tail One, 2nd Flight Platoon, 118th Aviation Company, who were shot down on 10 June 1965 in the battle of Dong Xoai. The crew status that I have from 1973 is that all were killed and the bodies not recovered. The crew consisted of: Pilot- Lt. Walter L. Hall, Co-pilot-W.O. Donald Saegaert, Crew Chief- S. Sgt. Joseph J. Compa, Jr, Gunner- Sgt. Craig L. Hagen. What we need is any pictures of information that anyone may have on the Crew Members or the incident. I have a picture of Sgt Compa. Also, Mr. Pat McLarney has a picture of Mr. Saegaert, who we thank. Any and all pictures and information that we can get, will be greatly appreciated. We also need any information on the ship that we have; when it served, what unit, what area it served and it's status when it returned to the States, etc. The ship's numbers are 63-8739. Originally it was a "D" model then later converted to a "H" model. We hope to have this display ready to show by April '93 at the annual Vietnam Vets of Brevard Country, Melborne, Florida, Reunion. Thanks for your help. Sincerely, Freddy Holder, P.S. Thanks for the last cassette tape you sent me. We are going to run that tape through a flight helmet to simulate the excitement of a combat assault. Thanks again, Freddy (EDITORIAL NOTE) Thank you Freddy and hopefully some of our members will sent the information and pictures to make display complete. I'm also going to send you a copy of two tapes sent in by Joe Michalkiewicz, one is of the 118th in Jan 68, and the other is of a 145th operation in Jan 1968. The display will really be of great interest to our members and potential new members who see it, I'll have to send you some Asso business cards to pass out. The next letter will tell you more about the tapes I'm sending you.

Dear Jim, I was one of those nineteen year old Warrant Officer slick and twenty year old gun ship drivers in the 118th Assault Helicopter Company in Vietnam in 1967-68. I'm now a forty-five year old, non-smoking, significantly lighter drinking, retired Warrant working as GS-11 Safety Specialist for a U.S Army Engineer Brigade in Germany. In addition to wanting to renew my membership, check enclosed, I've also had it in mind for a couple of years to send you these tapes. I had a great conversation about the 118th and 145th with Bob (H.R) Nelson a few years ago. That conversation got me thinking, and I dug through some old tapes and found some of the mission stuff I had taped while a Peter Pilot in the 118th Gun Platoon, the Bandits. I couldn't remember if I'd ever given them to anyone, and I knew that you collected battalion history, so eventually I got a round "tuit" and made three copies. Besides the set for the Association, I'm sending one to Cpt Thorne and Maj Guidroz my old platoon and company commanders respectively. I'm doing this, not because

the tapes are particularly exciting or of significant historical value, but because the sounds, names, call signs, and voices evoke memories of a time in my life which will always be very much a part of who I am. I thought some of these memories might also be of interest to other Thunderbirds and Old Warriors. Of course, one must excuse some of the more colorful language. The first tape is of a 118th combat assault mission in the Duc Hoa/Bao Tri area. According to the sparse diary that I sporadically kept, I think the date was 14 Jan 68. I believe I was flying in a HOG with WO Bell the tape only runs for one and a half sides. There is some rocket and machine gun fire on both sides of the tape and some mention of taking fire and snipers on side 2. I don't have a written record, but here's my best shot at piecing together the voices and call signs on the tape: CALL SIGN- Nick Name- Name,: Thunderbird 6- Maj Guidroz, TB 14?, TB 23?, TB 24?, Bandit 36- Diawi- Cpt James Thorne, Bandit 31- WO Bell?, Bandit 31's co-pilot- WO Joe Michalkiewicz, Bandit 32-Pappy- WO Warren Spencer, Bandit 33- WO Fred Viles?, Bandit 34- Frank ?, Bandit ?- Baby-?, Gunner/Crewchief- Bama- ?, Crew Chief- Craze- John Acosta. The second tape is of a 145th CAB Operation in the Phouc Binh / Song Be area I believe in mid Jan 1968. I was flying copilot in a mini-gun ship, I think with Kenny Dolan. It's not particularly exciting, but in addition to the 118th voices captured there are quite a few other units represented. The recording fills both sides of the tape and has some mini gun and rocket sounds. Call signs and names mentioned are: Old Warriors 3 & 14, Thunderbirds 6, 10, 20, 25, 28, Swickard & Birdwatcher, Playboys 11, 12, 13 & 17, Bandit 36, 33, 38 Dolan?, Allen CE/G, Bill?, Baby?, Robinhood 6, Blackjack 3, Cricket 6, Smokey 3, Crossbows, & 2d of the 502d. Well, I hope these tapes help keep alive a few kind thoughts for people we used to count on. I'm glad I have them, and you have my permission to use them for the benefit of the Association. A word to members of the 118th from the 1967-68 era. I've been toying with the idea of taking excerpts of these tapes and recording of music and radio of the times and putting them together on a vidio tape with photos of the 118th. The only problem is I don't have good quality picture of very many folks. If you have some good shots, prints or slides, of our folks and ships in action, on or off duty, I might want to borrow them. It would be helpful if they were marked to identify person, place and date, as well as the owner's name and return address. Time is at a premium right now, but the drawdown in Europe might free up some of my working hours in the not too distant future. Drop me_a line if you are interested in the project. Jim, Keep up the good work; we need you. I think the vidio sounds like a great idea, and what a great way to tell that part of the story about what we were doing in Vietnam. I'm also going to send a copy of the tapes to Fred Eckelmann working with the restored "Bandit 3, Miss Mini" project, the

Tell Fred Eckelmann that I was there when Bandit 3 crashed, and remember- but I can not remember at the present time what we replaced it with. I took care of all the paper work of the helicopters from 1969 to 1970. I will try to remember what we replaced Bandit 3 with. <u>Jerry Webb</u>, (EDITORIAL NOTE) Thank you Jerry, let us know if you recall any more info on it.

next couple letters tell a little more about the restored "Bandit 3".

Jim, I finally got my dues paid and address changed after spending an hour drooling over the restored "Bandit 3" and talking with the crew at this years Wilkes-Barre (Penna) air show. It got the juices flowing again. In reading your latest newsletter. The letter relative to a .50 cal being mounted in a Huey jostled the memory. If I remember correctly, some enterprising crew chiefs and gunners came up with a .50 cal. and mounted it in the doorway of the 335th AHC "Falcon" gunships. It only lasted a short while before the "B" model developed structural cracks. Maybe we didn't have it mounted properly. The other

problem I recall, is that when it was fired 90 degrees to the flight path, the helicopter moved sideways thru the air from the recoil. That was a problem on Rocket Runs. I don't remember shooting out the barrel due to heat or any vibration problems. The main reason for my writing this letter, after realizing a large part of the associations membership is the crew chiefs and gunners of the flight crews, is to give them a 25 year late apology and thank you. The apology is for not helping them more at the end of the flight portion of their day when their real work began. They had to clean up and fix up what we pilots got dirty and broke. They worked into the night, got little sleep, little hot food or a cold beer, then pulled quard duty. You had to sit in the back seat and be terrorized by pilots with no control over your destiny. My hat is off to you gentlemen. You were and still are the backbone of aviation. This apology and thank you is especially for the Cowboy and the Falcon enlisted flight crews but should be given to all enlisted flight crews. Pilots trust and appreciate you, we just didn't say it. (EDITORIAL NOTE) I am a former Crew Chief and Doorgunner and on behalf of the former Crew Chief/Doorgunners I say thank you to you and the pilots, together we made a great team.

And may that continue today.

Dear Jim, What a great job you're doing. Congratulations. I'm proud to tell everyone I know you! I don't know if this is of any use but thought I would set to writing some of the background of the U.T.T. from my view and experiences in 1962-63. The Air Tactical Test (Howze) Board had done extensive field trials of Army Aviation and its support of a ground Army. We flew all over the East Coast trying this and that and showing a lot of narrow minded people that the Army could operate in a dimension and speed that its leaders had not been used to. The Armed Helicopter was an area that we were working with - we being the Aviation Company (P) of the 101st Airborne Division who had the Army's first significant contingent of the UH-1A helicopter. I was learning my trade as a Maintenance Officer at Ft Campbell from CWO Frankie M. Donahue. While calling me "DASL" (Dumbass Second Lieutenant) I had the privilege, nonetheless of learning from a master. In late summer '62, I was put on orders to a project "Hot Shot", then classified SECRET, to go to Ft Rucker and learn the XM6E3 Emerson gum subsystem then mounted on a UH-1A. A large wad of lead on the stinger made the weight and balance correct as the gun system was bolted to the wall between pilot door and cabin door - but it was really weird. What "it" was was 4 M-60 machine guns on a hydraulic mount. The Cuban Missile crisis cleaned Ft Rucker of most pilots and crews but we were left there to "train" on the guns. "What do you think" was the lesson plan as no one really had a lot of ideas about four M-60's that moved with a sight. We were impressed as our Howze Board experiences were the low level fight of simulated rockets on the A-model skids. Ok, thence to Fort Worth, Bell Helicopter, to pick up new UH-1B's with the XM6E-3 mounted near the mast and centerline - no more lead on the stinger. We flew to Ft Sill to test fire the systems, then back to Carswell AFB to load on to a C-124 "Globemaster" for travel to Vietnam. Two aircraft and 11 souls, in my memory, riding this non-air conditioned beauty from Texas to Saigon. Complete with a 3-day layover in sunny downtown Wake Island for engine replacement to the "Crashmaster". Of greatest humor to me was my questioning the Air Force flight crew which boarded with a double crew for extended flight. In Fort Worth I asked them where we were going and the route. The commander carried SECRET orders to be opened from Travis AFB to Hawaii. My comment to him was that I was on orders to Vietnam on this plane. Of course it turned out his classified instructions led him to RVN via Hawaii, Wake, Guam, Clark, Saigon. His best flying was the Kamikaze approach to Tan Son Nhut, off loaded us out of every available orifice from the 124 in what seemed like 15 seconds and his departure from the war zone. You could see the outline of the airplane after he blasted off with our stuff all around on the ground. A UTT jeep showed up shortly and, with 3/4 ton transport for us all, we arrived for duty. I have a great collection of photos you need there for historical. There is a good 8x10 official US photo, annotated, of the "original" UTT company with Major Ivan Slavich as boss. Also an original cloth patch from the unit and whatnot. Gotta find an appropriate box. Hope at least some of this was illuminative. Dues enclosed. Although I was a 94B20 cook, we all were considered riflemen too, and took our field kitchens out to the field during Brigade Ops. I want to thank the members who called me, asking how my Agent Orange Cancers (STS and NHL) treatment was coming. Listening to those guys really picked me up. I was fortunate that the VA recognize those two rare type of cancers as compensable service connected disabilities. I won my case, and my family can now live a life with shelter, food, and medical care. My cancers are in remission (there really is a God.) What Charlie Wells said about many combat veterans having chemical imbalances that are chronic is true. I read the Bowme Study in its published book form. I suggest members check it out at a college or university library. Many symptoms of PTSD are linked to our altered chemical structure. Counseling can help us live with it, but finding the right medication was the key for me. I'm concerned about the complaints of symptoms Desert Storm veterans have expressed to physicians. Dear Jim, Please accept my application for the "Old Warriors" Association. As a Master Warrant Officer, still on active duty after 24 years, I'm beginning to feel like an old warrior. Few of us probably believed while serving with the 145th that we would never get to be old, and quit a few of our dear comrades never did. Thank you for your tireless efforts at being the one man point of contact for the Battalion! Since you bounce data off several sources to help out others who might have questions regarding friends or relatives, I will give you my personal data that it might aid you in any search you might have. I served as an AH-1G pilot with the 334th AHC, as a WO 1 and CW 2, at Bien Hoa (Woodson Compound) and later at Phu Loi, from September 1969 until September of 1970. In September of '69 the Battalion was commanded by LTC Top and the 334th by Major (later Col) Oliver, The company provided daily 5 minute standby teams of two Cobra's, also provided attack helo for various lift companies in 12th Group, and general close air support for any unit in III Corps. Additionally, we would race any "Bandit" low level to get to POL first. Major Oliver was succeeded over by Major Charles Densford, and in May '70 by Major (later Col) McQuestion assumed command. In April of 1970 the 334th moved to Phu Loi and moved in the area previously occupied by the 1/4 CAV of the 1st (if your gonna be one, a Big Red one) ID. After extensive refurbishing, and installing the air-conditioners "commandeered" from the flush toilet facilities of Woodson Compound, the unit remained there, I understand, until it rotated stateside. During my tour as Dragon 33, and later as Raider 20, the unit supported actions from Cambodia (during the invasion of April/May 1970, to North, supporting 5th Special Forces Group as far as O Rang, South to Vinh Long, and East to the coast to Ham Tan. Later the 334th showed up in Europe Hanau (Fliegerhorst Caserne) in 1976. "First with Guns" still had the Playboys, Raiders, and Dragon Platoons. Well Jim I've gotten diarrhea of the word processor, so I'll stop. I have enclosed some memorabilia pertinent to the 145th. Hope it will help the archive. (You will be aware that at the time the 135th was an experimental military unit that merged United States Army and Royal Australian Navy personnel into one unit). I was a Lieutenant (Navy) which was equivalent to an army Captain. While I was in command one of my pilots, WO Terry Menzera was killed on Jan. 16, 1971. I recall that at the time he was attempting to resupply ground troops who were under heavy attack and running desperately short of munitions. If you would like further information I will attempt to get it through the co-pilot, Stuart Rawlinson, an Australian who survived this action. I believe that he is currently flying in Western Australia. I hope to make my first visit to the U.S.A. in 1993 and will, at that time, attempt to meet some of my fellow servicemen. BATTALION HISTORY

11 Nov 1967 thru 8 Dec 1967

The 335th Assault Helicopter Company, prior to being transferred out of the 145th CAB, was assigned the mission of supporting the 173rd Airborne Brigade, they conducted airmobile assaults with the 2/503d on 11 November 1967 in the area south-west of Dak To. The landing zone was to be hewn out of the dense jungle and bamboo by B-52 strikes and numerous other airstrikes. Close examination of the intended landing zone by the command and control party revealed an area sufficient for only one aircraft at a time. The first troops on the ground immediately initiated clearing operations to enlarge the landing zone, while additional troops were being inserted. This landing zone soon became Fire Support Base 16. At Approximately 1200 hours, 11 November 1967, the 1/503d made strong contact with an estimated battalion sized force.

The 335th AHC was called upon to reinforce the beleaguered unit with C 4/503d. The nearest landing zone to the area would accommodate only one aircraft at a time. During this operation enemy fire was received going into and coming out of the landing zone. The armed helicopters immediately placed suppressive fires on the enemy, however, this did not deter the enemy from firing at all of the helicopters. Fortunately no aircraft were hit on this part of the operation. The armed helicopters demonstrated remarkable skill according to the commander of the ground forces. They placed rocket and machine gun fire scant meters from the friendly lines, and escorting the troop carrying helicopters into the landing zone.

During the time this action was in progress, a single ship was resupplying C 1/503d with badly needed ammunition. In order to complete the mission the pilot had to fly dangerously near the enemy position. On each trip into the area he experienced heavy enemy rifle and automatic weapons fire. Realizing he had received numerous hits, the pilot landed to inspect the aircraft and found it no longer airworthy. He immediately procured another aircraft and continued the mission. Again he received numerous hits and was barely able to return to a secure area before being forced to land. The timely arrival of reinforcements and ammunition turned the tide of battle and most assuredly saved C 1/503d from being overrun and annihilated.

The 335th AHC provided general support to the 173rd Airborne Brigade with resupply

missions and insertion of Long Range Reconnaissance Patrols (LRRP).

Many times the only mean for landing a LRRP was by using a rope dropped from the hovering helicopter allowing the team members to repel to the ground. The pilots demonstrated outstanding airmanship, and courage while hovering in one spot, above 100 foot trees, under enemy fire, to place the team in the correct location.

Numerous times the team would make contact with a superior enemy force, necessitating immediate extraction. Without hesitation the pilots of the 335th AHC came to their rescue,

again hovering above the trees, offering a perfect target for the enemy.

On 19 November 1967 the 2/503d started to move up the northern slope of Hill 875. As they neared the crest of the hill they met with extremely heavy resistance, resulting in heavy casualties. The 335th AHC was again called upon to deliver critical supplies. The landing zone was not large enough to accommodate even one helicopter, so it was necessary to employ the kick-out method. The enemy controlled the crest of the hill, which provided unlimited fields of fire at aircraft approaching to points below the crest. Also, pin point accuracy in dropping the supplies was an absolute must, for to miss the target area by even a few meters on the side of the hill increased the difficulty in retrieving them by one hundred fold. To obtain this accuracy an extremely low airspeed was required, making the helicopters a virtual "sitting duck" for enemy gunners.

On each sortie into this area, the helicopters met extremely heavy fire. Realizing the urgency of their mission, the crews never faltered in providing the ground unit with the life sustaining supplies. Although numerous aircraft were hit and aircrew members wounded, the men of the 335th AHC could not be deterred and continued their mission, even though their very lives were at stake. One aircraft attempted a sling load delivery of a landing zone clearing kit. He encountered murderous fire and was forced to jettison the load, returning to a secure area where inspection of the aircraft revealed sufficient damage to preclude further flight. Without immediate assistance the 2/503d could not hope to hold their position. Three companies of the 4/503d were dispatched to reinforce. The 4/503d also

met with sharp resistance, sustaining heavy casualties. When the 4/503d join up with the 2/503d there remained approximately one hundred effective fighting men. These two units were able to fight their way to a position approximately one hundred meters down the slope where a landing zone clearing kit was successfully dropped. After a landing zone was cut out of the jungle, the 335th AHC aircraft again braved the intense enemy fire in order to evacuate two hundred twenty-two wounded to distant medical facilities. Without this timely evacuation, many of these wounded would have surely died.

On 22 November 1967, the 335th AHC assisted by elements of the 52nd Combat Aviation Battalion conducted an airmobile operation with the I/12th Infantry, 4th US Inf. Div.

southeast of Hill 875.

On 23 November 1967 the remnants of the 2d and 4th Battalions, 503d Inf., mounted an attack on the crest of Hill 875. The attack commenced at 1100 hours and the hill was secured at 1120 hours. The enemy had retreated, leaving their dead, numerous large bunkers with up to twenty feet of overhead cover, and numerous items of equipment. During the battle the 335th AHC participated in all phases, experiencing the most hazardous of combat conditions.

The 335th AHC had ten wounded in action, while the 173d Abn Bde had 118 killed in action, 271 wounded in action and three missing in action. The NVA losses were 298 by body count. Nine of the 335th AHC helicopters received extensive combat damage. Three were evacuated by CH-47, four were repaired for a one time flight to home station, and two continued to fly. The support provided to the 173d Abn Bde by the 335th AHC during this operation was truly outstanding and on repeated occasions necessitated the air crews performing above and beyond the call of duty. Without their efforts, the tide of battle would have most probably been turned in favor of the enemy.

Part of the 334th A.H.C. was transferred to Thailand the 24th of November 1967 on temporary duty to fly escort duty over the Ho Chi Minh Trail. They were to fly gunship cover for troops placing and picking up listening devices all along the Ho Chi Minh Trail. Their refuel point was to be Khe Sanh which went under seize shortly there after, the

mission was called off the 3rd of March 1968.

LTC Robert M Deets assumed command of the 145th Combat Aviation Battalion on 1 December 1967. LTC Deets started his military career as a Navy Seabee in 1943. He was a member of an underwater demolition team and earned the Bronze Star for Valor. He began his career as an Army officer through a direct commission in November of 1951. Prior to being assigned to the 145th he was assigned to S-3 at 12th Group. Thanks to LTC Deets we have

this very fine detailed report on the Battalion's History.

On 7 December 1967 the 190th Assault Helicopter Company conducted airmobile operations with the 4th Bn, 7th Regt, 5th Inf Div (ARVN). The unit was to receive an ATT in conjunction with a search and destroy operation. The landing zone was prepared for the assault by artillery and airstrikes under the command of an aircraft from the 74th Reconnaissance Airplane Company. The first assault went as planned with negative fire received. The second assault into LZ#2 met with heavy automatic weapons fire from the right front. Chalk 10 was shot down in the landing zone and chalk 9 made an emergency landing eight hundred meters north of the LZ. This aircraft had received sixteen hits. The troops in LZ #2 were pinned down under voluminous enemy fire and without the planned, subsequent lift, were in danger of annihilation. On the next lift into the LZ the lead aircraft was engulfed by intense enemy fire that wounded or killed all of the ARVN troops on board. Several other aircraft in flight were hit causing two to make forced landings in the pickup zone and another at Cu Chi.

The FAC from the 74th Recon Airplane Company continued to direct artillery and airstrikes on the entrenched enemy. To provide cover for the remaining lifts, the smoke aircraft was employed. Braving the murderous enemy fire, he repeatedly provided smoke cover for the remaining lifts. A heavy fire team from the 334th Armed Helicopter Company was scrambled to assist in the operation. They attacked the enemy fortifications with determination and tenacity, disregarding their personal safety in order to place their fires to the best advantage. The remaining aircraft were utilized to airlift a reserve company into the area. The aircrews did not hesitate in continuing their mission even in the face of devastating enemy fire. The smoke ship was hit and forced to return to Bien Hoa for repairs. Numerous medical evacuation flights were attempted; however, each time the

aircraft met with murderous enemy fire. A second smoke ship was called out to assist in the operation. After two passes through the area, providing a smoke screen for medical evacuation flights, he too was hit and forced to land in the landing zone. realizing the precarious position the crew of the smoke ship was in, an armed helicopter from the 190th

AHC braved the intense, enemy, automatic weapons fire to land and extract them.

As nightfall approached, the ground troops ran low on ammunition. Again a crew from the 190th AHC volunteered to deliver the desperately required ammunition and at the same time extract the remaining wounded. Although the enemy was literally filling the sky with bullets, the mission received light to heavy combat damage. Three medical evacuation helicopters were damaged, one making a forced landing five miles east of Cu Chi, another making a forced landing just inside the perimeter at Cu Chi and the third taking numerous hits and wounding the gunner.

Two smoke aircraft were hit, one making a forced landing in the landing zone and the other being grounded after returning to the station. Of the aircraft that received the combat damage six required evacuation by CH-47, four were repaired and released for a one time flight to home station, two were repaired and returned to the flight, and seven were

hit but continued to fly.

On 8 December 1967 the 68th Assault Helicopter Company supported the 30th and 38th Ranger Battalions in combat assaults for search and destroy operations southeast of Phu Cong. The initial phases of the operation progressed as planned with negative resistance. Prior to the combat assault into LZ #3 the armed helicopters discovered occupied enemy bunkers on the north side. Although the area was hit by artillery, a decision was made to

disregard LZ #3 and insert the troops into LZ 12.

The element moving west encountered steady resistance after moving about four hundred meters west along the small north-south stream line. Additional forces were inserted into LZ #4. The flight reported enemy fire on takeoff. The ground unit moved south and immediately made contact. Two medical evacuation missions were requested for eleven wounded in action and one killed in action. The two aircraft attempted to land at the position by flying low level but the enemy fire was so heavy that they had to abort the mission. Both aircraft were hit and one crew chief owes his life to his chest protector. While providing cover for medical evacuation, the armed helicopter fire team were taken under heavy fire. One armed helicopter was hit, necessitating his return to home station for repairs.

An aerial observer from the 74th Reconnaissance Airplane Company directed numerous artillery and airstrikes upon the enemy positions. While the artillery concentration distracted the enemy, a medical evacuation was successfully completed. However, on his second trip in for wounded he came under heavy enemy fire and received numerous hits. Another call for medical evacuation was received. Since no other aircraft were immediately available, the 68th AHC command and control aircraft accepted the mission. Although enemy fire laced the area, three wounded in action and one killed in action were successfully evacuated. Again the requirement for a medical evacuation came forth and again the mission

was completed in spite of the extremely heavy automatic weapons fire.

Artillery, tactical air and armed helicopters continued to strike the area. An AH-IG Cobra light fire team from the 334th Armed Helicopter Company arrived and joined in the attempt to neutralize the enemy automatic weapons positions. On one rocket pass the sky seemed to be filled with enemy fire, hitting one armed helicopter and seriously wounding the pilot. Although an extraction had been planned, the tactical situation and approaching darkness necessitated implementation of the alternate plan which called for withdrawal by boat. The 68th AHC sustained two wounded in action, while the ground units had three killed in action and twenty-two wounded in action. Enemy losses were not known. Six helicopters were hit, one requiring evacuation by CH-47, two repaired for a one time flight to home station and three continued to fly.
