

Medics Aid Orphans

One of the most touching sights of the Vietnam war to the men of the 3rd Brigade, has been the orphaned children who live in the CPT Ronald Rod Memorial Orphanage of Duc Ho.

As the holiday season approached, many efforts have been made by members of the Brigade to brighten Christmas for the kids. One soldier, SP6 Bruce B. Wilson (San Antonio, Texas) a medic with D Company, 4th Medical Battalion decided that publicity in the States would produce greater results.

SP6 Wilson wrote his wife, Patricia A. Wilson, who in turn, informed the editor of the SAN ANTONIO LIGHT that the children in this small village would enjoy some clothing and toys.

As a result of the publicity, 50-60 boxes of toys and clothing arrived at D Company. The presents were distributed at the orphanage to the 120 kids, and some of the toys saved for Thanksgiving when the medics treated a group of the orphans to a feast in their mess hall.

The boxes still kept coming and an even greater holiday is planned for Christmas. As one might expect, the children were not the only delighted ones as the hardened combat medics of 4th Med, away from home for many months, had a ball showing them how the toys operate.



Scholarship Honors 'Dragon' ACADEMY

C Company, 1st Battalion, 14th Infantry was engaged in a search operation near Tan Ky. As the unit moved across the area, PFC Thomas Durbin perhaps was thinking of the letter he had mailed home a few days earlier.

He was proud of C Company, prouder of his platoon and proudest of his squad. His letter home to his parents had expressed this pride.

A hidden sniper fired. PFC Durbin fell, mortally wounded.

Like many other American soldiers, Durbin was a draftee, inducted while studying Veterinary medicine. He served well, counting days and planning to continue his education.

Escondido, California, his home town, was as proud of him as he was of Charlie Company. A group of citizens, among them Dr. John D. McCoy, Durbin's brother-in-law, developed a plan to express their gratitude for Durbin's sacrifice.

Remembering his plans for a veterinary career, the citizen's committee organized a scholarship fund named in honor of Thomas Durbin to provide aid for veterinary students.

The citizens of Escondido responded enthusiastically and, within weeks, almost \$500 had been donated.

Twelve thousand miles away in Vietnam, CPT Luis Gallegos, commander of C Company, learned of the fund in a letter from Durbin's mother.

Soon, the men of Charlie Company had donated about \$350 in memory of their fallen comrade. The battalion officer's fund contributed another \$125.

Far from home, Thomas Durbin made a great sacrifice. A grateful community is not forgetting.
