Purpose: To provide a basic working knowledge of Counterinsurgency Operations to selected U.S. Agency for International Development civilian personnel programmed for assignment to a position requiring specialized knowledge of counterinsurgency operations in the Republic of Viet-Nam ~~down~~<sup>at</sup> to the Sector level. To develop in them an understanding of the nature of both military and non-military participation in counterinsurgency operations within the Republic of Viet-Nam.
- C. Prerequisites: U.S. Agency for International Development civilian representative whose anticipated assignment requires that the incumbent have a basic working knowledge of counterinsurgency operations in terms of the Republic of Viet-Nam. Security clearance required: SECRET (interim).
- D. Length: Peacetime: 5 weeks
