


VISIONARY VIETNAM VETERANS



Edward G. Lansdale was the first, and perhaps most relevant, American advisor to the people of South Vietnam.

Lansdale dedicated his life and his work during the 1950's to help sow the seeds of democracy in Southeast Asia: first in the Philippines, then in the infant republic of South Vietnam. Hated by some, highly respected by others, at times labeled as "The Quiet American" and "The Ugly American", and recently called one of the ten greatest spies in history; all spell one thing: controversy. The work of this controversial person must now be examined for greater clarity and relevance in the continuing effort to transplant democratic institutions in the East. For Lansdale, the formula for success was to give as freely of our Nation's democratic ideas and values as of our economic aid and military assistance.

His departing advice to the head of the South Vietnam's government, Ngo Dinh Diem, in 1956, was not to squelch opposing ideas, nor to prevent other people from organizing and engaging in legitimate dialogue.
