Hi Rufus:

Bad news on the tape of the 10 Sept 1963 NSC meeting. The reply I received from the archivist at the JFK library this morning (below) indicates that the portion of the tape covering the meeting is not open after all. I believe that you can probably make a very strong case for bringing this up for review--after all, the memos detailing what was said at the meeting have been publicly available for years. I've never put in such a request at the JFK library, but I'm told that they are pretty good about acting on these in a reasonable amount of time. My advisor, Ernest May, has been heavily involved in the efforts to transcribe and publish the JFK tapes; I'll ask him about the best way to expedite the process.

Hi Rufus:

Ernest May informs me that the efforts to open additional tapes at the JFKL have lost steam of late. Apparently, there was an archivist at the library who was pushing for this, but unfortunately that person is no longer working there. I believe that you can still put in a request for a review of the particular section you need, but you will probably have to wait a while before getting a decision. In the meantime, May suggests that you might be better off seeking help from the Center for the Study of Intelligence at the CIA. Since you are on the tape, I imagine that your request will be seen as particularly persuasive. I hope that this information is useful, and that you can figure out some way to hear the tape. Please let me know if there is any other help I can provide.

One more item: are you planning on attending the Society of Historians of American Foreign Relations (SHAFR) conference next month? It takes place at George Washington U. on June 6-8. I hadn't planned to go, but it seems that there are a fair number of Vietnam panels this year, so I may head down after all.
